# Orioles Edge Indians 7-5; Redlegs Blank Cardinals

BALTIMORE (AP)—Baltimore Orioles Thursday night rattled off 13 hits, including two-run homers by Jim Marshall and Gus Triandos, for a 7-5 victory over Cleveland Indians.

Connie Johnson, the third of four pitchers used by manager Paul Richards, picked up his third triumph against five defeats.

Veteran reliever Don Mossi, who took over from starter J. T. (Mudcat) Grant in the fourth, absorbed his sixth defeat against four victories.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Neil Chrisley's third straight hit, a triple off the rightfield wall in the eighth inning, drove home Rocky Bridges and gave Washington Senators a 6-5 victory over Chicago White Sox Thursday night.

Victim of Chrisley's drive was Early Wynn, who had relieved Dick Donovan in the seventh inning. Winning pitcher was Washington's relief ace, Dick Hyde, who supplanted starter Pedro Ramos in the top of the eighth

after Al Smith's second homer of the night, this one with one aboard, tied the score at 5-5.

Hyde had to survive a serious jam in the ninth inning to gain his fourth victory in five decisions, all in relief.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Brooks Lawrence stopped St. Louis Cardinals Thursday night on six hits for a 5-0 shutout backed by robust 10-hit support from his Cincinnati Redleg teammates.

Lawrence allowed only two Cardinals to reach second base. He didn't issue a single walk and struck out five to get his fourth victory.

Ed Bailey slammed a two-run homer in the eighth and Frank Robinson hit a solo homer to finish the Cincinnati scoring in the ninth.

Vinagar Bend Mizell was the Cardinal loser.

The Cards' veteran batting star, Stan Musial, went hitless. Musial now has gone 10 times at bat without a hit.

NEW YORK (AP)—Elston Howard drove in the winning run with a 12th-inning single for a 3-2 victory Thursday night as New York Yankees gained a split with Kansas City in a day-night doubleheader. The Athletics, who won the opener 4-1 fell to third place with the defeat.

Murry Dickson, 42-year-old Athletics righthander, went all the way and had shut out the American League leuters after the sixth inning, when Bill Skowron's sixth home run had tied it two-all. Little Murry, now 4-2, had left seven men on base over the 9th, 10th and 11th innings.

Rookie Ryne Duren gained a 3-1 record with the nightcap victory, fanning four of the five men he faced after relieving starter Whitey Ford with men on first and second and one out in the 11th.

The Athletics gained their first victory at Yankee Stadium in 18 starts since July 22, 1956, in the opener.

## Tim Tam Never To Race Again

NEW YORK (AP)—Tim Tam, who won four major three-year-old races including the Kentucky Derby and the Preakness, will never race again because of an ankle injury suffered during the Belmont Stakes.

Jimmy Jones, who trains the Calumet farm horses for Mrs. Gene Markey of Lexington, Ky., said Tim Tam will undergo an operation Tuesday or Wednesday at the University of Pennsylvania's school of veterinary medicine in Philadelphia.

"I have no hopes he'll ever race again," said Jones after examining x-rays of the broken sesamoid bone in Tim Tam's right front ankle. The bone forms the knob at the back of the fetlock joint just above the foot.

"He's ruined, and about all we can do is save him for the stud," Veterinarian Dr. William O. Reed said radiium treatment is being used to help cut down the swelling so the operation can be performed.

Tim Tam won eight straight races going into the 1½-mile Belmont Stakes, in which he was attempting to complete the Triple Crown sweep. The bone apparently broke as he battled for the lead with Cavan at the head of the stretch a quarter of a mile from the finish. Cavan drew off to win as Tim Tam hobbled.

The \$2,920 he earned for finishing second in the Belmont made his 1958 total \$467,200—most earned by any horse this year to date.
