The general campaign throughout the Province is going well with many districts already reporting. It is hoped to have the campaign over soon to make way for coming fund-raising drives.

The objective of \$5,000 in the City Cancer Campaign is in sight, it was revealed at the turn-in meeting last night in the Legion Home.

The big 18th annual hospital Bazaar got underway at the Forum last night when it was officially opened by Rev. P. McMahon D.D. The Rector of the Basilica was representing His Excellency Bishop Boyle, who is in hospital.

Several hundred people from various parts of the Province attended a demonstration yesterday of a new two-row potato combine on the farm of Messrs. Lorne MacFarlane and Lorne Driscoll, near the Summerside Standpipe.

The machine, being seen in operation for the first time in this Province, is a four-acre field, digging a four-acre field. The tops are completely dead in this field and the machine operated exceedingly well.

This machine, which is said to be capable of digging 12 to 15 acres of potatoes in one day under local conditions, digs, picks, and loads the potatoes. The potatoes are loaded into special bins which fit on any standard truck body.

The 49th annual Egmont Bay and Mont Carmel Exhibition was held yesterday and according to reports issued by the officials of the association and by those present who have followed this exhibition down through the years, it was by far the most successful yet from every point of view.

This fair, which actually had its origin at Urbanville, about two miles distant from the present site, will celebrate its 50th anniversary next year.

Besides the championship event there were three other plowing classes. The main event for hand-guided plows, the single furrow class, was won by Allan Campbell, Primrose, who had stern competition from the several members of the Taylor families. Billie Taylor, Strathcona, was second, and True-Joy Taylor, Upton, was third.

A new plowing champion of the Province was crowned yesterday when 17-year old Glenn Morrissey, Cherry Valley, scored an upset win to take the title from a field which included last year's champion, Mr. Frank W. Clay.

The new plowing leader proved his mettle against the stiffest test of senior competition after winning the Junior championship and the 2-sod tractor open the day before at the big P. E. I. Plowing Match at Dundas.

In second place yesterday in the Esso Provincial Championship Class was Stanley Willie, Kingston, while Sterling MacSwain, Morrell, was third. The new champion had the best crown and was tied with Mr. Willis for the straightest furrow. The latter also had the best finish.
