Filling Station Permit Refused By City Council

The City Council yesterday, at an emergency meeting, rescinded a resolution passed on Aug. 24 granting permission to the Imperial Oil Company to erect a filling station at the southeast corner of Kent and Pownal Streets, and passed a motion rescinding the company's application. The resolution was moved by Councillor Blanchard and seconded by Councillor Hennessey and passed on the casting vote of His Worship Mayor Foster.

Previous Motion Rescinded At Special Meeting Yesterday

The City Council yesterday, at an emergency meeting, rescinded a resolution passed on Aug. 24 granting permission to the Imperial Oil Company to erect a filling station at the southeast corner of Kent and Pownal Streets, and passed a motion rescinding the company's application. The resolution was moved by Councillor Blanchard and seconded by Councillor Hennessey and passed on the casting vote of His Worship Mayor Foster.

The vote stood: Ayes—Councillors Holman, Hennessey, Blanchard and Dougan. Nays—Councillors McKee, Lapthorn, Chandler and McIntyre. In opening the meeting the Mayor stated he had received the following letter, signed by Councillors J. E. Blanchard, J. A. McKee and A. Hennessey: "We the undersigned request you to call a meeting, Aug. 31, to reconsider the granting of a permit to the Imperial Oil Company filling station on corner of Kent and Pownal Streets on the southeast corner. He also had received the following communication from the Secretary of the Board of School Trustees, dated Aug. 26: "To His Worship the Mayor and members of the City Council: "Gentlemen: I have the honour to advise you that the following resolution was adopted unanimously at a meeting of the Board held yesterday afternoon: "Whereas the Board on the 21st instant adopted a resolution of resolution advising and requesting the City Council to refuse permission for the erection of a gasoline filling station at the southeast corner of Kent and Pownal Streets as it was considered an increased menace to the school children attending three schools. "It is learned from press reports that the Council has granted permission for erection of said filling station. "Therefore resolved that the Board reaffirm and respectfully request the City Council to reconsider its authorization for the erection of this filling station, which will be the opinion of the Board, as previously stated, be an increased menace to the school children."

His Worship explained that he had not attended those meetings of the School Board at which the resolutions were passed but they all were aware of the stand he took in the matter.

Councillor McKee said his idea was a special meeting to reconsider the motion. Councillor Blanchard had voted for the resolution but since then he would withdraw his name from the School Board should not be re-elected.

Councillor McIntyre said they knew his views and his vote would be the same, maintaining that at present this corner was a hazard and a filling station would lessen the hazard.

Councillor Dougan asked for a resolution and a vote was taken. After some discussion as to procedure, it was decided on motion of Councillor Blanchard, seconded by Councillor Hennessey, that the previous vote be reconsidered.

It was then moved by Councillor Hennessey, that the resolution of the meeting of Aug. 24, 1939, permitting the issuing of a license for the erection and operation of a gasoline service station by the Imperial Oil Company on the southeast corner of Kent and Pownal Streets be rescinded and that the application be now refused.

On the vote being taken it stood as above given. Before the meeting adjourned Councillor Chandler informed the Council that a lady owing \$300 for taxes would not pay until a city clerk had been appointed. He also stated that a number of those in arrears would do nothing until an adjustment Board had been appointed.

Councillor Blanchard suggested the social situation when an opinion was asked for erecting a filling station that it be advertised for a month so that people would be given an opinion to express their views.

Social Service Work Discussed At Convention

WOODSTOCK, N. B., Aug. 31—(CP)—That no member of a Christian Church will attempt to evade his personal responsibility for the social wrongs was an opinion expressed in the Social Service Board report presented at the 94th annual Maritime United Baptist Convention which opened here today.

The report urged co-operation with the Christian Social Council of Canada, the Canadian Welfare Council, the League of Nations Society of Canada, the Nova Scotia Social Service Council and Temperance Alliance, and similar associations in other provinces. Among social problems needing attention the report listed intemperance, gambling and lotteries, unemployment, housing and public health.

Rev. L. H. Crandall, Sydney Mines, N. S., president of the convention, was in the chair at the opening session. The first devotional period was conducted by Rev. S. D. Tritts, Rev. P. E. I. One of the reports revealed that \$112,926 had been received for denominational purposes.

"We have concrete roads joining our countries," but no concrete barriers are erected between Canada and the United States, said Dr. R. W. Padelford this afternoon in bringing greetings from the Northern Baptist Convention of the United States.

The report of the Foreign Mission Board was given by Dr. J. B. M'Laurin, Toronto, secretary of the Canadian Baptist Foreign Missions Board. Rev. F. S. Crossman, Springfield, N. S., and Rev. Gordon Baras, Dartmouth, N. S., discussed this report. A forum on
