HIS LORDSHIP BISHOP MCINTYRE completed his confirmation tour in this Province, by confirming one hundred and eighty-five persons in St. Dunstan's Cathedral, yesterday. During the tour His Lordship confirmed one thousand eight hundred and nine persons.

A good audience greeted Rev. Mr. Neal at the Christian Meeting House, Upper Great George street, yesterday afternoon. The subject—"The unpardonable sin; or, sin against the Holy Ghost, what is it? How committed,"—was presented in a logical and thorough manner, and elicited marked attention. The subject for this evening's discourse is "Prophecy." The public is most cordially invited. CANADIAN FURNITURE FOR ENGLAND.—The *St. John News* says: while our *Telegraph* sighs for a sight of the "marts" of St. John again filled with United States, English, and even "Continental" furniture, one of the richest men in England is ordering Canadian furniture for his English home. Hay & Co., of Toronto, have manufactured a \$3,000 set of dining-room furniture for Mr. Bass, the English brewer.

We are pleased to see that the Dominion Government is about to remove the hull of the "Emigrant," which occupies such a dangerous position on the edge of the channel opposite Connolly's Wharf. We learn that Mr. H. Mutch has been awarded the contract for performing the work, and that he intends to commence operations on arrival of the divers.

THAT Moncton morality is not so bad as it might be, is shown by the fact that a lady who bought \$12 worth of goods on July 12th, and after taking considerable wear out of them, brought them back a few days ago, and taking \$1 from a roll of bills, offered it as an equivalent. The equivalent being refused, she promised to pay in two or three days. It is feared that the promise is worth less than the dollar. —Despatch.

The writs for the return of a member to represent the First District of Prince County in the House of Assembly, have been issued. Nomination day will be Friday, the 12th inst., and polling day Friday, the 19th. The *Progress* says Mr. J. F. White will probably be a candidate. He claims to be a supporter for the present Government. Several other gentlemen have been mentioned as seeking to serve their country.

A CORRESPONDENT remarks:—"Having had occasion to walk near one of the most public docks in the city on Sunday, I was witness to a most disgraceful scene. There, in the brightness of day, a crowd of persons was engaged in the pleasant practise of swimming, or what I would rather call washing themselves. Goodness knows some of them had need of such a process, and as a citizen, I would be willing to make all reasonable concessions in their favor, provided they sought a more secluded place than Connolly's Wharf at 2.30 of a Sunday afternoon."

JOSEPH GALLANT and four others appeared before Theoph. DesBrisay, Alex. Hayden and Peter McGowan, Esqrs., J. P.s., on Saturday last on complaint of Robert Bullman, for assault. Mr. Peters appeared for the plaintiff, and Messrs. Sullivan and Fitzgerald for the defendants. The facts of the case are: That on the day of the Governor-General's reception at Rustico, the plaintiff and his brother rode through an arch which was erected by the sons of Acadia. The defendants being members of the Reception Committee, forbade the plaintiff driving through the arch, but they drove through in defiance. When they returned in the evening the horse was seized by the committee, beaten with sticks, it is asserted, and the drivers were pulled from the sulky and ill-used. The object of forbidding the plaintiff's driving through the arch is supposed to be an old grudge between the parties concerned. After examining several witnesses the case was adjourned till Saturday next.

The *Fredericton Star* has the following description of Fredericton:—"Fredericton is the capital of New Brunswick, and has a population of nearly 6,000 souls (and many cows). It is situated on the right bank of the River John, 84 miles from the city of St. John. In it the Local Legislature meets every year to make local laws for the people. The inhabitants as a rule are white, and fairly civilized, enjoying free schools and Christian training and all that kind of thing. It is true the name of the city is not painted anywhere in letters on any corner of it; but for all that people call it Fredericton, and we are willing to let it go at that."

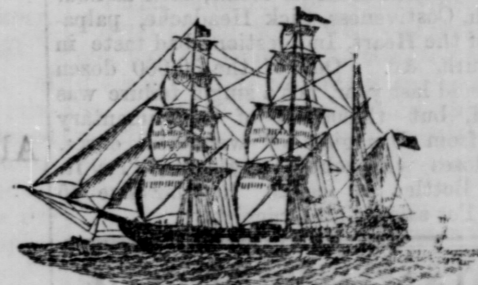
