Today 6.40 o'clock train time is 7 o'clock town time. No, no"—and he smiles patronizingly—"the train always leaves at the same hour; our trains never change—it is the time that alters itself, not the train, messieurs!"

We sought the telegraph office.

"To the steamer agent to Jaffa," we dictated. "Missed train. Cancel passage on boat for Egypt. Wire date of next sailing for Port Said."

This was turned into flowery Turkish and sent. A reply came soon.

"Plenty of time. Your boat will wait till tomorrow afternoon, for the water is so rough she cannot land her passengers and cargo today. Plenty of time if you take the train tomorrow."—Atlantic Monthly.

CELERY PLANTS.

If the celery plants in the frames or seed beds look yellow, it is evidence of the need of nitrogen. Try nitrate of soda. Scatter it quite freely and water, avoiding touching the plants with the fertilizer. A much darker color will appear in a day or two.

Closing Yesterday of West Kent School

At West Kent the closing exercises were well attended and the annual programme, already published in The Guardian, was capably carried out. School Trustee Mr. C.H.B. Longworth presided and there were also on the platform His Worship Mayor Jenkins, Mr. Henry Smith, chairman of the School Board, Rev. H. D. Raymond, Rev. Wm. Orr Mulligan, Hon. F. J. Nash, Principal Wm. Moran of the U.C.C., Major T. Edgar MacNutt, Mrs. E.B. MacCreedy, Mr. J. P. Gordon, Trustee and Superintendent of Education Rogers.

After the presentation of diplomas, prizes, etc. the Cadet Cup won this year by the school was presented to Cadet Captain Lorne Wedlock by Major MacNutt who highly complimented the boys upon their trophy. He also commended Earl James, commander of No. 2 Platoon, for the splendid showing made and presented with pleasure the trophy donated by himself for the efficient work done.

Principal Johnson in his report referred to the enrollment of 271 boys and 86 girls, a maximum of 457 pupils. The various school activities have as usual been taken up and for the most part carried on with commendable zeal during the year. The work of the pupils on the whole satisfactory and compares favorably with that of past years. He urged that parents during the ensuing year co-operate more earnestly than heretofore with the teachers in the carrying along of school work.

The highest prize to be gained in the final year in the public schools course is the Governor General's medal which has been won by Harry Foster, who worked faithfully through the year and deserves the greatest praise for his scholastic attainments. He had close competitors, namely: Helen Jamieson, Cathleen Bourke, Lorne Wedlock, Ruth Heartz and Anna McDougall.

Mr. Johnson spoke of the importance of the teaching of music, of which branch Miss McDougall and Miss Taylor are the capable instructors. He referred also to the importance of English composition, the study of which has been given such an impetus recently through the prizes offered by such local societies as Daughters of the Empire and the Life Underwriters' Association. He spoke of the benefits of physical training under the capable direction of Mr. Campbell, director of athletics, and Major MacNutt, Cadet Instructor. The International Scholastic School Sports and the work of Cadet instruction were also touched upon.

Of the public functions held during the year Mr. Johnson referred particularly to the celebration of Armistice Day, No. 11 and to the visit of inspection by His Worship Mayor Jenkins together with the School Trustees.

Prince Street School Closing Exercises

A large number of citizens were present at the closing exercises of Prince Street School held yesterday morning. School Trustee Dr. S. R. Jenkins presided. The singing by the pupils was a feature of the exercises and was of the usual high class order, reflecting great credit upon the teachers in charge of the music, Miss Watson and Miss Tait.

Principal Seaman in his report on the year's work referred to the excellent record made by pupils of last year in the entrance examinations of Prince of Wales College, one of the number having led the province. He also referred to the provision being made for increased accommodation in the school and commended the members of the teaching staff on their loyalty, support and earnest efforts to promote the best interests of the pupils. He remarked upon the excellent service that is being rendered the city by our Board of School Trustees and also expressed the hope that the work of medical examination now being carried on by the Red Cross Society would be continued. To this end it would be necessary for the educational authorities to assume responsibility for the work as he understood it could not be much longer carried on by the Red Cross. He concluded by thanking the donors of the prizes so thoughtfully contributed and heartily wished the teachers and pupils an enjoyable holiday.
