Bligh Estate Is Valued At \$130,000

HALIFAX (CP)—The estate of Mrs. Ethelind Bligh, widow of the last president of the Nova Scotia legislative council, is valued at about \$130,000 in her will entered for probate Wednesday. She died here July 29.

Bequests include \$5,000 to Dalhousie University, \$3,500 to Acadia University, \$1,000 to the Billtown, N.S., Baptist Church, and \$1,000 to the United Church retired clergymen's fund.

Her husband, Frederick P. Bligh, a former Halifax mayor, was legislative council president when that body was abolished about 30 years ago.

United Church Clergyman Dies

HUNTSVILLE, Ont. (CP) - Rev. Frank M. Milligan, father of concert baritone James Milligan who now is in England, died Wednesday in the Red Cross Hospital here. He was 70.

Born in Saint John N.B., he was a United Church of Canada minister for 40 years, serving 12 years in the Maritimes as a religious education field secretary and a further 14 years in Saskatchewan in similar work.

Survivors include his widow, the former Josephine MacDonald of Cape Breton, N.S.

GIFT OF FLOUR - The United States has offered Ceylon a gift of up to 20,000 tons of flour a year. Prime Minister Solomon Bandaranaike announced Wednesday. Bandaranaike said the value of the gift was about seven to eight million rupees (about \$1,500,000).

Former Hitler Foreign Minister Died On Monday

STUTTGART, West Germany (Reuters)—Baron Konstantin von Neurath, once Hitler's foreign minister, died Monday night at Enzweihingen, near here. He was 82. He was the first of seven major Nazi war criminals to be released from Spandau prison in November, 1954. He returned to his estate to a welcome of chiming church bells, offerings of flower garlands and congratulatory messages. Villagers gathered to greet him.

Since then he has lived quietly, shunning people and publicity. At the Nuernberg war crimes tribunal he was sentenced to 15 years imprisonment—to end what had once been reckoned a brilliant diplomatic career as a convicted criminal in solitary confinement.

In 1954, he suffered a severe heart attack from which he never fully recovered. He was crippled and partially blind. As a result, after serving more than nine years of his sentence he was released following a Soviet proposal accepted by the Western powers.

Tobacco Grant For Lung Cancer Research

TORONTO (CP)—The National Cancer Institute of Canada announced Wednesday that \$100,000 has been received from the Canadian tobacco industry for research into lung cancer.

The contribution raises to \$200,000 a fund established by the Canadian tobacco industry in 1954.
