Girl Vanishes, Is Found A Prisoner Underground

LONDON (Reuters) — A note found in a back garden reading "I am kept a prisoner" led police Sunday to a room 14 feet underground where they found an attractive 28-year-old girl missing for more than three months. Police are questioning a young man in the case.

Majorie Jordan vanished from her lodgings Jan. 8. She wore a coat over a nightgown but no shoes.

Nothing was heard of her until Sunday when a woman found the girl's note while she was tidying her garden in the south London suburb of Lewisham.

The note read: "I am Miss Jordan, missing from Elmer's End.

I am locked in a big shed, where there is a hole dug underground where I am kept a prisoner. Will you please get in touch with the police. This is very urgent."

When police discovered the girl she was in good health. The underground room in which she was living was made of corrugated iron. It was furnished with a bed and a small electric heater. Access was gained by a shaft made of larger water pipes.

TOOK HER TO SHED

The girl said the night she disappeared a man entered her bedroom, taped her mouth, and forced her to ride with him on a motorcycle to the south London shed.

She said she was forced to live in the iron "cave" and cook for the man and herself.

When the man left the underground room, he placed a heavy lid over the shaft and she was unable to budge it.

Miss Jordan said she was permitted to go up to the man's house once a week to clean his room but she never saw anyone and had no chance to shout for help.

She said she had pushed about six notes between the corrugated iron sheets of the shed into the neighboring gardens to try to get help.

Evidence indicated the girl climbed on a ladder and poked notes between the layers of iron.

Holiday Death Toll Reaches 70

Canada's Easter holiday death toll had climbed to at least 70 by Monday night, with 15 violent deaths recorded on the last day of the long weekend.

Traffic was the major killer, a Canadian Press survey from 6 p.m. local time Thursday showed. Highway accidents accounted for 47 of the 70 dead, an increase of 10 over the 37 dead from this cause by Sunday midnight, when the weekend ended for many people.

Ontario, Quebec and Saskatchewan contributed most heavily to the toll.

A total of 22 were killed in Ontario, 16 of them in traffic accidents; three by drowning and three in miscellaneous accidents.

Quebec had 19 deaths, 13 in traffic and four by drowning and eight died in Saskatchewan, five of them on the highways.

Alberta and Nova Scotia each had seven violent deaths; with traffic killing five in the former and three in the latter. Manitoba had three deaths—all in traffic—as did British Columbia, where one died on the highway. New

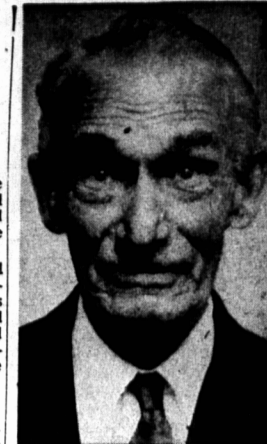
Find Body of Air Passenger

BAGHDAD, Iraq (Reuters) — Police Monday found the broken body of 32-year-old Jack Rodney Nash, an American tourist sucked to his death through the shattered window of an airliner two nights ago.

Nash, from Memphis, Tenn., fell 18,000 feet to his death when the window broke and air pressure forced him out of the Super Constellation. The accident occurred over the Turkey-Iraq border on a flight from Baghdad to Istanbul. His body was found 35 miles from the oil refinery town of Kirkuk.

Announce New Senior Naval Officer Afloat

OTTAWA (CP) — Commodore Jeffrey V. Brock, DSO, DSC, 43, of Vancouver and Winnipeg will become Senior Canadian Naval Officer Afloat (Atlantic), effective June 17, naval headquarters announced Friday.

He will be succeeded May 13 as naval member of the Canadian joint staff in London by Capt. Paul D. Taylor, DSC, 46, of Victoria, now commander of the destroyer escort Crescent and of the Second Canadian Escort Squadron based at Esquimalt, B.C.

As commander of the Atlantic fleet at sea, Commodore Brock probably will make his headquarters in the new aircraft carrier Bonaventure.

Commodore Brock joined the navy in 1934. He commanded several anti-submarine vessels during the Second World War and rose to become senior officer of escort groups. He was awarded the Dis-

tinguished Service Cross for outstanding services in anti-submarine operations.

He commanded the destroyer escort Cayuga during her first tour of duty in Korea in 1953 and later held the additional appointment of commander of Canadian destroyers in the Far East. He won the Distinguished Service Order for his services in the Korean war.

Commodore Brock was appointed to the Canadian joint staff in London in 1953.

Capt. Taylor, a schoolmaster in Victoria before the Second World War, joined the navy in 1940 and later rose to command minesweepers, corvettes and frigates.

He commanded the destroyer escort Sioux during two tours of duty in Korea and was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross and the United States Legion of Merit. He was appointed commander of the Second Canadian Escort Squadron in August, 1955.

Newsman Sees Text Of Note In Norman Suicide

OTTAWA (CP)—This correspondent has been permitted to see the unpublished text of the note written by Canadian ambassador Norman to Swedish minister Eng before he jumped to his death from Eng's seventh-floor quarters in Cairo.

While he has not been permitted to have the text published, he is able to say that it contains no statement of Mr. Norman's reasons for suicide, nor any reference to the fact that he did not state those reasons.

The New York Daily News last Thursday published a purported text of the note containing the words: "... I cannot bring myself to tell you the true reasons that impel me to commit suicide."

The suggestion was made in some quarters that Mr. Norman's note implied there was some other reason for his suicide than the evidence before the U.S. Senate sub-committee on internal security that he had been a Communist.

NO SIMILARITY
The text of the note as seen by this correspondent contains no reference similar or in any way related to that published by the News.

The Canadian government described the News version of the text as a "complete fabrication." The news countered that any variations in wording were due to translation back into English from an Arabic translation made by the Egyptian police.

The News commented: "The Canadian government has not seen fit to offer its own version of Norman's letters in support of its claim of fabrication."

Monday this correspondent, at his own request and with the approval of External Affairs Minister Pearson, was permitted to see the text of the Eng note as cabled from Cairo to Ottawa. He was not permitted to see the second note, to Mrs. Norman, of which the News also published a purported text.

The Eng note contained 22 words including the initials of the ambassador. The Daily News version contained 77 words including the

ambassador's surname at the end.

The Daily News version was: "I wanted to spend some time with you during these last few days of my life and tell you what has been worrying me but am afraid that even in this letter I cannot bring myself to tell you the true reasons that impel me to commit suicide."

"I have decided to die near your home. I know this may cause you some trouble and I am sorry but you are my best friend. Farewell, Sincerely, Norman."

The only words in this version that appear also in the official text are "I" and "but."

FIRST REPORTS TRUE
First reports from Cairo said the note to Mr. Eng asked his forgiveness for using the Swedish embassy. That was true.

Departmental officials aid the note left for Mrs. Norman was so strictly personal that it will not be made public unless it is with her approval. Mrs. Norman is en route to Canada. Nor is it the intention to publish the text of the Eng note which was also personal.

Officials said, however, that the News version of the note to Mrs. Norman was just as much at variance with their facts as was the Eng note version.

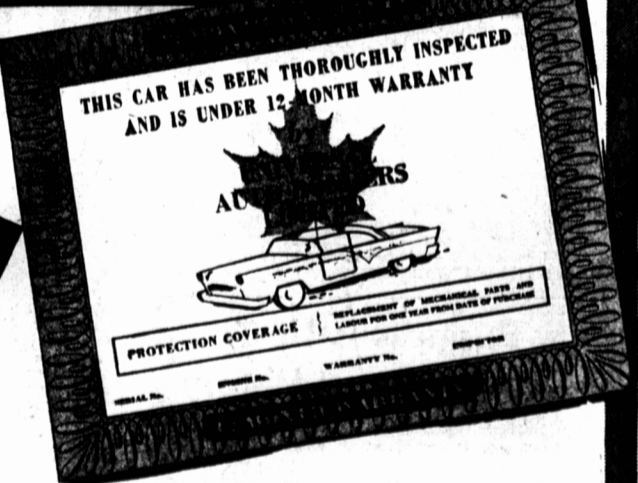
