### SENSATION IN BARBADOES.

Plot to Murder Government Officials.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Sept. 13.—According to advice received here from Barbadoes Mr. Pete, the Speaker of the House of Assembly, died on Sept. 2nd, from the effect of the recent attempt to assassinate him.

The Governor and five public officials have been anonymously warned that a similar fate has been decided for them as a reward for their oppression.

### A Strike Threatened.

LOWELL, Mass., Sept. 10.—The cotton mills of this city are threatenep with an enforced shut-down for a few days by a movement on the part of the back boys each mill to go out on a general strike for the restoration of the old schedule of wages.

### Interesting Fossils.

OTTAWA, Sept. 9.—An interesting find is reported by Mr. L. M. Lambe, of the Geographical Survey, who returned today from a two month's trip, in the Red River districts. It consists of fossil remains of dinosaurs in the cretaceous rocks. The reptiles varied from 20 to 60 feet, and existed ages before the mastodons. Some of them had three horns;

### AN ENTENTE WITH THE U. S.

Mr. Asquith Acknowledges Lord Salisbury's "Great Services."

LONDON, Sept. 12.—Mr Herbert Henry Asquith, Liberal member of Parliament for East Fife, and former Home Secretary, addressing the electors of St. Menance, a few evenings ago, expressed his gratification at the movement for an entente with the United States, and acknowledged Lord Salisbury's "great service in promoting it."

"Nor should we forget," he added, "the valuable influence of the Ambassador in the same direction." With reference to the growth of the United States as a naval and military power, Mr Asquith said he believed, paradoxical as it might seem, that the more points of contact Great Britain had with America, the fewer would be the points of collision.

Dewey has Asked for More Warships.

### STORMY SCENES IN THE SPAN-SENATE.

Count of d' Almenas Mentions the Generals he Wants Disgraced.

MANILA, Sept. 13.—Rear Admiral Dewey says he considers situation critical. It is understood that he has asked for an additional cruiser and battleship.

The Spaniards assert that Germany will take a coaling station here, and that Spain will retain the remainder of the Islands.

MADRID, Sept. 13.—The session of the Senate yesterday was stormy.

Count Dalmenas was challenged to give names of the generals whom he recently said ought to be disgraced.

He replied: "Very well, as you wish it, I will.

The Generals to whom I referred are Generals Weyler, Blanco, and Primo D' Rivera.

I will also include in the same category Admiral Cervera.

This announcement led to an extraordinary scene of tumult.

### CELEBRATION AT ST. ANN'S.

On Saturday the people of St. Ann's parish, Lot 65, laid the corner stone of their new church. Although there was a heavy breeze, the day was a pleasant one, and suited the occasion which it celebrated. A solemn High Mass was chanted by His Lordship Bishop McDonald, assisted by Rev's Dr. Curran and P.O. Gauthier, of St. Dunstan's College, as deacon and sub-deacon respectively, with Rev's Peter Curran and R. McDonald as deacon and sub-deacon of honor and Rev. James E. McDonald, of Hope River, as Arch-priest. Rev. Father Arsenault, private secretary to Archbishop Begin, Quebec, acted as master of ceremonies. The choir was ably assisted by Rev. Theo. Gallant, St. Dunstan's College, and Dr. Gallant, of Rustico. It is, therefore, needless to say that the music was excellent, each part being rendered with pleasing harmony.

After the Gospel was chanted, Rev. R. McDonald, Rustico, delivered an eloquent discourse. He briefly described the manner of worship under the Old and New Law, and with wonted grace explained the sublime efficacy of the Mass, "that infinite sacrifice which figures so prominently in the Christian Dispensation." Having referred to the duties which the creature owes to his Creator, and the reason for building costly temples, he concluded with a cogent vindication of the Catholic Church.

The people of St. Ann's have good reason to be proud of the church which they are erecting. The structure is a modern interpretation of the Gothic model and in architectural beauty has rarely been surpassed. It is well proportioned and commands a most desirable location. Adjoining the main building is a beautiful vestry and the tower which supports an octagonal roof adds much to the appearance of the edifice. Mr. Harris, the architect, as well as the contractors, Messrs Bradley and McDonald, have done their work well and deserve the thanks of all interested. We heartily congratulate the zealous pastor, Rev. D. B. Red, upon the success of the undertaking and hope that it may long remain a monument to the noble hearted people of St. Ann's.

### THINKS THE WAR IS NOT OVER.

Important Interview With General Wheeler.

SAYS PRESIDENT MCKINLEY IS OF SAME OPINION.

Has No Faith That the Peace Commission Will Succeed.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Sept. 13.—The Advertiser prints the following as a portion of an interview with General Joe Wheeler:

"I do not believe the war is over by any means.

"Neither does President McKinley, who told me personally that he had no faith that the peace commission would settle the difference existing with Spain over the Philippines.

### Killed by Accidents.

HALIFAX, Sept. 13.—At the International Coal Mine Pier, North Sydney, C. B., yesterday, Capt. Walker, of the schoener Hector, of Arichat, was struck by a train and killed.

At the Molega gold mine yesterday, Robert Devaney, foreman, and a workman, were killed by dynamite.

### New Judge for the Yukon.

OTTAWA, Sept. 13.—Judge Dugas, of Montreal, has accepted the position of Judge of the Yukon district, as successor to McGuire who is coming out.

Beausoleil, M. P., will get Dugas' position in Montreal.

### French Shore Question.

St. JOHN'S, Nfld., Sept. 12.—The Colonial Government has appointed Mr. Morine, Minister of Finance, to prepare the colony's case for presentation before the Royal Commission with reference to the French shore rights. Mr. Morine is also instructed to accompany the commissioners during their tour along the treaty coast, and to point out the results of French interference with the work of our fishermen. The feeling is general throughout the colony that good results will follow from the visit of the Royal Commission.

### The Dreyfus Case.

PARIS, Sept. 10.—There is a lull in the Dreyfus affair. It is believed that the real difficulty in the way of revision is that the only documents really relied upon are those said to have been obtained illicitly from a foreign embassy; and the government is beginning to doubt the authenticity of these.

A semi-official note issued to day denies that any foreign government has made any sort of communication to the French government relative to the Dreyfus affair.

### The Sheik's Submission.

KHARTOUM, Sept. 10.—An interesting ceremony took place yesterday when the Sidar, General Sir Herbert Kitchener, on visiting the Khalifa's arsenal, found drawn up outside a hundred of the principal sheikhs of the city, who tendered submission and promises of allegiance.

Among them were many old rulers of Soudan departments that had been reduced by the Mahdists, numerous Turks and Egyptians, who were officers in the army of Hickos Pasha, defeated at the battle of El Obeid, in November, 1883, and the native dector of General Gordon.

### To Investigate the War Department.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept 12.—The President has decided to appoint a commission to investigate the War Department. General Schofield and ex-Senator John B. Gordon, of Georgia, have been asked to accept places upon the commission.

Biscuits made of 100 parts of wheat flour, 88 parts of gluten, and a small quantity of wheat, then dried in an oven and smeared with sugar syrup, are now part of the French soldier's rations.

### THE SPANIARDS AND INSURGENTS

Have a Fight in the Philippines.

THE INSURGENTS LOSE FIVE VESSELS,

No Loss on the Spanish Side—Many Insurgents Killed.

MADRID, Sept. 13.—Capt. Aunon, the Minister of Marine, has received an important despatch from the Philippines describing a conflict between Spanish gunboats and an insurgent flotilla in which the former successfully prevented an insurgent landing in Vizcaya.

According to the despatch the insurgents had five vessels, all of which were sunk.

The Spaniards had no loss, but the telegrams assert that hundreds of the insurgents are believed to have perished.
