Says Pearson Claim 'Crazy'
SYRACUSE, N.Y. (CP)—J. H. DeFuria of nearby Dewitt, N.Y., said Friday that Canada's Opposition Leader Pearson was "crazy" in his claim that the destination of Canadian surplus fighter planes bought by DeFuria was being kept secret.
DeFuria, president of the Dewitt Manufacturing Corporation in that Syracuse suburb, was named in the House of Commons at Ottawa in a question exchange between Pearson and Prime Minister Diefenbaker.

Wants Public To Oppose Curtailing Train Service

MONTREAL (CP) — A railway union official has urged the public to oppose the CNR bid to curtail its trans-continental train service for the winter.
L. C. Malone, vice-president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, said an aroused public could protest to the board of transport commissioners to have the railway revoke its decision.
Both he and W. E. Gamble of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers (CLC) expressed serious concern over the loss of jobs for railway workers because of the cut.
The railway move means that eight trains—four eastbound and four westbound—will be withdrawn Oct. 26 from the Montreal-Vancouver run. Decision to eliminate the CNR's Continental was made after a two-year survey of traffic movements showed a sharp decrease in winter passengers.
The Continental will be restored during the peak June-September period of traffic, the railway said. During the winter, the Super-Continental will make extra stops to fill gaps left by withdrawal of the slower Continental service. Eight trains—four eastbound and four westbound—are used in the Super-Continental service.
CNR President Donald Gordon has called passenger service the "big headache of the railway business."
"I regret to say that the more passenger trains we get to run, the more money we lose in any circumstances," Mr. Gordon told the Senate committee on transport and communications in Ottawa a last month.
He indicated during the Ottawa questioning the railway may switch its thinking from trans-continental runs to providing fast in-
