

# Moncton Hawks Come From Behind For 4-1 Victory Over Saint John

MONCTON, N.B., Jan. 29 (CP)—Moncton Hawks came from behind in the last two periods to down league-leading Saint John Beavers 4-1 in a Maritime Major Hockey League game here tonight.

The win left Hawks six points behind Glace Bay Miners and Halifax St. Mary's who are tied for third place.

Ronnie Rowe, fleet-footed left winger, set the scoring pace for Hawks, scoring a pair. George Scholes and Danny Horeck were the other Moncton scorers.

Johnny Ubriaco netted Beavers' lone tally early in the first period.

The game was a hard-hitting affair. The referees doled out 14 penalties, all but one of them minors, to keep the game in hand.

Matt Mesich drew a major and Rowe a minor when the pair tangled after Mesich rammed the Moncton winger into the boards.

Defensive highlight of the game came in the third period when Ubriaco snared the puck in his own end and raced in on Don Lockhart alone. The Moncton net custodian stood like a rock until the league's top marksman fired and then stuck a pad in front of the shot.

Mesich's penalty was costly to the Beavers. He was still serving time when the third period opened. Nicolle was waved off, leaving Beavers two men short. Hawks failed to score while they had the two-man advantage, but rifled in a pair before Mesich returned at the four-minute mark.

## Williams Scores Winning Goal

NEW GLASGOW, N.S., Jan. 29 (CP)—Pictou Maripacs scored four unanswered goals in the final period tonight to eke out an 8-7 win over league-leading New Glasgow Rangers in a regular A.P.C. Senior Hockey League fixture.

Rangers took a healthy 6-1 lead in the opening period but were out-played from there on. Maripacs came back to make it 7-4 in the second and then continued their scoring in the third, the winning goal coming at 18:02 from veteran Tie Williams.

The win was an important one for the Islanders who now have a five point edge over both the Saints and the Miners. During the first two periods it was hard to realize how the Saints ever became a threat in the league but then it must be remembered that they were on the road most of the evening and had just arrived here before game time. The Beavers apparently softened them up the previous night as several of their stars did not appear to have much last night. This morning the Islanders will leave by air for Moncton and continue to Saint John by bus for tonight's game with the Beavers.

It will be sixteen years ago this summer that a young right hander, who could throw harder than any man since Walter Johnston, led his daddy's cornfields in Des Moines, Iowa and began his pitching career with the Cleveland Indians. In the intervening time Bullet Bob Feller has earned for himself a hatful of records. This spring when he leaves for training camp, in about a month's time, he will be taking an added distinction with him. He is one of the few outstanding stars to see his salary slashed almost in half and then start back up the salary ladder.

Several weeks ago Feller signed his 1952 contract at an estimated \$50,000 which is ten grand more than he took home last season. Last year's performance earned him his increase in pay as baseball is one of the few occupations by which a man is paid on his previous year's record. Feller last year won 22 victories while losing eight games and was the man who cracked the whip in the Indians' pennant drive. In addition he pitched his third no-hitter setting a modern record and he was recently voted the Indians' Baseball Man of the Year.

Five years ago Feller was paid \$30,000 an all-time high for pitchers' salaries. After a brilliant start he injured his back in Philadelphia and wound up with a 20-11 won-lost record. The next season the Indians won the pennant with SNAP SHOT FINISHING

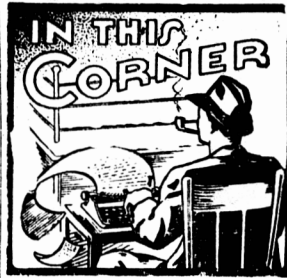

# Islander's Hockey Club

Charlottetown



The Halifax Saints flew home around midnight last night after completing one of their most disastrous road trips in more than a month. In the past two nights they had 15 goals scored against them while scoring only seven and by the end of last night's game young Jimmy Strachan was looking shaky on his stops. His defense gave him little protection in the first two periods and as it was he was lucky that the Islanders did not count more than nine times.

For two periods the Islanders looked like a club that could not be beaten. They showed the same dash and fight as they did here last week against Glace Bay and from the opening minutes the outcome was never in doubt. Coach Lamoureux was elated over the boys playing. He expected the players to let up a little in the third period. "After all we only have thirteen men and they couldn't go all out all the time. They've been playing mighty good hockey for the past few games," said Leo in the dressing room after the match.

The re-shuffling of the forward lines worked out to good advantage. The Marshall line and the Whitlock line each counted for four goals while Beaudry's line came up with the other marker. Denis Smith worked in well with Marshall and Don Bellingier and gave his best performance of the season. Marshall moved into second place in the point scoring race with his four points. Willie now has 61 points, second to Ubriaco.

"Skippy" Frazell, who is still on a try-out with the Islanders, turned in another good performance. "Skippy" got the biggest ovation of the night when he scored his first goal in an Islanders uniform. About a minute after he raced into the net and almost beat Strachan for another goal. He skated hard both ways last night and displayed a good, hard shot.

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# Short-Handed Islanders Score 9-5 Victory Over Halifax St. Mary's Here

The shorthanded Charlottetown Islanders using thirteen players and scrambled forward combinations, tightened their grip on second place in the Maritime League standings last night with a 9-5 win over Halifax St. Mary's in a wide open game at the Forum.

The Islanders ripped through the Saints for eight goals in the first two periods and hung on in the third stanza as the Saints began to roll. The visitors scored three times within three minutes in the last frame but the Islanders pulled themselves together and held the fort the rest of the way.

The second place Islanders moved to within nine points of the Saint John Beavers by virtue of their win. They also pulled five points ahead of the third place Saints and Glace Bay Miners.

Following two rugged skirmishes in the opening minutes the Islanders settled down to teach the Saints a hockey lesson and they scored seven consecutive goals without a Halifax reply within a space of twenty-four minutes.

The game opened at a fast pace and was only 18 seconds old when Don Bellingier pulled the trigger on Jimmy Strachan who had a rough night of it in the Halifax cage. Bellingier's goal signalled what was to follow and within the next 39 minutes the fans saw a lot of pretty goals.

Coach Leo Lamoureux came up with three new effective forward lines. He moved Denis Smith up on Willie Marshall's right wing and the line clicked immediately. "Buck" Whitlock played between Pawlyshyn and Favero. "Hub" Beaudry centred "Skippy" Frazell and Bob Gray. "Bucko" Trainor moved back to defence.

Walter Pawlyshyn and Denis Smith each tallied twice in the rout. Don Bellingier, Bruno Favero, "Skippy" Frazell, Willie Marshall and "Buck" Whitlock scored single goals. Frazell's goal was his first since he joined the Islanders a week ago.

Scoring honors for Halifax were split up among defenseman Bob Drainville and forwards Billy Ford, Dewey Thompson, Kenny MacKenzie and Billy Warwick.

The Islanders were away and running in the first period and they led 3-1 at the end of the stanza. They scored five goals without a reply in the sandwich period to go ahead 8-1. The visitors scored four goals against one by the locals in the last session.

Phil Vitale started matters off on a rough note. Early in the game he was chased for elbowing and engaged in a pushing duel with referee Hugh Gillis. Midway during the first period he mixed it up with Johnny Morrow and topped matters off with a dispute at the Halifax bench.

From then on the Islanders raced through the Saints with reckless abandon. Walter Pawlyshyn scored twice before Morrow returned from the penalty box. Red Vitale's rebound into the open net for his first goal and he forced "Buck" Whitlock's 20 foot pass behind Strachan for his second counter. "Red" Favero drew assists on both goals.

But this was only the beginning. At the one minute mark of the second period Denis Smith raced in towards the Halifax net and tripped Willie Marshall's low shot into the corner of the cage to make the score 4-1.

In the aid of a late season drive by Rapid Robert but for Feller it was the poorest year of his career. He ended with a 19-15 record, lost a heartbreaker to Johnny Sain in the Series opener against the Braves and was shelved from the box in the fifth game at Cleveland before 86,000 derisive fans. Feller took a salary cut and the next year he won only 15 games while losing 14. By then the baseball writers were preparing his obituary. In 1950 he won 16 while losing 11 and last year he dumfounded the experts with a brilliant comeback.

With two or three good seasons Feller might yet enter the select 300 game winners club. Now 33 years of age, he has chalked up 230 victories despite the fact that he gave three of his best years to the United States Navy during the war. His fast ball may not blaze in there any more but Feller has plenty of speed and plenty of brains. He is the one pitcher in the modern age who can truly be called great.

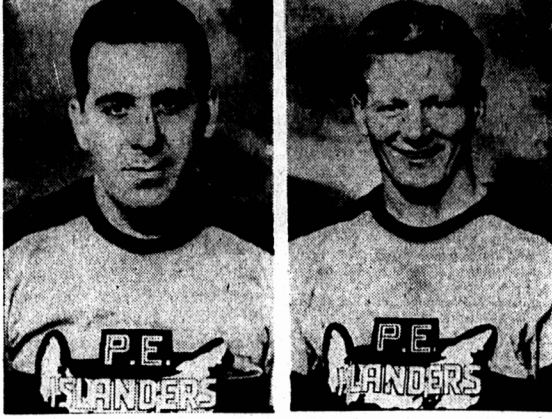

# Third Period Outburst Gives Miners 5-4 Win Over Millionaires

SYDNEY, N.S., Jan. 29 (CP)—Glace Bay Miners tonight stunned Sydney Millionaires and 2,035 supporters with a 5-4 victory here in a Maritime Major Hockey League game.

The accomplishment of the Miners was a spectacular one in that they pranced back in the throes of a 4-1 deficit and hammered home four goals in the last eight minutes of play without a reply from the home club.

It was a rough tangle, reminiscent of old Glace Bay-Sydney scuffling parties and had considerable by-play in the penalty box where Miner defenceman Sheldon Bloomer, a persistent occupant, strove to break through restraining players to cleave a needling fan in the second period.

Penalty paid off and for Miners proved a turning point. Trailing 4-1, Miners struck for their second score at 12:30 of the third period, nine seconds after Sydney's Lorne Pirie had been banished for holding. Pete Wywrot tipped a screened shot from Dean MacBride, a former Millionaire, to start the Glace Bay club rolling.

Two minutes and 12 seconds later playing coach Norman (Bud) Polle, picked his way slowly down the left side and shovelled a forward pass to the Sydney crease where Len (Comet) Haley adjusted the angle.

At 15:42, with Sydney's Bruce Gallagher settling down for an interference penalty, Dean MacBride shot the centerizer, a bouncing and completely screened shot fired from inside the blueline.

Miners continued to press and at 17:57 right winger Bob Leger coasted around his wing with Hub Macey's pass. Well covered by his check, Leger found elbow room and leverage enough for a rising back-hand that dropped over goalkeeper Cliff Hicks' right arm into the net.

With a skating and offensive edge in the first period, Miners failed to crack through a tough, close checking Sydney defence and fell 2-0 in arrears. By the end of the second it was Sydney 4-1.
