**THE MONTICELLO DISTASTER.**

To the Editor of the Globe:

Dear Sir,—The loss of the Monticello is one more evidence of official neglect. For years past the writer has been drumming into the official ear the fact that a more vigorous inspection of ships and their better equipment were necessary. The Monticello was known to be a weak, old ship; her boats were poor and antiquated, yet she was allowed to ply on virtually an ocean route and carry passengers. Had she been provided with efficient boats the major part of the crew and passengers could have been saved. On the same day that she foundered two steamers arrived at Yarmouth, her port of destination, and there is nothing on record that either had any difficulty in reaching port. Some years ago I devised a method of construction and equipment by which boats are practically made unsinkable. I waited personally on the minister at Ottawa. He promised to give the subject his careful consideration. That was over four years ago. I have since by letter entreated him to take action, but virtually nothing has been done. The present member for St John city was then Minister of Railways. My railroad ticket had run out owing to my stop over at Ottawa. The minister refused to extend it, consequently I was out the railroad fare, Ottawa to St. John, which I could have saved had I come through from Toronto direct instead of stopping off at Ottawa to plead the cause of humanity. My patents on these improvements have long since run out and I cannot profit by the adoption of these improvements now.
