Bank Manager Gives Interesting Talk To Y's Men

Mr. William Hayward, manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, Summerside, was the guest speaker last evening at the regular weekly meeting of the Summerside Y's Men's Club. Mr. Hayward spoke on his life at New Carlisle on the Gaspe coast during wartime. He congratulated the club on the pace set by the Y's men for the amount of time, energy and money it had spent on social service.

In his account of life at New Carlisle, he said that this is a railway town with many of the inhabitants employed in the railway service. He described in detail the area at the mouth of the St. Lawrence where German U-boats sunk so many merchant vessels. He said that about 32 steamers were sunk early in the war. Submarines were actually sighted by the residents there, he said. He told about many people who were regarded with suspicion and in particular about one who came to New Carlisle to the local hotel. He was reported to the local R.C.M.P. who eventually picked him up and found he was a Lt. Commander of the German Navy. He was quite cooperative with the authorities, and was used in the intelligence service.

Mr. Hayward was thanked by chairman, Mr. A. S. Hopkins, for his interesting address. Some letters for the evening were read by Mrs. Robson at the piano. One guest, Mr. Ralph Morehouse of Moncton, N. B., was present. In the absence of the regular secretary, George Walker, Ralph MacFarlane acted in this capacity. A report of the dance committee was given by Mr. Frank Cameron which showed a small financial gain but all agreed that the Easter dance was a great social success.

Delegates Meet To Bargain On Wheat Prices

LONDON, April 17 - (Reuters) - Delegates from nearly every country in the Western world met here today to bargain on the price of the earth's most important food - wheat.

They began private talks to renew the international wheat agreement, under which most of the world's exportable wheat is bought and sold.

It is a long, involved document of price ceilings and floors, quotas, clauses and sub-clauses. Its effect on the man-in-the-street in the importing countries is great.

If the price of his bread has remained steady since March, 1949, he can thank the International Wheat Agreement. It was signed in Washington in July 1953. Canada is one of the signatories.

Its object is to prevent violent fluctuations in the price of wheat. Importing countries gained this concession from the exporters because they guaranteed to buy a fixed amount yearly.

The talks here today will centre not so much on whether to renew the agreement - that seems pretty certain - but on what prices will be paid in the next few years.

Poland Boosts Military Budget

STOCKHOLM, April 17 - (Reuters) - Poland is nearly doubling her military expenditure in a record budget this year.

Details of the new budget reaching here list her military expenditures at 6,601,926,000 zlotys (\$1,680,000,000) or about 10 per cent of her total budget. The figure is almost twice last year's arms appropriations.

Official figures show her expenditure on secret police and counter-espionage has been more than doubled in the last two years since the appointment of the Russian-born Marshal Rokossovski as Polish defence minister.

No Agreement On Railway Wages

TORONTO, April 17 - (CP) - W. P. Kennedy, international president of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, said today the union has given up hope of reaching an agreement with the railways through negotiation.

He said it is preparing to take its case for a 35-per-cent wage increase to conciliation.

The union represents 25,000 running trades workers and switchmen on Canadian railways. In seeking the wage boost, it is aiming at making Canadian rates equal to those in the United States.
