PROVINCIAL FINANCES.

Beyond the developments of the late session are crowded out of view by questions of Federal importance, it may be well to consider the recent financial history and the future prospects of the Province.

When Mr. Fred. Peters asked leave to issue certificates to the tune of \$185,000.00, the exact sum due the banks was \$53,442.21. There was then no permanent debt of any kind. Practically, that \$53,442.21 was the full measure of the Provincial debt at that juncture. Now suppose that Mr. Peters had then adopted, not the money-lenders' policy, but the policy of a prudent, honest and thrifty farmer administering the affairs of the Farmers' Province.

In that case, he would, with his majority in both Houses, have proceeded to cut down expenses, and, and, at the same time, impose a tax sufficient to meet necessary expenditures; and he would have put aside all sums received in payment for public lands, and applied the amount so obtained to the reduction of the public debt.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Dr. Osborne's lecture in Y. M. C. A. Hall on Tuesday evening will, without doubt, be very interesting. We advise everyone to go to it.

—An analysis of the ashes which fell 150 miles away from Cotopaxi at the time of its last eruption shows them to consist mainly of sulphate of quartz, magnetite and specular iron ore. One sample yielded silver at the rate of 200 grains to the ton.

—There is a girl named Marguerite Rouvenvau at Theneles, in the north of France, near Saint Quentin, who is reported to have been asleep for the past eleven years. Occasionally she has had hysterical cries, but did not awake after them.

—President Cleveland says: "It is a time for the American people to reason together as members of a great nation which can promise them continuance of protection and safety only so long as its solvency is unassailed, its honor unshaken and the soundness of its money unquestioned."

—In the nine months ending March, United States exports fell off by nearly \$7 million dollars, while imports increased by 55 millions. Tariff reduction has not created a market abroad for the products of the country, but it appears to have resulted in the freer admission of foreign goods.

—A difficulty has arisen in respect to the proposed Boston celebration of the Christian Endeavor Society. Upon the assumption, apparently, that the people of Canada are annexationists, held back by the tyrannical power of Great Britain, and caring nothing for the Mother Country, "an attempt has been made to turn this into a glorification of Yankee military triumphs and Yankee patriotism, and to make it distinctly anti-British in its character."

—The opposition newspapers are feeling the want of a policy on the Manitoba school question, and they are appealing to Mr. Laurier to declare himself. The St. John Record says:—

"The announcement is made that Hon. Mr. Laurier has taken up his quarters at the Russell House, and is preparing for the session. How would it do if the honorable gentleman would come out of his shell of silence he has adopted, and place himself squarely before the people on the Manitoba school question? He is gaining nothing by the staid he is taking, rather he is losing many friends. Inactivity has defeated the aims of other leaders, and the time is now in Canada when no man can afford to hide in silence as Mr. Laurier is doing. He has some opinion on the matter. He should say what it is."

Seven newspapers of Tokio have been suppressed. It is said that sea sickness is rare on vessels fitted with bilge keels. There are now eighty ships engaged in the business of carrying frozen meat to England.

The aggregate sum to be obtained from the income tax in the U. S. is officially placed at \$15,040,000.

At Evans and Dr. Babb, bedfellows in an Oklahoma hotel, quarrelled over a proper division of the bed clothing and Evans shot Babb dead.

The West Virginia house of delegates has passed a law forever disfranchising any man having been convicted of selling his vote or of taking money for it.

Europeans do not take kindly to American confections. The man who kept the peanut and popcorn stall at the recent Antwerp exposition lost \$5,000.

The inventory of the estate of a miser, who died recently near Centre, Mo., shows \$35,000 in cash, deeds for 720 acres of land, and \$8 in household effects.

The French idea that France is a good country to live in is illustrated by the fact that the French immigrants in the last fiscal year numbered only 3,662 persons—2,112 men and 1,550 women.

Refugees from Cuba are arriving at Kingston, J. A., daily. The latest arrivals report the town of Las Palmas burned by the insurgent leader Cebreco, and the town of Bayamo is besieged by the rebel leader Crombel, with 500 men.

Rev. George Munro, of Hamilton, Ont., surprised his congregation recently by declaring that the fourth commandment is not binding on Christians, but is distinctly cancelled in the New Testament.

Mr. Munro also openly declared himself in favor of Sunday street cars.

The women of Baltimore have formed a good government club with seventy members. The purposes announced are to look after the economical and efficient management of city affairs, to promote cleanliness, health and beauty, and to establish cooking schools for the training of young women.

Mr. Graham, widow of the late Norman Graham, of Fox Harbor, N. S., who died on April 1st last, aged 84 years, had a peculiar wish carried out. She was buried in the cemetery at St. John's, N. S., with the proviso that she should be buried in her wedding dress. The dress during all these years had been carefully preserved for that purpose. Her wedding dress, therefore, became her shroud.

THE RECENT BYE ELECTIONS

Opinions of the Press of the Upper Provinces.

The papers to hand to-day contain references to the recent bye elections. The Montreal Star says that the Manitoba school question, for its part, so slightly affects the result that Protestant Halldmand rejects Mr. McCarthy, while Catholic Vercheres and Antigonish reject the candidates sent to them definitely on the "remedial order" platform.

On the other hand, it is equally true that all four members elected are pledged to support redress for the Manitoba minority, and that the most decisive victory of the day was over the non-remedial legislation candidate in the field.

The Evening Journal (Independent Conservative) thinks the Government has a good deal to congratulate itself on in the Halldmand result. It holds that McCarthy and Sifton made a radical mistake in announcing an entire defiance of remedial legislation. The Privy Council judgment declared that the Manitoba Catholics have a just grievance, and all fair-minded Protestants should accept that judgment and should desire to remedy the wrong in a fair degree, though possibly not to the extent or the exact nature specified at present by the Dominion.

The Mail and Empire (Con. organ) in an editorial on the result of the bye-elections, says: "Better results of the Government might reasonably have been expected, but, on the whole, the fact that hitherto Quebec West it has retained. The Liberals did not try their fortunes there. Antigonish in the far east, it has lost. It must be remembered, however, that Antigonish is a Liberal county. Vercheres the Government failed to win, although it made a strong fight. But Vercheres is another Liberal county. Halldmand has been carried by a majority that is simply tremendous, the majority of State leaving his opponent in a plight that is calculated to win him the pity of even the least humane among us. The secret of Mr. McCarthy's success in the failure to be found, not so much in his own speeches, or in those of the Manitoba missionaries, as in the logical bearing of his campaign. He would have been on a strong ground had he been attacking an exercise of the power of disallowance. But in opposing the course which the Government was compelled to take equivalent as it was to an appeal to Manitoba to settle its own disputes and difficulties and render Dominion interference impossible—he was at war with the constitution as judicially interpreted and with common sense as well. What is more, in denouncing against the remedial clauses he was destroying the great safeguard provided for our British and Protestant fellow-subjects in Quebec in the matter of education."

"At the last election in Halldmand the Conservative candidate was returned by a majority of 78. In this election we find the majority increased to 647. These figures surely have some significance beyond the number it is admitted, that Dr. Montague is a very strong candidate in this county. The figures prove, we believe, that people recognize that the Government has so far made no mistake in regard to Montague, that he has done the only thing possible under the circumstances; that until it makes a positive blunder it is deserving of the support of all loyal Canadians."

The Montreal Gazette remarks: In Protestant and Orange Halldmand, where ultra Protestant Mr. McCarthy and Attorney-General Sifton, of Winnipeg, exerted themselves to the utmost to secure a judgment of the voters against the Government for its action on behalf of the Roman Catholics of Manitoba, Dr. Montague, a member of the Government, received an almost phenomenal majority. In Vercheres, which is solidly Protestant, and in Antigonish, 13,800 of whose 16,000 population are Roman Catholics, liberal opponents of the Government assumed the duties of the Government. The issue was in each case put as straightly as possible. The appeal on behalf of the Government candidates was direct. In Halldmand the Conservative nominee was opposed on the ground that he approved of the Manitoba order-in-council. It was natural to expect that in Vercheres and Antigonish those who were standing on the same political platform would receive the sympathy of the co-religionists of the Manitoba Catholics, for whose sake Dr. Montague was put to loss and inconvenience and threatened with defeat. The Government did right in the Manitoba matter. It carried out the plain meaning of the Privy Council decision, which declared that the Manitoba Catholics had been deprived of an educational privilege which it was in the power of the Dominion Government to restore. But in doing what it considered its duty it evidently did not strengthen itself in the country.

The Vercheres election has put Mr. Tarte decidedly forward in the Liberal ranks. He took Mr. Geoffroy under his wing, spoke in the constituency in his behalf, and when Mr. Laurier retired to his tent, he was the man who ordinarily fell to the party leader. He shares the honors of Mr. Geoffroy's success, and will go to Ottawa with increased prestige, and will naturally be regarded as entitled to a portfolio in the course of time. Canada sees a second Liberal administration in power at Ottawa. Then, the question suggests itself, will he tell what he did with that \$5,000 of Contractor Whelan's money he received from Mr. Poirer?

Mr. Sifton, of Manitoba, made his appeal that his province should be left alone in the wrong constituency. Instead of invading Orange Halldmand he should have gone into Catholic Vercheres and Antigonish. He would then have had a chance to say that his talk had some effect.

The leader of the Third Party was hickled in Halldmand, but it was like a man. Mr. McCarthy stood up before his constituency, said his mistaken say, and took the consequences. The chiefs of the Liberal division of the Opposition ran away when they heard the bugle sound.

The Government majority was all right. It was bunched in Halldmand, a little too much, that was all.

PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

The Manitoba School Question.
Opinion of a Member of the House.

OTTAWA, April 22.
A member of the Manitoba Legislature, now in Ottawa, holds the opinion that Greenway will dissolve the Manitoba House and appeal to the country to sustain its attitude on the school question. He does not look for any action when the House reassembles next month, beyond the passage of a resolution resending any form of interference whatever with provincial affairs by the Federal Parliament.

NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.
Significant Remarks by Mr. Laurier.

OTTAWA, April 22.
There is a feeling among the lobbies of the House that after all, the Manitoba Government may do something in the direction of restoring the rights and privileges of which the Catholic minority have been deprived, the feeling being based on Mr. Laurier's significant remarks in his speech on the 13th inst. The Manitoba Government has been left to apply a remedy to the evil which had been created by their own legislation. Mr. Laurier thus goes to the length of admitting that the Greenway Government has created "an evil."
