Enjoyable Reunion Held By Veterans Of The 105th

The "Old Sweats" of the 105th Battalion, more than one hundred strong, met at the Canadian Legion Home here yesterday afternoon and last evening for a reunion. They transacted their business at a meeting at 4 p.m. They paraded to the monument at 5 p.m. where Past President, T.E. MacNutt and the new President M.J. Lea, laid a wreath in honor of comrades who have passed on. And they sat around the festive board at 6.30 for their closing dinner.

Major T.E. MacNutt, the retiring president was in the chair for the business meeting and master of ceremonies for the dinner. Old soldiers don't like speeches and they listened to very few last night. Cec Palmer, Cambridge, Mass., the battalion proud as he recalled a few of the highlights of the unit's feats and recalled that they stood at the top in so far as deeds of valor and recognition of such deeds are concerned.

"If we could glance today through the official records at Ottawa, I am sure that our unit would compare with any of them in so far as these things are concerned," Mr. Palmer told the group.
