PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

MONDAY, May 9.

At the afternoon session, several bills were advanced a stage, and the bills respecting the Douglas Wills and waterworks and sewerage for Summerside were withdrawn. The latter bill, the promoter explained, was withdrawn because of the strong petition from prominent merchants of Summerside. The purport of the bill had been misrepresented to the petitioners as asking the right to proceed with the works at once, whereas the bill expressly provided that the town have two years in which to act. Mr. Lefurgey further remarked that should the town not see fit to undertake the matter at an early date the ratepayers would favor some private company undertaking the work.

At the evening session the debate on Mr Shaw's resolution respecting the Asylum annex was resumed by Hon Mr. Warburton who expressed the opinion that what was evidently intended to be an attack upon the Government had dwindled down to a censure upon Mr. Chappell, the architect whose plans had been adopted. He (Mr Warburton) was free to admit that there were errors in the plan for the proposed structure; but the greatest error was made in giving the contract to Walter Lowe, who invariably ends his contracts with a lawsuit. His brothers are not like him in this respect and neither is any other master mechanic that he knew of. Regarding the placing of the insane and poor together there was a difference of opinion. But he saw no objection to himself. The poor were not to be put near the violent class of lunatics. The annex was to be in the form of a "T" and this part was for the poor. If we had plenty of money different buildings might be put up. The building of the new annex

was not to be expensive when its size is considered. For the last thirty years idiots and imbeciles have been put in the poor house which, he added, is not fit to put in an insane. The building is not properly drained or fitted with conveniences. Besides the building does not belong to the Government and still they have to keep it in repairs. In the new institution the people will be cleaner, more comfortable, and under experienced attendants. The medical superintendent will see that they are comfortable and clean. The poor will be separated from the insane by a strong corridor and from the merely harmless by a wall. Regarding the correspondence in this matter referred to by Mr Shaw it was not produced by the Government because it had not been completed. He was assured that the old asylum brick were not given away, as was stated by Mr. Shaw. He only wished the gentleman who bought the old asylum was the contractor in this case. Mr. Lowe, the contractor, was always ready to go on with the work but yet he would not do so. He had the proper authority but wanted to make damages in order to make a lump sum out of the Government. He (Mr. Warburton) freely admitted that there were grave defects in the plans and that the levels were not properly taken by the architect. This was perhaps one reason for not going on. If Chappell offered to help Lowe out on the Prince of Wales College he did an improper thing. The tunnel referred to did run under the ground, and it is true that steam cannot be put through such; but in this matter the architect misled the government, and measures will be taken to effect a remedy. The late Government had the matter investigated by their own engineer and another man. Lowe wanted the government to abrogate everything and let him have control of the entire work. The late government refused to be dictated to in this way, and in so doing they were perfectly right. He (Lowe) wanted the architect dismissed and \$5,000; and this was only the beginning. He would do nothing he was wanted to do. There were provisions in the contract for extra work. Lowe wanted a very high price for this work, and at last the Government yielded to him. Then he refused to proceed with the work. He always had something to fall back on. He wanted to manufacture damages, and made all excuses in order to accomplish this. He is not, therefore, entitled to pity or compassion. The late Premier and the Government did all in their power to assist the promotion of the work—all they wanted was reciprocity on the part of the contractor. He wanted arbitration, which would subsequently lead to law. All this goes to show where the fault lies. Mr. Lowe had gathered probably about \$7,000 or \$8,000 worth of material on the ground—some good and some not. The brick is pried in separate lots and is not mixed, as was stated by Mr. Shaw. The Government sent a master carpenter to see to this. The late Government offered Lowe \$250 to protect that material and the present Government endorsed this action. Lowe refused to do the work for \$250, and the Government then had it done for \$75. All the material was properly looked after. If Lowe wished to proceed with the work of protecting the material he could have done so. But he refused thinking to make trouble by this also. The fault does not lie altogether with Chappell and little of it attaches to the late Government. The mistake was in giving the contract to Lowe. The question is a troublesome one, but the present Government proposes to get out of it in a proper manner. The Government and not the Opposition have the right to control the matter. He only went into the matter tonight to place it properly before the House. No business man or builder could find fault with the Government for the course they pursued in this connection.


