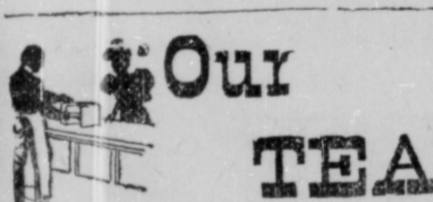

PEACE CONGRESS

American Mediation Scheme Adopted by the Sub-Committee.

THE HAGUE, June 1.—The American mediation scheme was unanimously adopted at yesterday's sitting of the sub-committee, which embodied as article 7 the scheme prepared by the sub-committee, with few alterations.

The first commission, by a vote of 18 to 3, had adopted a resolution prohibiting the use of dum-dum (or flattened bullets.) Italy, Austria and Great Britain formed the minority. It was resolved to prohibit the use of explosives from balloons and explosive bullets.

An agreement was found to be impossible on all the important proposals, and the conviction is growing more than ever that the work of the first commission is doomed to failure.

The second section of the R-I Cross committee is also encountering difficulties, as the American and British members are opposed to the proposed regulations as being too stringent.

A WESTERN TORNADO.

Several Settlements in Iowa and Illinois Damaged.

MALVERN, Iowa, May 31.—A tornado swept over the northern part of Mills County last night, doing much damage to farm property. The house and barn and outbuildings of John Rohrburg, a prominent farmer living two miles north of Minerva, were totally destroyed, his little girl, aged eleven years, was killed; one of his sons had a leg broken, and others of the family were less seriously injured. Considerable stock was killed.

LINCOLN, Ill., May 31.—A tornado swept over this section early today, coming from the southwest and covering a territory 150 yards wide and extending ten miles in length. At Lawn Dale the Chicago & Alton depot and several other buildings were wrecked, but no loss of life is reported.

SILVER CREEK, Ia., May 31.—A small tornado struck last night near Kingsley, in Plymouth County. Buildings on three farms were destroyed, but no loss of life is reported. A storm is supposed to have done considerable damage near Jefferson, Ind., and injured a few persons.

Justice in Russia.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The president has been appealed to by Adolph Lipszye, a veteran of the civil war, to intercede for him with the Russian government and secure a pardon for him. He went to Russia in 1866 to obtain a portion of his father's estate. He was arrested, but being a naturalized American, was released and banished from Russia. The petitioner recites that he thinks this an auspicious time, during the disarmament congress, to obtain a pardon and thereby obtain his portion of the property.

A Monument for Dewey.

CHICAGO, June 1.—The Lincoln Park board decided yesterday to erect a \$100,000 monument to Admiral Dewey, the amount to be raised by subscription.

An Insane Mother's Crime.

NEWMARKET Ont., June 1.—Mrs. J. Witt, of West Toronto Junction, this evening smashed the head of her six months old baby with an axe, and then committed suicide by drowning. She had been in bad health for some time.

ST. JOHN'S EXHIBITION.—The St. John exhibition will open on Monday September 11th and close on Wednesday September 20th.

LABRADOR COPPER FIELDS.—The steamer St. Olat has sailed from Quebec for Labrador, with an exploration party. Extensive copper deposits at Watchicor river are sought after.

LOTS OF SEALS.—Advices from St. John's N. F., say that the seal fishery this year is the most successful within the last dozen years. Although, it is estimated that the total catch of the regular fleet will reach 300,000. Probably 40,000 or 50,000 more will be taken by the people ashore.

POLICE COURT.—This morning the case of John P. Joy, charged by Flora Findly with committing an indecent assault upon her against her will, on the 20th of May, was heard by Stipendiary Magistrate Hazard. The Magistrate after hearing the girl's evidence remanded Joy to the Supreme Court for trial. The prisoner's case was looked after by Mr. W. S. Stewart, Q. C. Mr. A. Peters represented the prosecution.

THE CARNIVAL OF NATIONS.—The second performance of the Carnival of Nations in the Opera House last evening did not attract a very large audience. But the presentation throughout was excellent, reflecting the fullest credit upon Professor McQuattie, Miss McD. maid, and the young ladies and gentlemen assisting them. The cake walk prize was captured by Messrs. Peter McDonald and W. L. Harvie.

MINER'S NARROW ESCAPE.—A Springhill, N. S., despatch says: John F. McDonald, coal cutter, had a narrow escape from death. He and his son worked together in a mine, both careful and industrious workmen. While the father was engaged with his work a part of the rock and coal roof caved in upon his head. He suffered cuts and contusions on both sides of the head, and upon the shoulder.

LIABILITY FOR LOSSES.—The question of liability of sleeping-car corporations for the money of their passengers has been before the New York courts. A man while asleep, was robbed of \$12.50 which he had pinned with a safety pin in his watch pocket. He first got a verdict for the amount; next this was reversed, and he got nothing; then on a second appeal a new trial was decreed with an intimation that he ought to have had restored a sufficient amount for his journey only.

FORT AUGUSTUS CHURCH.—The work on the interior of Fort Augustus Church is now in full swing. A number of carpenters and plasterers are employed. Mr. A. D. Steele is foreman of the work, and is pushing it on with all possible speed. As a foreman, Mr. Steele has very few equals on the Island. He takes particular pride in doing his work well, and is not afraid but it will bear inspection, when it will have passed out of his hands. The big tea on the 13th of July, will be held on the church grounds.

A CHILD DROWNED.—An Antigonish despatch says: Eva McDonald, a little two-and-a-half year-old daughter of Roderick McDonald, blacksmith, of this town, was drowned at noon today. With a number of other children of her age, she was playing by the Clyde Falls river, which passes through the town, and fell in. The other children became frightened, and ran home without giving the alarm. The child was seen floating down the river by Sarah McGilvray, who drew her ashore, but it was extinct.

A CLERGYMAN MARRIED.—Rev. Alfred Gaudier, pastor of Fort Massey church, and Miss Jean Waters, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Waters, of Ontario, Canada, were married at noon yesterday at Newark, N. J., at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. William Clark, 346 Mt. Prospect avenue. Mrs. Clark is a cousin of the bride. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Dr. Donald Sage McKay of the collegiate church, New York, assisted by R. v. President Forrest, of Dalhousie college, and the Rev. Professor Iverach, of Aberdeen, Scotland.—Halifax Herald, June 2

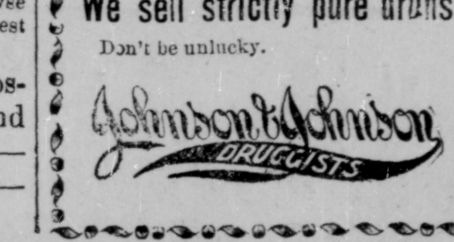
