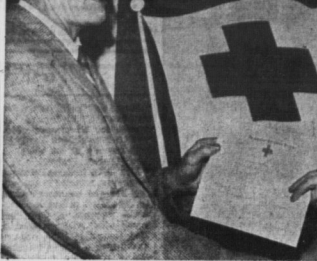


Boatage To Call Diving Tenders

WINNIPEG (CP)—The Buffalo is the policeman's good friend in several western Canadian cities. Chief Constable Robert Taft emphasized this Monday when he told the city council that the Buffalo is a good friend of the policeman.
