Mr. Prowse and his family who live in a portion of the building in which the shop is located, were not at home when the robbery was committed.

THE CASE WAS WITHDRAWN.—Prof. Thomas, a dancing master of Toronto, was introduced the other day to Rev. J. M. Wilkinson, a divine, who shortly before had made some strictures on the practice of dancing. The professor did not take long to inform the Rev. gentleman that he did not know what he was talking about. Mr. Wilkinson then informed Mr. Thomas that if he would take some of the polish off his boots and apply it to his intellect, matters would be improved all round. The dancing-master had Mr. Wilkinson charged with using insulting language, but he was persuaded to withdraw the charge before the case was called in court.

She said that on that morning her husband while intoxicated beat her about the head and compelled her to go out for liquor for him; also that on Monday morning at one o'clock he dragged her little boy out of bed and made him go out and look for liquor, the mother going with him. She says further, that when her husband is drinking she has to go out and look for food for her four little children among the charity shops. SIR JOHN MACDONALD'S HEALTH.

Doctors enjoin Complete Rest for the Present.

OTTAWA, May 29.

Sir John Macdonald has been unwell all this week. Last evening the following bulletin was issued by Dr. Powell of Ottawa and Drs. Ross and Stewart of Montreal:

"Sir John Macdonald has had a return of his attack of physical and nervous prostration. We have enjoined complete rest for the present and entire freedom from public business."

In view of this opinion, Sir John will not probably lead the House of Commons again this session.

There is no truth in the report that Sir Charles Tupper has been cabled for. At present there is no ground for serious alarm.

HOME RULE.

Archbishop Croke Afraid that the Cause is Lost.

DUBLIN, May 29.

Archbishop Croke said yesterday that he was really afraid that the Home Rule cause is lost. Within the last four months he had heard several staunch, intelligent Irishmen say that considering all that had occurred since the revelations in the O'Shea case, and the strange action of a section of the Irish people, preferring the interests of one man to the cause of the entire country, Ireland had given both friends and foes to believe it utterly unfit for Home Rule.

Dr. McGlynn's Lecture on the School Question.

About 800 people gathered in Mechanics Hall last night to hear Rev. Edward McGlynn, D. D., formerly pastor of St. Stephen's Church, New York city, lecture on "The Public Schools and Their Encroachments."

Fr. McGlynn on rising was loudly applauded. He thanked Dr. Thomas for his friendly words and the audience for its warm welcome. He began by saying that if there were any in the audience who had come there in the hope of hearing him revile or calumniate the Catholic religion, or to see him pose before them as "a converted priest," they were going to be disappointed. He was as much a Catholic to-day as he ever was, notwithstanding his suspension from the priesthood. His quarrel was not with the religion, but it was with certain high officials of the church, with whom he was at variance on some important points.—Worcester Times.
