LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

The Scott Act at Tignish.

Sir.—The manner in which the Scott Act is being enforced in Tignish since Inspector Broderick received his appointment is a disgrace to the people of that village. There is more run sold in Tignish at the present time than ever before (and that is saying a great deal) notwithstanding the exertions of Inspector Broderick to prevent it. In fact, his efforts of late have been more ludicrous than effective. Is it not a fact, Mr. Editor, that a witness on a Scott Act case must be paid certain fees before he is obliged to give evidence? This important part of his duty Mr. Broderick entirely ignores; therefore, the rumsellers pursue their vocation at their own sweet will. A warrant was issued on Tuesday last, at the request of Inspector Broderick, for the arrest of your correspondent, and I was taken to Tignish, a distance of over seven miles, as a witness against a certain rum-seller. A warrant, if you please! Now, why did he not send a subpoena? Simply because he suspected that he would have to pay before I would go. The document demanded my presence in St. Mary's Hall, Tignish, at 2 o'clock sharp, when in fact it was 2 o'clock when I received it. What a farce! When we arrived at St. Mary's Hall it was well nigh 4 o'clock. Here was the "demonstrative" Mr. Broderick and his two J. P.'s sitting on the doorstep. What a personification of the three tailors of Tooty Street! Inspector Broderick was the picture of dejection, owing to the fact, as I was told, that he figured in a go-as-you-please match that forenoon, only to be defeated. His competitor was fleeing from the reception of a document, similar no doubt, to the one I received. This worthy trio informed me that my services were not required, owing to the fact that I had arrived too late, which of course was no fault of mine. This was another farce enacted by Inspector Broderick. I demanded my fees, but in vain. Broderick had the brazen effrontery to tell me that he had no hand in bringing me there, and if I knew any way whereby I could recover travelling expenses or any fees from him, I was at liberty to try it! Pilate like, he washed his hands clear of the whole affair. Such is the way the Scott Act is enforced in Tignish. There was no alternative left me but to walk home; so I heaved a sigh and left, meditating on the truth of the following words of a well-known author: "Down immediately, should go fools from the high places where misbegotten chance has perked them up, and through life should they skulk ever haunted by their native insignificance, as the body marches accompanied by its shadow. As for a much more formidable class, the knaves, I am at a loss what to do with them; Had I a world, there should not be a knave in it."

The Far North.

LIEUT. SCHWATKA RETURNS TO VICTORIA AND GIVES A THRILLING RECITAL.

Lieut. Schwatka, the noted explorer, who has been conducting a scientific expedition full of adventure and interest to the far north, reached Victoria, B. C., on the 5th inst., and gives the following particulars of his recent trip. He says: "We struck lake Abkhain June 16, up to which point information has already been given. We found a lake which is 95 miles long, drained by the river Newbury, 145 miles long. We shot rapids with waves running 8 feet with canvas boats, and travelled overland to Fort Selkirk. Here we hired Indian packers, who went with us to the Copper River country. That we traversed about 225 miles and reached the foot of St. Elias Alps, from 12,000, to 15,000 feet high. Here was glacial ice as far as the eye could see, from 50 to 60 miles on each side. Here the Indians left us.

The white men of the party then took 75 to 80 pounds each on their backs, abandoning all other property, including scientific instruments. In a march of about 80 miles we managed to break through the St. Elias Alps and glacier, which brought us to the east fork of the Copper river. This is a perfect boiling mountain torrent impeded by glaciers every few miles. The last day's march was from 4 in the morning to 8 at night, was only two and a half miles and so fatiguing as to almost exhaust the party. The canvas covers of the bedding were then used to build a boat 14 feet long with ribs of willows. In this we started down the Nees Guar fork of the Copper river, hoping that a few miles would take us out of the enormous rapids. They, however, were 35 miles long. The boat upset several times and the men were nearly drowned. In one place all went over the fall and under a waterfall. Five miles of this stream was through an enormous canyon with perpendicular walls 600 to 800 feet high. We were not more than two hours making these rapids. The speed was very great. The water was essentially rapid for another 160 miles till we struck the Indians. By this time we were worn out and out of food completely, having for a long time had only flour and tea. The descent of Copper river was much easier. We got to its mouth about the middle of August; our men were almost shoeless and without clothes. Roughly, this completed the expedition, striking white men for the first time since May. We opened about 500 or 600 miles of totally unknown country, and, of course, a good deal on each side on the boundary line. We have got thorough maps taken by Dr. Hayes, of the geological survey in at Washington. At the back of St. Elias Alps were 50 peaks from 12,000 to 16,000 feet high. All the upper forks of the White River were mapped out, and many signs of minerals, especially copper, were met with. We saw 55 lakes in one day. A large collection of botanical specimens was secured, and photographs were taken of everything of interest. The most important feature of the whole trip was the successful breaking through the St. Elias ranges, a feat never before accomplished by man. All the party are well. The journey was hazardous in the extreme, and one of great danger at times.
