TO THE EDITOR OF THE EXAMINER.

The importance of the Fisheries in the waters surrounding this Island must be apparent to every thinking man. That an exhaustless mine of wealth lies in our very doors, no one can deny.

Until late years, however, these advantages appear to have been almost entirely overlooked by the capitalists. It was left to settlers of other countries—the United States for instance—to show the people of this Island what could be done in the fishing business.

In order to partly counteract the effect of the American duty, a tonnage of fifty cents per ton was levied on American vessels fishing within the three mile line.

During the last session of our Legislature a numerous petition was presented to that body, praying for a Bounty on Mackerel, to enable our people to carry on the business with profit to themselves.

But I may, perhaps, be trespassing too much upon your space; and as I may have again to ask your indulgence, I must be careful not to offend. Hoping that my few desultory remarks may be productive of some good.

An earnest effort will, as far as possible, be made by the Government to effect a Loan, in order to meet demands for the purchase of Lands. The amendment of the Education Act will be attempted in the next Session, so far as the improvement in the Teachers' salaries is concerned; and, I trust, that this desirable object may, by the exercise of due economy in other respects, be effected without any additional taxation being required.

I renew my engagement to do all I can to advance your local interests, and to improve and increase your means of communication both by sea and land; and if any circumstances shall prevent my accomplishing all I can, or if you may desire, I shall be glad to accept of office or of any other post which you may see fit to offer me.
