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18 Cases In Alberton Court

—There were 18 cases on the docket at the Alberton Court House yesterday, July 20th. With Magistrate R.S. Hinton, K.C., presiding, two persons, one from Alberton and one from St. Louis, charged with driving without a license, under the Highway Traffic Act, were fined \$5.00 and costs. Three parties, one from Alberton, South and two from Nail Pond, were charged under the Temperance Act, with illegal possession, and fined \$25.00 each and costs.

A party from North Cape charged under the Temperance Act, with possession of liquor in a place other than his residence, was convicted and fined \$20.00 and costs. A person from Norway charged with assault and also attempted injury to cattle had both cases adjourned.

A party from Nail Pond charged with obstructing police was fined \$30.00 and costs. A party from Campbellton charged with damage to property was fined \$1.00 and costs and ordered to pay damages.

A party from Alberton South charged under the Excise Act with possession of a still, and also under the Temperance Act with illegal possession of spirits, had both cases adjourned until August 3rd.

Two persons from Duvar charged with theft of chickens had the case withdrawn on payment of costs of prosecution and reimbursement of the owner.

A woman from Duvar, charged under the Temperance Act with illegal possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor was convicted and fined \$200.00 and costs. Prosecution was conducted by Alberton Detachment of the R.C.M.P. No defense counsel present.

—CAR-TRUCK COLLISION—A truck driven by a party from Miscouche and a car belonging to Carl's Taxi collided yesterday in front of The Clifton Hotel. The truck, it is understood, was coming up Queen Street and the taxi was proceeding west along Water Street. A fender on the taxi sustained considerable damage—as well as the left front wheel and the vehicle had to be towed away. The truck was only slightly damaged. Two other minor collisions occurred during the day, one between an American car and a local car in front of Smallmans and another between two local cars in front of the Foley Drug Company. In neither of the latter was there damage to any extent.—S.

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MUDDY

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Mississippi, the 300 residents of West Alton at the juncture refused to leave their homes where in some places the water was three feet deep.
The crest at St. Charles, 18 miles north of here, was 37.4 feet, the highest in 107 years.
Thousands of additional acres were flooded there as most of the dikes went out. Already nearly 60,000 acres were under water in that area. Altogether 1,500,000 acres of cropland has been inundated between Kansas City and here.
R. H. Muser, regional director for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service in the Upper Mississippi, has estimated agricultural damage in Missouri from the flood will exceed \$100,000,000.
Army engineers, although they admitted that most of the levees at the confluence of the two rivers would go out, still felt confident about dikes downstream from St. Louis.
