## Maritime Winter Fair Is Mooted For Halifax

**YARMOUTH, N.S. (CP)** - A prominent Nova Scotia cattle exhibitor said Sunday the Maritime winter fair should be held in a big city where there is a metropolitan excitement to stir the imagination.  
Lloyd Hatfield of Yarmouth, a brother of the late Senator Paul Hatfield, said Halifax is the ideal site for the fair because "it's the largest and most interesting city in the Maritimes."  
Mr. Hatfield annually exhibits his herd of Aberdeen Angus from his farm at Bunker Island near here. The winter fair was postponed last year after fire destroyed the bulk of its buildings at Amherst. Since then, fair officials have been looking for a new location having legal severed obligations with the town of Amherst.  
Mr. Hatfield said "cattle owners and their families living on the farm the year around want to see something other than the actual exhibition. They want to see all the other attractions a city such as Halifax can provide."  
Extra shipping distance does not mean too much to the exhibitors "if it gets them to a place where there is something of interest going on other than the fair." Many farmers would make this their annual holiday.

## N.B. House Prorogues After Lengthy Sitting

**FREDERICTON (CP)** - A record budget, frequent heated debate on hospital insurance financing and royal assent of 153 bills were highlights of the 1959 session of the New Brunswick Legislature prorogued Saturday by Lieutenant-Governor J. Leonard O'Brien after one of the longest sittings in recent years.  
The budget introduced about midway through the session by Secretary-Treasurer D. D. Patterson totalled almost \$75,000,000 with an estimated surplus of \$45,000,000. Chief new items of expenditures were \$50,000 for setting up of a crown industry - promoting corporation and \$100,000 to underwrite up to 60 per cent of municipal tourist promotion over present budgets.  
No tax changes were made.  
A half-expected announcement by Progressive Conservative Premier Fleming about a general election or a by-election fill five existing vacancies in the House failed to materialize. Present standings in the 32-seat assembly are PCs 34, Liberals 13.

Methods of financing the national - provincial hospital insurance plan were discussed heatedly but no change was made. The Liberals, under leader Louis J. ## Lama Reaches Northeast India

**SHILLONG, India (Reuters)** - The Dalai Lama reached the northeast Indian community of Bomdila Sunday, the end of his tortuous trek from the borders of Communist-controlled Tibet.  
The 33-year-old god-king has the choice of an aircraft standing by to fly him to New Delhi or driving 60 miles to the Assam plains where a special train has been put at his disposal.  
The arrival of his party brought thousands of singing, dancing tribesmen into Bomdila, while a strong contingent of Indian soldiers guarded the whole area.  
The Dalai Lama was greeted by a special envoy sent by Prime Minister Nehru, army officials and senior Buddhist monks, the Press Trust of India reported.

**TO DISCUSS PROGRAM**  
Later, the envoy, M.P.N. Menon, an external affairs ministry official, and the Dalai Lama were scheduled to discuss the Tibetan leader's program in India.  
The Dalai Lama's arrival in Bomdila followed his pony trek from the Tibetan border to the Himalayan foothills which started 12 days ago.  
He fled Lhasa with his family and attendants March 17 when an anti-Communist revolt flared in the capital of the Buddhist state. Communist Chinese troops have since crushed rebels in Lhasa, but fighting continues in other sections of the country.

**ESCAPES TO BHUTAN**  
Meanwhile, one of Tibet's most influential religious leaders was reported to have escaped from Tibet into neighboring Bhutan and asked for asylum.  
Reports reaching Kalimpong, on the India-Tibet border, said Tsutuganapa Rhippeidori, better known as the Karmapa Lama, has fled Tibet after being declared a traitor by the Communist - controlled committee now governing the Himalayan country.  
The Karmapa Lama is the head of the Red Hat Buddhist sect, the oldest sect in Tibet.

## Sailors Row Pope's Body

**VENICE, Italy (Reuters)** - Twenty Italian sailors, rowing like ancient galley slaves to the beat of a drum, Sunday brought to Saint Mark's Basilica the remains of Saint Pius X, the 45-year-old peasant Pope who died 45 years ago.  
The saint's glass coffin, brought by special train from Vatican City Saturday night, was guarded at the railroad station here by papal guards before being placed aboard a barge for the journey along the Grand Canal to the basilica.

The saint's body, which has rested in Saint Peter's Basilica in Rome since his death in 1914, has been brought to Venice in fulfillment of a promise Pius made 56 years ago.  
As he left Venice to attend the 1904 papal conclave at which he was elected Pope Pius, he told the crowd gathered to see him off: "I shall come back, alive or dead."  
After the body has lain in state for a month in Saint Mark's it will be carried back to the saint's tomb in Rome.

**GOES TO WASHINGTON**  
**OTTAWA (CP)** - Maj. F. D'Alton Gooderham will be transferred to Washington from army headquarters here in late May as assistant joint secretary with the Canadian joint staff there, it was announced Friday.  
The Toronto - born major took part in the Dieppe raid in 1942. Five years ago he served the Canadian delegation with the international truce commission in Laos.

## More Than 500 In Attendance At Performance Of 'St. Joan'

More than 500 persons Friday night accepted the invitation of the St. Dunstan's Players to attend a free performance of George Bernard Shaw's famous play "Saint Joan."  
Staged in the College gymnasium, the production, its 22-member cast drawn entirely from the student body, was under the direction of Rev. Adrien Arsenault, a member of the College faculty.

Playing the title-role with the aplomb, the sincerity and the understanding of a far more experienced artist, Rhoda Longaphie of Charlottetown displayed a talent and charm that won her the lion's share of the applause and acclaim of students and public alike.  
Though deprived of sufficient rehearsal time due to the pressure of studies, excellent production is given the star by the remainder of the cast, all males.

Described by Father Arsenault in a written introduction as "the first major contribution to the religious drama in English since Marlowe's 'Faustus,' written in 1589," the Shaw story was completed in 1924.  
As written by Shaw, the play was staged in five preparatory scenes: the trial scene, and an epilogue, which depicts Joan as appearing to her accusers in the year of her canonization, 1920.

## POLITICALLY EMOTIONALLY Relations With Bonn Concern London Gov't

**LONDON (AP)** - The government is reported highly concerned about a worsening of British-German relations.  
Editorials and comments in newspapers have built up a picture of the two allies at loggerheads politically and emotionally.  
West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer last Wednesday charged that "wire pullers" in Britain were deliberately trying to "impair the mood of Great Britain against Germany."  
Adenauer's charge has been discussed by the cabinet, informants reported. They said the consensus among ministers was that Adenauer had exaggerated the effect of press criticisms of Germany. Some papers recently have been openly hostile to the Germans.

**OFFICIALS SHOCKED**  
Adenauer's outspoken references to Britain shocked government officials. But the government does not want to add fuel to the fire - and there will be no official reply.  
After Adenauer's speech, government spokesmen insisted the West German leader still is welcome in London. It is hoped he can make the trip which ill health forced him to cancel a few months ago.

Friday's announcement that Adenauer plans early talks with Prime Minister Macmillan, French Premier Michel Debre and Italian Premier Antonio Segni was welcomed here.  
**TOO INFLEXIBLE**  
Much of the British criticism is based on a feeling that West Germany is too inflexible in its approach to East-West negotiations.  
West Germany? on the other hand, feels Britain is too willing to make concessions to the Russians in the forthcoming East-West meetings on West Berlin and German unification.

In addition London diplomats believe some West Germans, including Adenauer, think Britain is assuming too much initiative in deciding Germany's future.

## Flu Outbreak Is Decreasing

The epidemic of influenza which was sweeping the province for the past few weeks is abating, medical authorities said Saturday. The authorities said it is "definitely receding."  
Hospitals have been jammed with sufferers in the outbreak which apparently reached its peak early last week. Both Charlottetown hospitals and the Prince County Hospital in Summerside were closed to visitors.  
Doctors say the 'flu was of two types, gastro-enterical and the other respiratory. Both responded favorably to treatment with aspirin.

## Canadians Are Proxy Parents

**WINNIPEG (CP)** - Canadian individuals and businesses became proxy parents to 670 underprivileged children in a dozen foreign countries in 1958.  
A report to the annual meeting of the Canadian Save the Children Fund Organization Saturday said \$45,868 was donated last year by 614 Canadians to sponsor the welfare of needy children in Greece, Italy, Korea, Lebanon, North Africa, British Somaliland, Malta, Finland, France, Austria, Germany and Britain.

The funeral will be held this morning from her late residence for Requiem High Mass at the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer. Interment will take place in Rustico cemetery.

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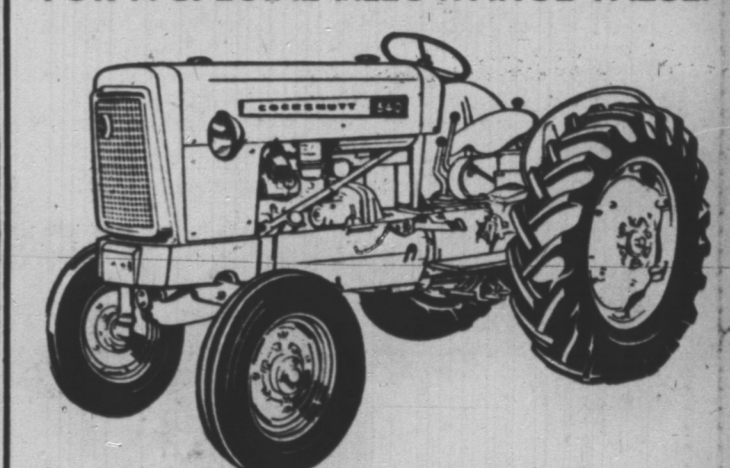
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
