Durelle Telegram To Be Displayed

MONCTON (CP)—The 100-foot long multi-signature message of good luck to Yvonne Durelle in his bout with champion Archie Moore for the world's light heavyweight crown is going to be put on display by one of Canada's biggest department stores in Montreal.

The store has made arrangements with Canadian National Telephoto to set up a teleprinter in one of its display windows on St. Catharine Street.

Text of the message, already containing more than 9,000 names, is "Good luck Yvon, bring

the world's championship to Canada. All of us here in the Atlantic provinces are behind you." It will be displayed on large CMT message blanks in both French and English.

The printer will automatically add signatures to the history-making telegram as they are received from CMT offices throughout the Maritimes.

The Montreal firm hopes to have Durelle appear in person at the store the afternoon of the fight scheduled Aug. 12.

OTTAWA (CP)—The Queen is expected to attend, briefly, a federal cabinet meeting in Halifax Aug. 1.

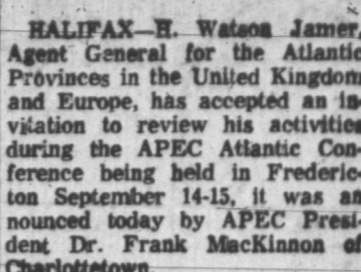
Informants said Friday she likely will be present at least for a short time at the unusual meeting which Prime Minister Diefenbaker announced earlier this week will be held in Halifax on the eve of her departure for home.

It is understood there is no reason to attach any special significance to this plan, beyond the fact it will be a fitting gesture—one of those memorable little moments in history of which the prime minister is known to be so fond.

Governor-General Massey will also be present in Halifax for the farewell ceremonies ending the Royal Tour of Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip.

But constitutional authorities say there is no reason why their simultaneous presence would clash in any way with tradition.

Agent General Will Report On U.K. At APEC Conference



HALIFAX—H. Watson Jamer, Agent General for the Atlantic Provinces in the United Kingdom and Europe, has accepted an invitation to review his activities during the APEC Atlantic Conference being held in Fredericton September 14-15. It was announced today by APEC President Dr. Frank MacKinnon of Charlottetown.

Mr. Jamer received his present appointment in March, 1958 and he set up the Canadian Atlantic Provinces Office in London, England, two months later. This will be his first visit to Canada since becoming Agent General.

Born and educated in New Brunswick, Mr. Jamer is 54 years old. He was associated with the Ford Motor Company of Canada for 25 years, the last 10 years of which he was district manager for the Atlantic region with offices in Saint John. During the war he was on loan to the British Ministry of Supply in England.

He is a past president of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade, and when he assumed his present appointment he was a director of the Saint John YMCA, the New Brunswick Protestant Orphanage and president of the Saint John Board of Trade. He assisted in the organization of the



Atlantic Provinces Economic Council. Until his departure for overseas, he was APEC's general chairman for New Brunswick.

The Canadian Atlantic Provinces office in London is jointly operated and financed by the provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland.

Provincial Election Seems Sure For Fall

With election rumours running high, speculation as to the date of the next provincial contest has reached a peak during the past week.

Only one man knows that date however and he, Premier Matheson, has guarded the secret carefully. The strongest bet that emanates from party supporters is that they are held on Wednesday and if this holds true, the date could possibly be narrowed down to September 2 or September 9.

Whether either of these dates is correct, remains to be seen, but one thing seems certain, the government will go to the country this fall.

The Progressive Conservative Party has 25 of their men in the field. The Liberals to date have nominated 14 of their 30 candidates. Only one PC candidate has been nominated in 4th Kings.

This does not mean that the Liberals are behind their opponents in the election campaign. In most instances the candidates are expected to be the sitting members who have been in close contact with their constituents during the past four years or longer.

To date the Liberals have shown a preference for farmer candidates seven of their eight new men are actively engaged in agriculture. The other new candidate is a young lawyer. Out of the fourteen candidates nominated 10 are farmers, one is a lawyer, one a processor, one a merchant and one a business manager. One of the ten farmers is also a fish packer.

ing potatoes for a number of years said he felt that farmers were making a grave mistake in allowing some outside party to do their marketing for them. He felt that the grower should get everything there was in it and suggested that through pool selling this could be established.

Mr. Wood felt there was a reasonable profit to be gained from growing potatoes. He said he averaged his sales for the past ten years and found that the price was \$1.10 per bushel.

Mr. MacIsaac described the P.E.I. potato industry as one that has lost considerable ground in the last few years. He said the prestige that island potatoes had once enjoyed on the upper Canadian market was fast deteriorating through sloppy marketing practices.

In explaining the function of the pool, Mr. MacIsaac said it would be similar in structure to the old Potato Growers' Association but would go further in its operations.

RECEIVING CENTRES

If established, the pool would set up receiving centres in about 12 or 15 different areas of the province. Here the potatoes would be graded and packaged with particular emphasis on weight and quality.

By pool marketing, Mr. MacIsaac said, the market could be controlled so that there would not be a shortage at one period and a surplus at others.

In addition to providing facilities on the island the pool would establish distributing centres at a couple of large centres in Ontario and Quebec.

Stressing the need for such centres, Mr. MacIsaac recalled that from a shipping operation carried on last year by himself, 10 lb bags of potatoes for which he was receiving 22-25 cents per bag were retailing in Toronto for 29 cents per bag.

He said this represented an excess profit to the Toronto wholesaler of around \$400 per carload after freight and shipping breakage were taken out.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

The proposed plan would call for extensive advertising using professional help in the field of public relations.

The scheme will strive for a membership of 1,000 growers which would give an initial share capital of \$100,000. It is proposed that after the \$100,000 were raised, the organization approach the government with a view to having a \$200,000 10 a n guaranteed through the Industrial Development Bank.

This loan, it is proposed, would be paid back through a levy placed on growers' sales at the rate of five percent. This money would be in the nature of a revolving fund, repayable each year after five years had elapsed.

MERIT ENDORSED

In the discussion that followed the presentation of the scheme, the merit of the scheme was unconditionally endorsed. Groups felt that if the industry was to be saved, some form of orderly marketing was essential.

The general opinion was that the contract should be as binding as possible with total production a must. It was pointed out that every bushel of potatoes a member sold to an independent dealer would be in direct competition to the pool.
