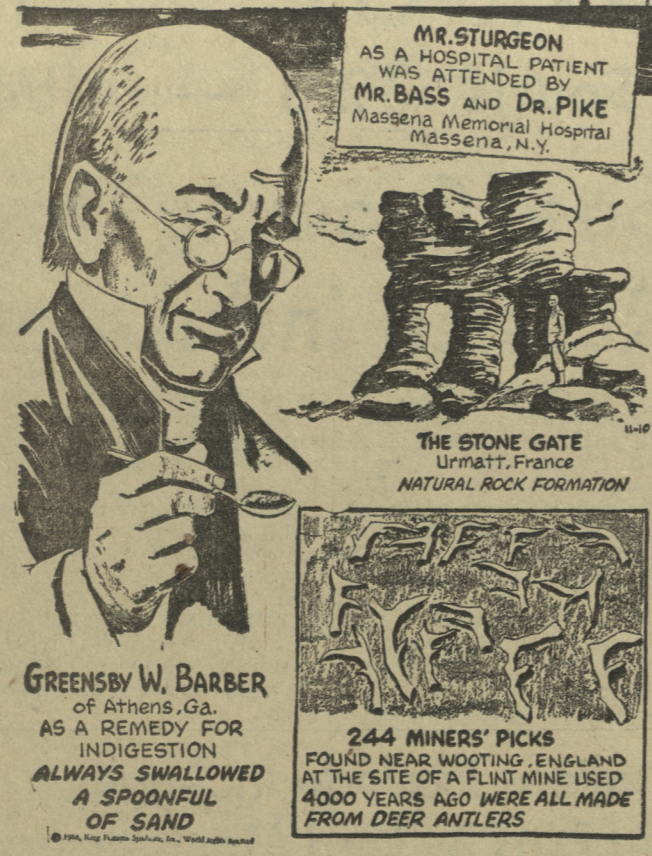
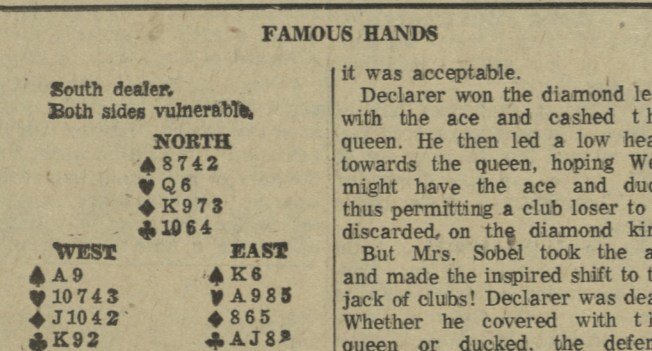

Part score contracts seldom have dramatic value. But occasionally one comes along where the opportunity for good play can be profitably seized, and though the stakes are low, the satisfaction generated may be equal to that obtained from making or defeating a higher contract.

Buccaneers Of Fashion
Worry Parisian Dress Houses

NEW YORK (AP)—Piracy on the high seas went out when steam replaced sail. But piracy on high styles, another venerable crime, has never been more popular.

Commissioner Jacques Besson of the French Surete Nationale estimates the fashion thief is costing the dressmakers of Paris between \$12,000,000 and \$14,000,000 a year. He recently appealed to the international police organization for aid.

Besson says style piracy has become a well-organized, syndicate-type racket with headquarters in New York and branches in Italy, Germany, Belgium and Austria.

ROMANTIC LIFE

The life of a fashion buccaneer, particularly in Europe, is romantic as a spy movie, full of cloak and dagger effects. The big operators use microfilm, forged identification papers, bribes and pay-offs.

Not long ago French cops nabbed a Parisienne as she scurried aboard a plane bound for Cairo. In her handbag was a bundle of original sketches stolen from the drawing board of one of the world's most important fashion creators.

The big, organized pirate band works differently, however. Authorities say the syndicate sends agents to the first showings of important collections. These agents memorize details of the dresses shown and later make sketches. These are microfilmed and airmailed to the United States to be sold or traded.

BRISK BUSINESS

Under-the-counter dealings in sketches is brisk around the time of the openings. Only a carefully screened list of customers and fashion writers is invited to attend the unveilings, but the fashion thieves somehow manage to get what they want.

A few years ago in Paris a pair of style buccaneers went into partnership. One would swiftly

memorize the details of the tops of the more successful dresses and the other would concentrate on waistlines and skirts.

An American manufacturer who returned recently from the Paris collections said some methodical German garment makers are improving this technique by putting whole teams of pirates into the dressmakers' salons.

SPECIALISTS

"They manage to get as many as five of their people inside one way or another," said the American. "One will just look at necklines; another shoulders; a third sleeves, and so on."

Attitudes of the high style designers toward this "borrowing" vary. Pauline Trigere, for example, fumes because there seems no way to prevent the wife of a larcenous manufacturer from walking into a retail store, ordering one of her expensive, high-style dresses and taking it home for papa to copy.

Adele Simpson is philosophical about the practice.

"I say that you might just as well go out of business if they stop copying you," she shrugs. "It really means that you aren't making clothes that are good enough to steal."

Smithsonian To Get Famous Hope Diamond

WASHINGTON (AP)—The fabulous Hope diamond, a stone of beauty and ill fortune, is about to pass from a New York gem merchant to the United States.

The deep blue diamond, it was learned Friday, will be given the Smithsonian Institution by gem dealer Harry Winston, to be displayed in the Smithsonian's hall of gems and minerals here. It is the largest known blue diamond in the world, and the most storied.

There was no announcement of the gift from either Winston or the Smithsonian, but it is understood the tragedy-haunted diamond will arrive in Washington Monday.

The diamond is about the size of a 50-cent piece but has been insured by various owners for up to \$2,000,000.

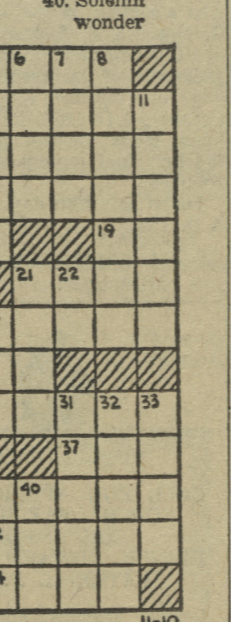
Winston was reported to have decided to part with the 4 1/2-carat oval stone in order to help establish in Washington a collection of jewels equal to those of the crown capitals of the world.
