

Urges All N.Y. Members Resign From Boxing Guild

NEW YORK (AP)—The Boxing Guild of New York Wednesday night recommended that all its members licensed in New York resign from the organization, but refused to surrender completely to Julius Helfand, chairman of the New York state athletic commission.

In a 16-minute meeting, the guild said it recognized the irreparable damage that would be imposed on its members if their licenses were revoked.

Helfand has fixed Monday, Jan. 14, as the date for managers to divorce themselves from the local guild or lose their licenses.

Balance Necessary For A Successful League

Already rolling along at the top of the Island Hockey League the Basilio Youth Club have further strengthened their team with the addition of former Bridgewater Hawk, MacLure. The grapevine also has it that the B.Y.C. will be having first call on the services of Cecil Buddy Dowling if and when he returns from the now defunct Hawks. We heard Tuesday that Buddy would be remaining in Bridgewater as a minor league head coach but apparently there is some chance of his returning to Charlottetown.

Now we have to stump such fine initiative on the part of the youth club but personally we think that if any team should get the services of Dowling it should be none other than the crippled Montague Primroses. It was quite evident in the B.Y.C.-Primrose game Tuesday night that the Primroses are a badly understaffed squad. Just where they can pick up a few players of senior B quality is anybody's guess but when one is available we think the league heads should do all in their power to make sure he gets to the team that needs him most.

What the Primroses need more than anything is a couple of forwards, preferably ones who can shoot a few goals. In their last three games the Primroses have scored only 7 times which in this free-wheeling, high-scoring

league is far below par. Of those 7 goals Dave MacLeod and Billy Hughes have contributed. In their first three games when they had the services of Apps Arsenault and Phil McGee the Primroses hit home 24 times. Arsenault and McGee accounted for exactly half this total.

There are a lot of conditions that can cause fans to lose interest in a hockey or any other kind of league. Not the least of these is a situation in which there is one team either too strong or one team too weak for the class of competition. We think that the youth club is plenty strong now and at the moment Montague is just a little on the weak side. We would hate to see the league lose the balance it had in the early game merely because one team is in need of a couple of players.

Maybe we are blowing the whistle too soon. Montague did show very well in their game against the Flyers but nevertheless they were beaten 10-3 and 11-3 by the B.Y.C. and the scores are quite indicative of the margin of play held by the B.Y.C. in both those clashes. Also since the game Tuesday night the B.Y.C. has released Joe Coyle to play with Montague. Joe will add a lot of heat to the blue-line corps but the Primroses could still use a couple of good forwards. It is the good forwards that are general that they get them if they are available.

Campbell Sets 250 MPH Target

LONDON (AP)—World water speed king Donald Campbell Wednesday set himself a new target—250 miles an hour in his jet-propelled speedboat Bluebird.

"We believe it is possible to reach that speed on water," he said. "There are some who say we are silly to try, but I don't think so."

The dare-devil Briton said it is not yet certain where he would make his new speed attempt. It would be in either Britain or the United States.

Campbell, son of the late British speedster Sir Malcolm Campbell, set a world water speed record of 216.2 miles an hour on Windward Lake Mead, Nev., last Nov. 23. That was 34 m. p. h. faster than his previous record established on Lake Ullswater in England's lake district last July 24.

From Buffalo came word that the most prominent managers in the 88-member Western New York Guild, largest affiliate of the International Boxing Guild, had announced they were through. John DeJohn and Joe Netto, co-managers of welterweight champion Carmen Basilio, said in Syracuse they would pay no more guild dues.

Mike Scanlon, manager of Joey Giambra, middleweight contender, said he, too, was out.

While the Boxing Guild of New York gathered for its meeting, Helfand announced he had been assured "complete co-operation" in his fight by the Pennsylvania athletic commission.

From Grand Rapids, Mich., came news that the International Boxing Guild had been banned in Michigan.

MANY QUITTING

Among those who announced they will resign were Willie Keenan, manager of ex-lightweight champion, Jimmy Carter; Hymie Wallman, former president of the guild; Eddie Walker, veteran manager and Jimmy de Angelo.

A number of managers, including Al Well, boss of heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano, wired in their resignations several days ago.

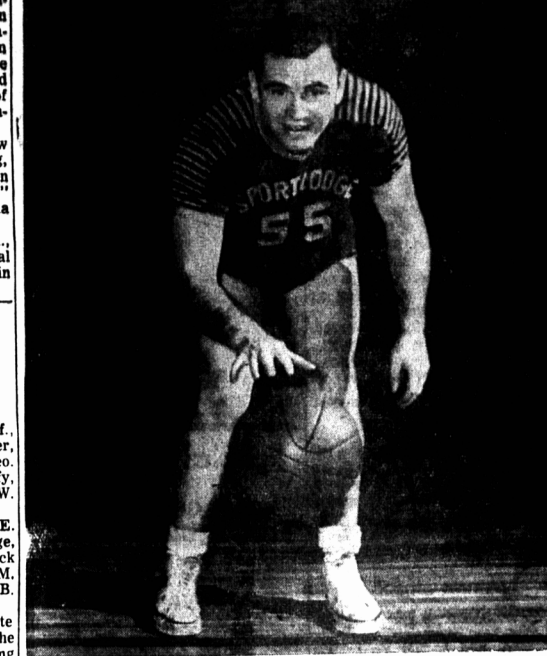

New York Rangers Blast Montreal Canadiens 6-1

Conacher Fires Two

NEW YORK (CP)—New York Rangers, paced by Pete Conacher's two second-period goals, humbled the National Hockey League-leading Montreal Canadiens 6-1 Wednesday night for the Canadiens' worst defeat of the season.

It was the first time Montreal goalie Jacques Plante has allowed six goals this season. The Canadiens have allowed five goals on only two previous occasions. They were defeated 5-1 Christmas night by the Rangers at Madison Square Garden and lost 5-2 to Detroit Jan. 2.

Danny Lewicki, Bill Gadaby, Andy Bathgate and Aldo Guldini were the other Ranger marksmen in an attack that found the mark in each period.

Only one Montreal goal in the waning minutes of the first period prevented goalie Lorne Worsley from notching his fourth shutout

and Guldini's tally nullified it just 11 seconds later.

With a few seconds left in the first period Montreal's Maurice (Rocket) Richard and New York's Lou Fontinato engaged in a short but furious boxing exchange. Richard landed a hard blow to the left eye by Fontinato. Referee Fred Stodard handed both players majors and Richard needed four stitches to patch up his cut eye.

Speed Skater Is Off For His Third Olympic Test

WINNIPEG (CP)—A 26-year-old Winnipeg speed skater only Canadian to gain an individual medal in the 1952 Winter Olympics, is taking off today for his third Olympic test, the 1956 Winter Games at Cortina, Italy.

Gordon Audley, a habitual winner in local skating meets, will represent Canada in the 500-metre event.

Audley, a slight-built, crew-cut resident of suburban St. James, takes his skating seriously. Two or three mornings a week, he and fellow skater Bill Panting flood the Crescentwood community club track, where Audley practices. Then he goes through twice-daily practice sessions, lasting about 1 1/2 hours apiece.

Some 150 fellow-workers dug into their own pockets to raise the money to send him to Norway, but the Canadian Olympic Committee ruled otherwise, saying if the whole skating team couldn't go, then Audley couldn't.

"I've been skating for just three weeks and have participated in only one local competition," said Audley. "You need top competition to keep bettering yourself. The Olympic committee doesn't seem to realize that."
