STILL TALKING OF INVASION And Another New War Policy.

COAST CITIES OF SPAIN WILL BE ATTACKED

If She Does Not Soon Sue For Peace.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.] WASHINGTON, June 17.—Thirty-five transports are to be used in the invasion of Porto Rico.

The point of embarkation will be determined at a conference today. Fernandina or Savannah will probably be the point selected.

The arrival of General Shafter's army at Cuba is looked for in 24 hours.

WASHINGTON, June 17.—A vital blow at Spain is to be struck, and sensational developments are reported scheduled to occur in July.

While the army is engaged with movements against Santiago and Porto Rico, the navy will be getting in readiness to descend upon the coast of Spain and the Canary Islands. This plan first developed in the President's mind. When it became apparent that the prospects of peace were extremely remote they at once felt the necessity of striking a fatal blow at Spain, which would compel her to sue for peace without the necessity of sending a large army to Havana and sacrificing thousands of lives.

Important steps have been taken towards preparing the fleet which will either bombard the seacoast cities of Spain or capture the Canaries.

BIG SPANISH WAR LOAN.

Flour \$50 a Sack.

OTTAWA, June 16.—A private letter received yesterday from Fort Wrangel contains the following: "I hear flour is selling at Teslin lake for fifty dollars a sack of fifty pounds, and almost impossible to get it even at that price. Most of the people there are living on fish straight, and salt is at a premium. The rush into the Klondike has subsided in a measure. There are not nearly so many people coming up now as there were two months ago."

BOMBARDED FOR THE THIRD TIME. Another Attack on Santiago de Cuba.

AND NOT A MAN INJURED ON THE AMERICAN SIDE.

The Batteries Reported to Have Been Destroyed.

OFF SANTIAGO, June 16, via Kingston, Jamaica, June 17.—Rear Admiral Sampson's fleet bombarded the batteries at Santiago de Cuba this morning at daylight.

For hours the ships pounded the batteries at the right and left of the entrance, only sparing El Morro, where Lieut. Hobson and his companions of the Merrimac are imprisoned.

The western batteries, against which the main assault was directed, were badly wrecked.

One was completely shattered, and in the others the guns were dismounted.

At first the Spaniards replied passionately and wildly, but impotently, then most of their guns were deserted.

Not a ship was struck nor a man injured on the American side.

SIR JULIAN WILL STAY.

The British Ambassador at Washington Will be Retained at His Post Another Year.

WASHINGTON, June 16.—Sir Julian Pauncefote, British Ambassador, has been advised by the British foreign office that he will be retained at this post another year. It was expected that he would be recalled in September, when he reaches the age limit in the diplomatic service, and had made all his plans with that circumstance in view.

Representations were made recently by the administration, through Ambassador Hay, that the recall of Sir Julian would interfere with the prompt determination of important diplomatic incidents which were subject of negotiation. Sir Julian will remain possibly until September, 1899.

ANNEXATION OF HAWAII.

Resolutions Easily Carried in the United States House of Representatives.

WASHINGTON, June 16.—By a vote of 209 to 91, the house of representatives, yesterday afternoon, adopted the "new lands" resolution, providing for the annexation of Hawaii. The debate, which has continued without interruption since Saturday, has been one of the most notable of this session, the proposed annexation being considered of great commercial and strategic importance by its advocates, and being looked upon by its opponents as involving a radical departure from the long established policy of the United States and likely to be followed by the inauguration of a pronounced policy of colonization, the abandonment of the Monroe doctrine, and participation in international wrangles. Full half a hundred members participated in the debate. From a party standpoint, the result was awaited with the keenest interest.

The republicans presented practically a unanimous support to the resolutions, but three republican members voting in the opposition. In the democratic ranks the division upon the question was more marked eighteen democrats voting for annexation.

SPANISH STEAMER WILL RUN BLOCKADE With Supplies for the Spanish General.

SAILED FROM KINGSTON FOR CIENFUEGOS YESTERDAY.

Is Expected to be Captured—A Rich Prize.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, June 17.—The Spanish steamer Purisima Concepcion with supplies for Blanco sailed from Kingston yesterday.

An effort to change her colors, to the British flag was abandoned owing to the fear of the heavy penalty for false transfer.

It is the intention of the Concepcion to make a dash for Cienfuegos from which point supplies can be sent by rail to Havana.

The Cruiser Yoaquima arrived at Kingston shortly after the departure of the Concepcion. It is believed here that the Concepcion with her valuable cargo worth \$70,000 will certainly be captured before reaching Cienfuegos.

PROSPECT OF SETTLEMENT.

Sir Charles Tupper Interviewed on the Anglo-American Situation.

LONDON, June 16.—Sir Charles Tupper, the Canadian statesman, who has just arrived here from Canada, is quoted in an interview as discussing lengthily the relations between Canada and the United States. He said: "Canada sympathizes very warmly with the proposed rapprochement between Great Britain and the United States. It has always been our desire to have the most friendly commercial relations with the republic; but hitherto the United States has not shown any disposition to reciprocate. The McKinley and Dingley bills and the alien labor laws presented conclusive evidence on this point. I believe, however, that the present is a most propitious time for the settlement of all questions, and in the changed temper of the American people, I think they can be approached with a fair prospect of a just settlement."
