CAREER OF REV. J. R. NARRAWAY. A Well Known Clergyman Passes Away After a Long Service.

No Methodist minister in eastern Canada was more widely known, known, especially among the older people of the province, than Rev. J. R. Narraway, whose death took place on Sunday. Though the partial failure of his hearing, consequent on the loss of hearing, compelled his retirement from the active ministry a quarter of a century ago, he remained for many years after one of the leaders of thought in the denomination. He continued to the last in the management of its affairs. While he was in the pulpit he was, perhaps, the most impressive and popular preacher in the conference of eastern British America. The late Dr. Ritchie was thought by some to be his equal. Mr. Narraway was born in 1819 in Hildesford, Devonshire, England, and came to this country in 1841. He had to shift for himself from his boyhood up, and his education was largely the result of home study. At the time when he began preaching it was more difficult than it is now to become a Methodist preacher, for it was a period of aggressiveness in pushing the work of the denomination. But Mr. Narraway and some others who succeeded in obtaining official recognition about the same time amply justified their admission. His name first appeared on the list in 1841. In 1847 he was stationed in Truro, where there were but few Methodists. His preaching was so attractive that according to the historian of the church members of the other congregations filled all the vacant seats at evening meetings. A few years later he was stationed in Charlottetown, where he delivered some of his most popular lectures. One of these which made a good impression at the time was preached at the beginning of the Crimean War, and was published in a pamphlet entitled "War in the East." It showed a careful study of contemporary history and gave a forecast of the result, which was justified by the event. About the same time he delivered a stirring address on the Maine liquor law, which act was then almost a novelty. The Prince Edward Island legislature adjourned to hear the discourse, which was afterwards printed. Mr. Narraway begged the legislature to follow the example set by New England and middle states, and to join their brethren in New Brunswick in passing a prohibitory law. From Charlottetown he went to Greyville and thence to St. John's, N. B. On the latter circuit he preached the sermon at the funeral of Charles F. Allison, the founder of the Mt. Allison institutions, which discourse was afterwards printed. Mr. Narraway came to St. John's in 1852 as the pastor of the west side congregation. He was invited to the Centenary Church before 1863, but it was not till then that he was appointed. His three years in the charge of the Centenary were so successful that a special appeal was made to the conference for an extension of the term, which was continued another year. In 1867-68 he was stationed at St. John's. During the whole of his life as a minister Mr. Narraway was afflicted with deafness, and for a great part of the time he could not hear at all. This trouble was made less by the use of the hearing trumpet, and his success and devotion of Mr. Narraway, who accompanied him to meetings of all kinds, reported speeches and conversation in shorthand, passing him the notes. He was thus able to understand the liberal patronage heretofore extended to our predecessors.

A Great Demonstration.

Sir John Thompson on the Questions of the Day.

MONTREAL, Sept. 13.

The demonstration yesterday evening to Sir John Thompson and his colleagues was a wonderful success. The Premier spoke for nearly two hours, discussing tariff reform, the Manitoba school question and other matters. He declared that the crisis policy was a complete revision of the tariff. But on no account would the manufacturers of the Dominion be dictated to by a foreign power. Splendid speeches were also made by Hon. Messrs. Foster, Caron, Angers, Ouimet and Curran.

Mending or Ending the House of Lords.

LONDON, Sept. 13.

The National Liberal Convention has issued a circular in connection with the rejection of the House of Lords Bill by the House of Lords, in which it says that the question of mending or ending the House of Lords will be discussed at a meeting of the House of Commons on other subjects of reform. The question, the circular adds, needs unflinching treatment.

The Campbell Heresy Case.

MONTREAL, Sept. 13.

The Campbell heresy case was up in Presbytery yesterday. He made a long defence. A sensation was caused by the Rev. James Barclay defending Campbell. A motion was carried by a vote of 21 to 13, holding the Campbell heresy case. Campbell appealed. The second count of the libel comes up to-day.

Grit Political Picnic.

HALIFAX, Sept. 13.

The grit political picnic at Shubenacadie yesterday was attended by 800 people, instead of 2,000, as expected. The speakers were warmly applauded and cordially received, but the smallness of the audience was a damper to the enthusiasm. Addresses were delivered by Messrs. Davies, Jones, Fleming and Foster. The picnic is the first of the series to be held.

The Result in Doubt.

TORONTO, Sept. 13.

In the international cricket match Canada made 236 in the second innings. Terry's score of 111 is the highest ever made by a Canadian in an international match. Goldingham scored 58. Hansard of St. John made 5. The American had 147 to make to win. At the close of to-day's play they had scored 106 for five wickets. The match is still in doubt.

A Good Claim Allowed.

MONROE, Sept. 13.

Samuel Killorn, of the parish of Moncton, has been allowed a United States pension claim of over four thousand dollars. Killorn occupied the position of captain, and took part in the Battle of the Wilderness in Virginia.

Deleesses Released.

PARIS, Sept. 13.

Charles Deleesses, who was sentenced to five years imprisonment for complicity in the Panama Canal scandal, was released from prison to-day. Most of his time was spent in the hospital.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS NOTES.

PARIS, Sept. 13.—The whole district round Biarritz, the summer resort on the Bay of Biscay, has been under indignation by the report that the Government will suppress bull-fighting in France. The bulls have been bought and the toreros have been engaged for a fight in Bayonne, five miles from Biarritz, on September 17, and if the Government interferes there will be riots. The Government is between two fires, its hesitation to abolish bull-fights will involve it in trouble with the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. The president of the society has already given notice that it will prosecute Premier Dupuy for permitting recent bull-fights in Bayonne.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 11.—A joint stock company with a capital of three million yen has been formed in Yokohama for the purchasing of land on the Pacific coast of America. This will be settled by Japanese artisans, farmers and fishermen, who have to remain under the control of the company.

FAIRFAX, Va., Sept. 12.—There was serious rioting in Whitehaven, Cumberland, on Saturday evening. The mob went through the streets smashing the windows of houses and electric street lamps. It was finally scattered by the police. Soldiers were sent from Carlisle. Troops and police have been reinforced throughout the middle counties, and are in readiness for any further rioting.

CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—President Gannon, of the Irish National League of America, pronounces the manifesto sent from New York on Sunday night, purporting to be issued by his executive committee, containing the Home Rule bill and declaring Gladstone's influence as pernicious, to be a fake. He says he repudiates it altogether as never issued by the executive committee.
