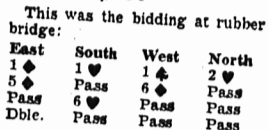
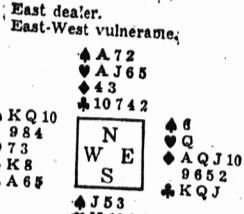


Contract Bridge
