2 Prince C. Men Rescued In Wake Of Fire At Sea



One Survivor Suffers From Burns And Shock

Hope was abandoned last night for Leslie M. Hunter, 34, and Clifford Vincent Doucette, 26, of Minnigahish when they could not be found after being rescued from their burning boat in the Northumberland Strait late Saturday.

A third man, Calvin Costain, about 20, also of Minnigahish, is suffering from first degree burns about his face and severe shock sustained in the same incident.

He was treated in the Western Hospital at Alberton but insisted later Sunday on returning to his home.

An air and sea search for the missing man was abandoned last night after two deck boards, used by the pair to keep themselves afloat, drifted ashore. The man, presumed drowned, had jumped overboard from the fishing boat Saturday after some gasoline cans caught fire as they were on their way home for the weekend. They had left Minnigahish, N.S. where they had been fishing scallops all week.

BOAT SIGHTED
The boat, the Dean H, owned by Hunter, was sighted Sunday morning about 7 o'clock a mile west of Minnigahish. When she did not come in to show local fishermen including Ingham Costain, father of the injured man, went out to investigate.

"They found the younger Costain lying in the bottom of the boat, the inside of which was badly burned. The boat was half filled with water and no fire remained.

The injured Costain told his rescuers how the fire had started and that Hunter and Doucette had taken deck boards and jumped into the water to get away from the flames. There were no life jackets on the boat.

SEARCH ORGANIZED
Costain was rushed to the Western Hospital and a search was organized for the other two men. An RCMP Dakota from Greenwood, N.S., and a Navy Tracer aircraft, scoured the area Sunday. They were assisted by three Dept. of Fisheries vessels, most of the fishing boats from Minnigahish and some from St. John's Point and Cape Wolf. The search was officially abandoned yesterday when no traces could be found of the two men and the deck boards were discovered, dimming hopes still fire as they were on their way home for the weekend. They had left Minnigahish, N.S. where they had been fishing scallops all week.

But he was the third fire on board a boat that carried Calvin Costain. On one of these occasions he had been badly burned.

Both Doucette and Hunter, who are brothers-in-law, have large families. Hunter has a wife and six children while Doucette and his wife have eight children.

Interest Rates Boosted

OTTAWA (CP)—The Bank of Canada announced Sunday that its lending rates has been increased to four per cent from 3 1/2, effective immediately.

The bank rate has been 2 1/2 per cent since May 6. The rate is the country's leading indicator of the cost of credit generally.

Louis Risminsky, governor of the Bank of Canada, described the change in the rate "as a technical adjustment related to the change in uncertainty and upward pressure on interest rates which had developed in Canadian securities markets during the last few weeks."

Arlene Dies East Of Nfld.

HALIFAX (CP) — Arlene is dead. The season's first hurricane, which 300 miles of Newfoundland Sunday — the closest it came to any part of Canada — headed further out in the Atlantic and died 350 miles east of Sander, Nfld.

The weather office in Halifax said Sunday night Arlene had become just a "low centre" over waters. The centre was moving north-northeast at 15 knots late Sunday and winds from it were only 20 knots.

Arlene was rather gentle as hurricanes go. She whipped over Bermuda packing winds of 92 knots Friday but caused little damage. No injuries were reported.

Winds diminished gradually as the storm headed eastward.

Stes Kefauver Dies Following Heart Attack

WASHINGTON AP — Rupture of the main heart artery early Sunday ended the life of Senator Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, a leader among the Senate's liberal Democrats, a crusader against crime and monopoly and a former presidential aspirant.

He drove to the naval hospital in suburban Bethesda for a checkup and his office announced Friday that he had suffered a mild heart attack and would be kept in bed for three weeks.

Funeral services will be held at the family cemetery in Madisonville, Tenn., on Tuesday. He is survived by his widow, the former Miss Nancy Patterson, 57, and three daughters, and a son.

Chaput Ends 33-Day Fast

MONTREAL (CP) — Marcel Chaput, head of the Parti Republicain du Quebec ended a 33-day fast Saturday after his party claimed success in a drive for \$100,000.

The separatist party leader had said he would fast until the separatist party received that amount. Donations were in cash and in goods.

The fast ended Saturday night at 7:30 p.m. when an unidentified woman appeared at the party's midtown Montreal headquarters and asked how much money was required to reach the objective, the party said.

Told that \$100,000 was required, she wrote a cheque for that amount.

Sunday, under the advice of doctors, Dr. Chaput was eating only light foods and will not be able to resume his normal diet for some days.

Mrs. Chaput said her husband had lost 40 pounds during his fast. He weighed 245 pounds at the start.

'LOVE' BANNED AT BIG AIRPORT

MANCHESTER, England (Reuters) — "Love" was outlawed Sunday at Manchester International Airport.

Officials directed airport waitresses and barmaids to stop addressing customers as "love" and call them "sir" or "madam" instead.

Edward Hoole, in charge of the airport's bars and restaurants, explained:

"We realize that the term 'love' is widely used in the north but we cannot run the risk of passengers or visitors from overseas, who are not familiar with the term, being offended."

JFK, Small Daughter Visit Mrs. Kennedy

It was the first time Caroline, who will be six in November, had seen her mother since the First Lady was taken from a family outing by helicopter for the birth of a child that lived less than 40 hours.

The visit obviously was a happy one. The father and daughter emerged 45 minutes later, with small but obvious smiles on their faces.

Boy Is Killed By Old Cannon

BELL ISLAND, Nfld. (CP) — Walter Fowler, 10, died Sunday after being struck on the head by an abandoned cannon on this island in Newfoundland's Conception Bay.

The boy was struck by the weapon as it was turned on its swivel by a group of companions at play.

The cannon was installed on a high bluff overlooking the bay for defence purposes during the Second World War.

38 Persons Hospitalized After Crop-Dusting Mishap

TOPPENISH, Wash. (AP) — "I notified this kind of white dust sort of hazing near the ground, so I went out of my shed and there on the ground were two of my belted deer."

"The other three men were coughing and heaving, dropping and getting up in a minute or two I started to choke and couldn't hardly breathe."

This was how the Rev. Ray Cerna, 51, described the start of a freak crop-dusting mishap that sent 38 men, women and children to hospital Sunday night after exposure to a poisonous insecticide.

Only four were kept overnight — Cerna, his son Tony, 19, Tony's seven-month-old daughter, Sonya, and another rancher Pedro Balla, 85. They were released Sunday and doctors said none suffered any lasting harm.

Hoover Marks 89th Birthday

NEW YORK (AP) — Former President Herbert Hoover, well known for a comeback from a serious illness, celebrated his 89th birthday Saturday.

Orillia Jail Overflows After Festival Weekend

ORILLIA, Ont. (CP)—Vandalism and drinking teenagers marred the third annual Maritime Folk Festival here Saturday night.

Police Chief E. W. McElvaine said "camera men and sleeping bags torn apart, clothing scattered over lawns and cars broken into and ransacked."

Police said there were a number of arrests.

Some 20,000 persons jammed the town after a park, 12 miles out of town, which was supposed to house the festival visitors, was filled at 8 p. m. Saturday.

They slept in cars, tents, on private lawns, in fields and ditches. Some didn't sleep at all.

WORMEN ARE SEEN BIG 'WEEK' OPENS TODAY

Livestock Entries Arrive For Start Of Exhibition

The Provincial Exhibition does not get underway until today, when horses will be judged, but activity around the Big Coliseum, horse and cattle and other livestock and poultry barns yesterday was more on the scale of a mid-week attendance than a mere preliminary date, available in no overall figure numbers at least near-record, numbers are indicated, as one fair spokesman said the entries are about the same as a year ago, which was classed as an all-time record.

Visitors swarmed over the grounds most of the day, and fair directors are looking to the weather as the only factor that could curtail the success of the show.

BURNS FILLED
The cattle barns are filled with some of the Island's best pedigreed livestock are getting trimmed up for their appearance in the competitive rings in the afternoon.

The livestock part of the show can go on independent of weather conditions, because of the top notch facilities available. Horses and cattle will be shown in the spacious Coliseum. And the sheep viewing facilities from the seating portions. All the splayed and swine are also shown under the shelter of a roof.

Holstein cattle top the livestock entry list with more than 200 separate entries, apart from the entries in the gel-of-site and heifers.

Ayrshires have approximately 170 entered, the Jerseys have more than 140 and Guernseys also have a good showing.

There are approximately 250 beef cattle entered with the Scotch Shorthorns leading the way with more than 80.

Canada's Population Nearing 9 Million

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's population is expected to reach 9,000,000 by Oct. 1, the bureau of statistics reported today.

The population at July 1 was estimated at 18,292,000, an increase of 258,000 in one year and 690,000 more than in the June 1, 1961, census.

Population growth was about 1.8 per cent in the first three months of 1963 and 2.0 in the second quarter.

Ontario had the largest numerical increase in population in the year preceding July 1, with a 1.7 per cent growth rate. Quebec added 20,000 residents with a growth rate of 1.8 per cent.

The Lady Is A Champion

Dorothy Houston of Earlton, Ont. won the ladies championship for the second year in a row at the National championship. As well as his trophy, he picked up \$1,000 in prize money. Officials estimated that 10,000 people crowded into Canada's fiddling capital to see and hear the record 115 entries.

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
