Island Man Already Has A Distinguished Career

Graeme Wyatt Boswall, son of the late Mr. George L. Boswall of Frenchfort, and Mrs. Boswall, will be granted the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in Agricultural Chemistry at the May 29th convocation of McGill University. The subject of his thesis was "Extraction and Identification of Organic Phosphorus Compounds of Soils."

Mr. Boswall entered P. W. C. from Dunstaffnage school in 1943 with a Bell scholarship, and upon graduation in 1945 was winner of the Anderson prize for Science. He was granted the degree of Bachelor of Science with honors in Chemistry by Acadia University in 1947, and received the degree of Master of Science from Macdonald College of McGill University in 1949.

He was employed by Dominion Oilcloth and Linoleum in Montreal until receiving an appointment to the Dominion Experimental Station in Charlottetown, where he worked until his return to Macdonald College in 1955. Mr. Boswall is now employed as a project leader on the research staff of the Imperial Tobacco Company of Canada Limited in Montreal.

Mr. Boswall is a member of Victoria Lodge A.F. and A.M. in Charlottetown and belonged to Centennial Y's Men's Club when living here. He is married to the former Alberta Bryant of Charlottetown and has two children, Donald and Anne-Louise. Mr. and Mrs. Boswall now live in Valois, P.Q.
