Let's Talk It Over

We make much of the use of the word "tolerance" in speaking of what our attitude should be towards religions, races, and ideologies differing from ours. Someone recently remarked that it is not tolerance we should have for these beliefs, but appreciation. A very apt remark, we should say.

Tolerance is, of course, a great improvement over the rampant intolerance that blighted people's lives in the Middle Ages; the dark days when free expression of opinion was permitted only to those in power. But tolerance is only a half-way house to the desired goal. Tolerance can be as cold as charity. It is a negative quality which promises little more than a guarantee against antagonistic action.

Appreciation is a much warmer, friendlier word. It can be indulged in fully, and yet stop short of conversation. We can appreciate our fellow man's opinions, and yet not agree with them. Appreciation is built on a background of knowledge. The more you know of the other fellow's beliefs, the more you can appreciate, without necessarily accepting them.

Free enterprise and free competition among our business establishments is the life blood of our democracy. We like to think of the competition between two business houses of similar merchandise as being like a game of baseball where every legitimate effort and ruse are employed to finish out in front. But it is a friendly game, too. If one firm suffers some mishap which threatens to undermine its existence, often its rival will go to the rescue. Then when everything is straightened out, the battle goes on. When a new business starts up (a potential rival), we like the way the existing establishments congratulate the new firm (by means of advertisements), and wish it success. It all goes to prove that, for the most part, competition is not the cut-throat it is sometimes made out to be, but a game of wits played according to the rules of fairplay. There are naturally exceptions, but they only prove the rule.

Tass Recalls Ottawa Agent

OTTAWA, (CP)—Tass, the official Russian news agency, has recalled its Ottawa correspondent, Ivan V. Tsvetkov, 35, informed the parliament's press gallery Wednesday that he has been ordered back to Russia. He has been a member of the gallery since last September when he was able to satisfy members who had raised objections to his membership application in March, 1953.

His original application was rejected by a general meeting of the 70-odd members of the gallery on grounds that Mr. Tsvetkov came to Canada on a diplomatic passport and was attached to the Russian embassy here. Later, he obtained a non-diplomatic passport and was accepted as a gallery member.

Tass correspondents have been regarded with some suspicion since a royal commission disclosed that a Tass correspondent, Nikolai Zhevelov, was attached to a wartime Russian spy ring. This was the ring exposed by Igor Gouzenko, Russian embassy cipher clerk who sought asylum in Canada in 1945.

NKVD Agent

Gouzenko recently told a United States internal security sub-committee that Zhevelov's colleague, Nicolai Afanasiev, was an undercover agent for the NKVD, the Russian secret police. Zhevelov, known as "Big Nick", returned to Russia in September, 1945, leaving behind Afanasiev who was known as "Little Nick". Afanasiev remained some months after the disclosure in February, 1946, of the spy ring and then left Canada.

Tass was unrepresented in the parliamentary press gallery until 1948 when Simon Scherbatykh became a member. Scherbatykh was succeeded by Arcadi Ogorodnikov who was recalled to Russia last year.
