LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

THE FIRST CARGO.—A Clarke's Harbor despatch of the 15th says: The first cargo to reach here this fall from Prince Edward Island was by the schooner Freddie M. Reynolds, Captain Crowell which arrived on Saturday.

FOOTBALL FATALITIES.—It is claimed by many persons that football is the deadliest sport known in any civilized country. The list for the present season shows eight players killed, seventeen maimed for life, and over one hundred badly injured.

LAST SHIPMENT.—Mr. S. H. Jones shipped about two hundred lambs from Summerside yesterday morning. This will be Mr. Jones last shipment from that port this season. While in Summerside Mr. Jones shipped in all 7544 sheep and lambs, and 2905 geese, the value of which was \$15,833. They were for the American market.

HAS SEEN SIX GENERATIONS.—Mr. James Forbes, of Legere corner, has the unusual distinction of having seen six generations of his family, viz. his great-grandmother, grandmother, mother, himself, children, and grandchildren, there being eleven of the latter. Mr. Forbes is not an old man either, being but 62 years of age, and thinks this is a record that would be hard to beat.—Moncton Times.

THEATRICAL.—The Ethel-Lillian Tucker Company, supported by Charles C. Vaught's Comedy Company, will open a week's engagement in St. John on Monday evening. "Led Astray" will be the opening bill. During the engagement they will play six nights and five matinees.

THE OLD LOG SCHOOLHOUSE.—Mr. D. J. McLeod, Superintendent of Education, delivered his highly interesting and instructive lecture on "The Old Log Schoolhouse" in the schoolroom of the Baptist Church last night. There was a good audience present, and the keenest interest was manifested. The vote of thanks at the close was moved by Mr. J. P. Gordon seconded by Mr. A. W. Sterns, and supported by Mr. F. W. L. Moore.

BARN DESTROYED.—The Halifax Herald reports that Alexander McDonald, of Arasig, suffered the destruction of his barn, with all its contents, including his crops for this season, under every peculiar circumstances. Mr. McDonald was endeavouring to hang the barn door, and the auger with which he was making a hole in the post for a bolt was too small. He, therefore, heated the bolt and drove it into the wood, causing a fire, which immediately communicated with the hay and destroyed the building and contents.

SPARKEY GETS THE DECISION.—According to a despatch from San Francisco, Tom Sharkey has won another questionable battle, his victim this time being old Joe Goddard. The fight, which was scheduled for 20 rounds, terminated in the sixth when Sharkey, after landing a swift right on Goddard's jaw, rushed at his man and knocked him to the floor, literally by force of impact, falling heavily upon him. Goddard's head struck the canvas, which dazed him. He arose at the end of three seconds and staggered to the ropes. Amid great confusion McArthur awarded the fight to Sharkey.

IS THE GUARDIAN TELLING THE TRUTH?

Sir,—In this morning's Guardian the following statement is made: "The late Provincial Government in Quebec made its stand in the provincial election on the principle of separate schools for Manitoba, etc."

So far as the English press of Quebec goes, and having carefully followed that campaign by reading the speeches and utterances of Hon. Mr. Flynn and the other leaders, I never saw one statement from them to justify the Guardian's statement. On the contrary, Mr. Flynn publicly refused the introduction of the Manitoba School issue into the campaign.

The Conservative party in Quebec cannot be charged with raising race and religious cries. They refused to take up the Riel cry, which was taken up by the Liberals. That cry was popular and the Liberals swept the Conservatives from office on it.

My object, however, is to ask the Guardian to re-produce one speech, or part of a speech, from Hon. Mr. Flynn, to prove the statement quoted.

The fact is that statement is absolutely false, and the Editor knows it to be so; and as a Protestant, I don't think our views and positions on any question require falsehood to maintain them. The Guardian's editor is behind the times. He should go to Newfoundland.
