

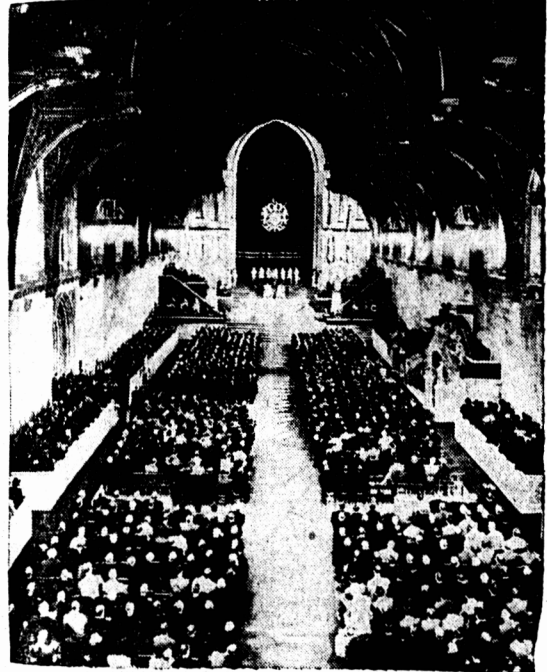

ALL OUT FOR FREEDOM! — The quest for peace, symbolized by the peals of the "Freedom Bell" on United Nations Day, brought out an estimated 150,000 Berliners who jammed the square before the West-Berlin City Hall in the U.S. sector. This tremendous audience was quiet and orderly — many prayed quietly, but openly — while waiting for Gen. Lucius D. Clay to press the switch that set the ten-ton chime vibrating throughout the city. As the bell tolled, spectators — many of them from Soviet-controlled areas — wept or stood in awed silence which was followed by cheers and thunderous applause.



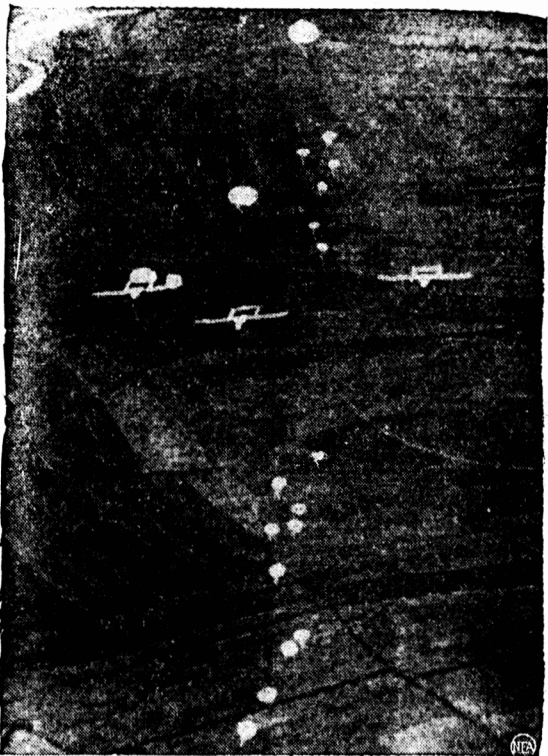
General scene shows formal ceremonies during dedication of reconstruction in nearby Westminster built House of Commons. The King may not enter when Com-

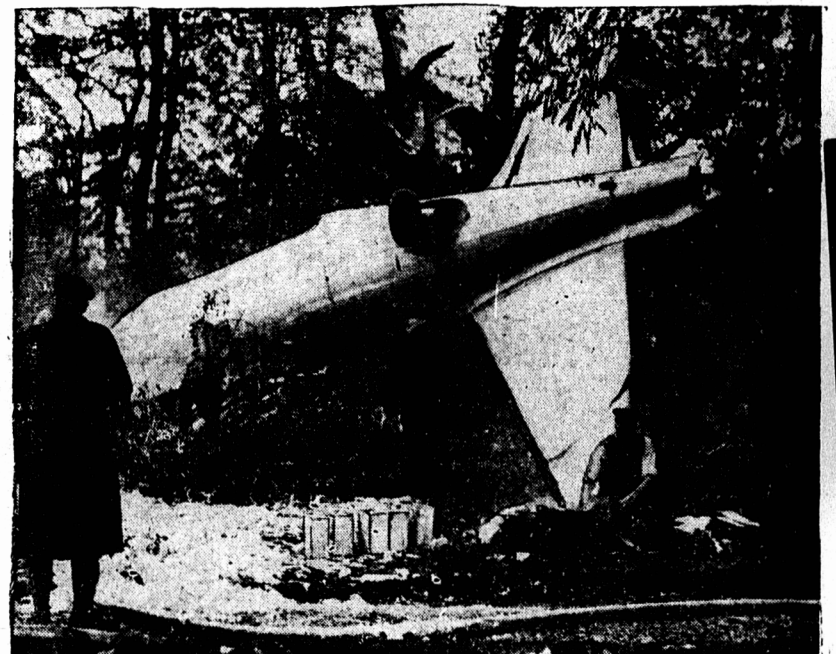
Hon. J. J. McCann, Minister of Revenue, said in a Vancouver interview that the Canadian dollar may ultimately become of more value than the U.S. dollar. "The day may come when our trade position with the U.S. is so favorable that it will either be on a par with the American dollar or worth more than theirs," he said. He further stated that Canadians will have \$150,000,000 in American exchange due to Alberta oil developments. The saving will be made through completion of the oil pipeline from Alberta to Wisconsin, coupled with further developments of Alberta oil fields.

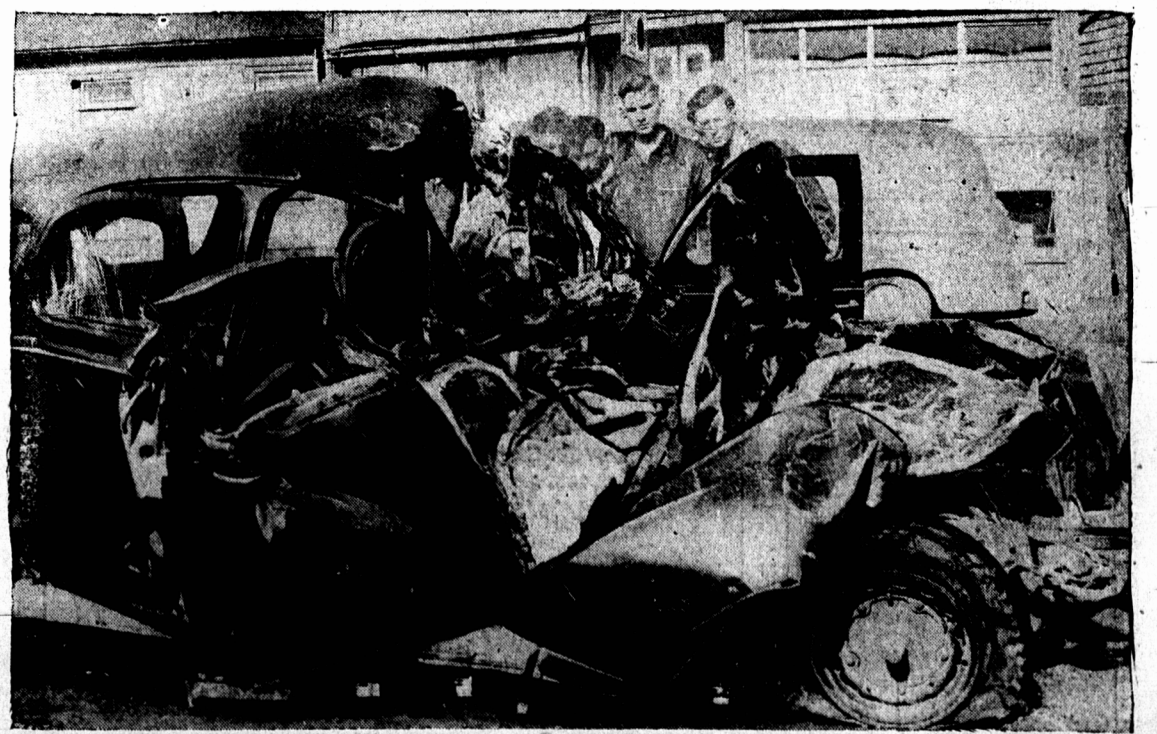
