Conclude Sale Of Citadelles Hockey Club
QUEBEC, (CP) - Sale of Quebec Citadelles Junior hockey club by Frank Byrne to Hon. Gerald Martineau, honorary president of the Quebec Frontenacs, was concluded Tuesday in the office of Frontenac lawyer Camille Noel.
A joint statement issued said no political influence was involved in the sale.
The amount was not disclosed, but it was reported Monday night in Toronto, where the sale was agreed to at a meeting of the Ontario Hockey Association, that the price was \$26,500.
Mr. Noel issued the joint statement from Mr. Byrne and Mr. Martineau. It said:
"The Citadelles Hockey Team, Inc., was sold today by Mr. Frank Byrne to Hon. Gerald Martineau, honorary president of the Frontenac team.
"A statement was made in Toronto on Monday last that pressure had been put on Mr. Frank Byrne by political groups in Quebec.
"Mr. Noel emphasized that no such pressure had at any time been made on him and both the Hon. Gerald Martineau and Mr. Byrne stated jointly that the matter of the sale had been settled on friendly business terms, cooperating in the best interest of hockey in the Province of Quebec, and in the City of Quebec in particular."
Mr. Noel said the sale involved all players and equipment in the Citadelles organization.
He said no decision has been reached as to the make up of the Frontenac Club, which now will include players from both teams.
Frontenacs play in the Quebec Junior Hockey League. After six years in the Quebec League, Citadelles this season joined the Junior A group of the OHA.
