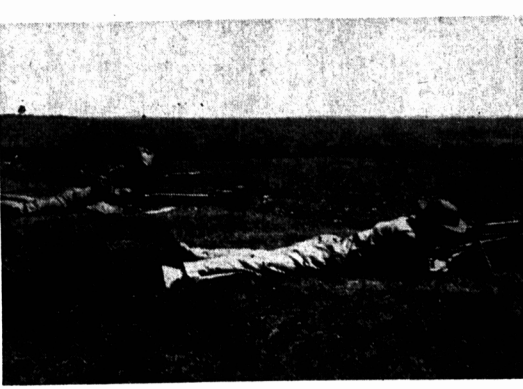

Quebec Distance Swimmer Conquers Lake St. John

ROBERVAL, Que. (CP)—Quebec City distance swimmer Jacques Amyot battled for 11 hours and 48 minutes Saturday through storm-tossed Lake St. John to become the first person ever to swim across the 21-mile stretch of northern Quebec water.

Amyot was the only swimmer of five who started to complete the first attempt made on the lake. He took to the water at 5:15 a.m. at Roberval and swam ashore at Riverview, still comparatively fresh and well, at 5:03 p.m.

Heavy winds and four separate rain storms whipped the water into five-foot waves. At one point, Amyot spent three-quarters of an hour circling aimlessly when the compass in his pilot boat went away. A patrol boat put the swimmer back on course.

Although the victory went to Amyot, much of the praise was reserved for 16-year-old Louise Parenteau of Trois-Rivieres, Que., who might have also conquered the lake had she not been forced some five miles off course by the fierce storms.

The home run hitters in the City Baseball League are finding the range more consistently of late. In the last pair of games played between the Flyers and the Stars there have been no less than four balls hoisted out of the confines of the park. Kip Ready blasted two of them but his first was taken off the record books when the Stars couldn't come to bat in their half of the last inning when the game was called because of darkness.

Elmer MacNeil, the Flyers right fielder, with the big-league arm, clubbed one in the first game and Rilly Purcell led off the last of the ninth in Sunday's encounter with his third of the season.

Ready just missed a second round-tripper in his last time at bat in Sunday's go when he sent Earl MacKinnon scampering to the center-field fence to pull down a clout that looked destined for the green fields beyond. Up to the present Kip was having a run of tough luck with his drives. He had been hitting the ball hard all year but almost invariably the outfielders seemed to be standing at the appropriate spot and turned his clouts into outs.

At the beginning of the year local baseball observers were of the opinion that the Flyers just might be the weak-sisters of the league. They looked to have the slickest infield of the three teams but their batting was questionable; so questionable in fact that it seemed doubtful that even the work of their highly polished infield crew could make up for it. Fiddler MacDonald's nine are now serving the prophets with an unsavory word salad as they top the league standings by four points over the Dodgers and lead both of the other teams in fielding and batting averages.

The Flyers have in the numbers 3, 4 and 5 spots in their lineup a trio of batters that are causing pitches to get weak in the knees at the sight of them striding to the plate. Jack Burke, batting third is the league's leading hitter with a healthy .350 average; Kip Ready comes next is a long ball hitter with an average just over .300 and Elmer MacNeil, another gentleman quite capable of sending baseballs on long trips, takes up the rear in case shaking hurriers might get the idea that a free ticket to Ready might be the best solution in a tough situation. Elmer's batting average is hovering slightly under .350.

A switch-hitter is an asset to any team and the Flyers boast one of this rare species in Cuker Pineau who, as lead-off batter, gets his share of blows. Bobby Lund in sixth position is a scrappy young lad that is a thorn in any pitcher's side. Then we have Bernie Gallant, who got off to a very busy start in his last 12 trips to the plate has blasted out 2 triples, 2 doubles and a single, and along with Jimmy Farly and Merlin Devine rounds out the heaviest hitting batting aggregation in the league.

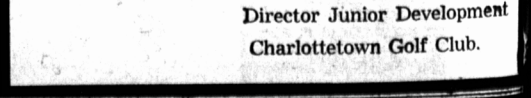
