BRITISH LEGATION WAS ALL RIGHT

On Monday of Last Week.

EUROPEAN TRANSPORT SEIZED BY CHINESE AND BOXERS.

They also Capture the Town of Blagov Chensk.

LONDON, July 18.—William Pritchard Morgan today received by cable a positive assurance from a source upon which he relies that the British legation at Peking was still standing on July 9th.

HONG KONG, July 18.—All foreign consuls in Canton had an interview with Li Hung Chang on July 15th, but failed to dissuade him from going north. Li Hung Chang is said to have willingly accepted the full responsibility for any disturbances in Canton during his absence.

Li Hung Chang is expected to reach Hong Kong to-day and will see the Government tomorrow. Afterwards he will proceed northward.

LONDON, July 18.—According to a despatch from Shanghai in the Daily Mail of yesterday, a massacre occurred on July 9, at Tai Yuen Fu, capital of the Province of Shan Si, forty foreigners and a hundred native Christians being killed.

LONDON, July 18.—The Daily Mail publishes a despatch from St. Petersburg which asserts that there is no doubt that China has declared war against Russia.

The Russian press says that the correspondence is restricted to the publication of official details, and the publication of many despatches from the front has been prohibited.

I hear that Chinese troops and the Boxers seized a European transport vessel laden with munitions, near Aigun, on the Amur River about 18 miles from the Russian frontier, killing almost entirely the Russian escorts. They next suddenly attacked and bombarded the town of Blagov Chensk, capital of the Amur government. The government held out bravely but was overwhelmed. Nearly all perished and the town was burned.

LONDON, July 18.—The guns of the allies did immense damage to the native city of Peking causing many large conflagrations and finally silenced the majority of the enemy's guns.

Simultaneously, 1500 Russians, assisted by small parties of Germans and French, assaulted and captured 8 guns that are in position on the railway embankment and the fort magazine of which the French subsequently blew up.

WASHINGTON, July 18.—The text of a despatch received by Minister Wu is as follows: "Utmost efforts have been made to protect foreign ministers who were well on the 13th, the Chinese calendar corresponding to our July 9th. If Tien Tsin city should be destroyed it would be difficult to restore same in 100 years. Request powers to preserve it as the consequences would affect Chinese and foreign commerce to northern China. As viceroy of Chihli please transmit this despatch to the ministers at other capitals.

This despatch, which is dated July 16th, was signed by the Viceroy Liu Kew Yi and Chang Chih Tung, of Nankin, and Wu Chang, respectively, also by Sheng, the director of Posts and Telegraphs at Shanghai.

It was addressed to the Chinese Minister at London and by him transmitted to Minister Wu in accordance with the request contained in the cablegram. Minister Wu asked the Secretary of the navy to agree with the other powers to protect Tien Tsin from destruction.

The secretary's answer was not made public, but Minister Wu fears the destruction has already occurred. He regards the cablegram as perfectly authentic. The reported massacre of the foreigners at Peking occurred on July 7th.

A Bad Ship

WASHINGTON, July 7.—In answer to an order from the navy department to report upon the powers and capabilities of the New Orleans, Captain Ida and his officers have submitted a lot of data showing in substance that the vessel suffers from a lack of proper ventilation; that her engines are dangerously overheated; and that her engines are defective in several respects. The magazine temperatures run from 95 to 98 degrees, near the danger point of cordite which is carried as ammunition. There is only 180 cubic feet of air space to a man, instead of 1,000 feet allowed by our naval constructors. The ship is without ventilation and the officers and men are obliged to sleep on deck. The engines do not "balance up" at low speed and require four minutes to reverse them.

Big Crops

Estimates of the full wheat crop of the United States, based upon the last Government report, indicate a yield varying from 470 million to 510 million bushels. The actual crop in 1899 was 547 millions; in 1898, 675 millions and in 1897, 530 millions; so we are likely to have the smallest crop of the last four years. The estimates of the corn crop average about 2,200,000,000 bushels, which if realized will be the second heaviest crop on record. It is, however, too early to indulge in any reliable calculations as to the corn crop. Under favorable conditions it might exceed these figures, and with unfavorable circumstances it would very likely fall short. The cotton report showed an average condition of only 75.8 compared with an average of 87.9 for the past ten years. In view of the fact that the acreage of cotton is the largest on record and futures are now selling at big advance, it is probable that the money value of the 1900-1901 crop will far exceed any year on record.
