ALONG THE GREAT DIVIDE WITH KIRK DOUGLAS, DUE

How five men and a girl make their way across the sun-baked, wind-swept Mojave desert, braving the elements and battling the vengeance of an outlaw mob, forms the background basis for 'Along the Great Divide,' Warner Bros. much-heralded western serial which begins its local engagement at the Capitol Theatre today.

Kirk Douglas, in his first outdoor role, essays the part of a U. S. Marshal forced to escort his prisoners through the blazing sands rather than turn them over to a lynch-hungry mob of cattlemen. 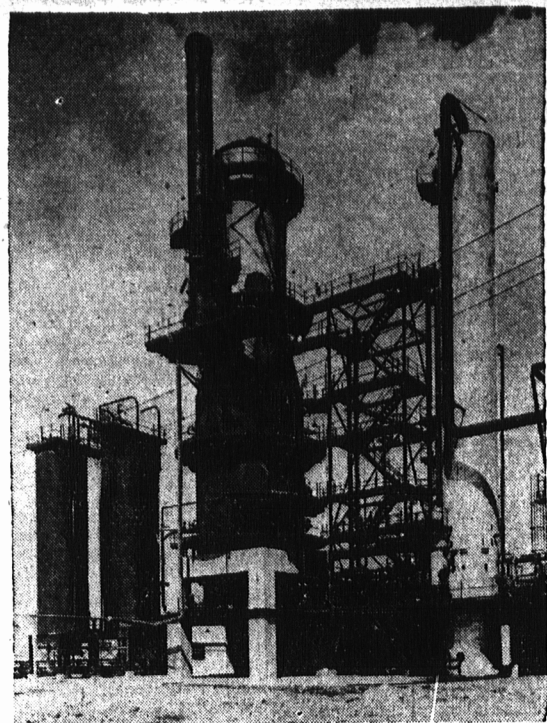
ST. MARY'S C. W. L.

Opening of the largest oil refinery built in Canada since the end of the war is scheduled for Sept. 25 at Sarnia, Ont., with Defence Minister Howe, Premier Manning of Alberta, and Premier Frost of Ontario attending. The new refinery, covering 200 acres, will use everything but the 'smell' of crude oil in processing it, through this maze to tanks and tubes, into gasoline, fuel oil, and end products for the chemical industry and for the manufacture of synthetic rubber. The refinery rates as a defence plant, contributing not only essential chemicals now scarce, but in its capacity to produce fuel for jet engines. It was built for the Canadian Oil Companies Ltd., and will process Alberta oil.

Well Known Nurse Visits Kilmuir Home

Miss S.K. MacDonald, flight nurse, who spent fourteen months in Japan and Korea, on air evacuation duty in combat area, and is at present attending Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio, spent a brief holiday with her brother and sister, John K. and Miss Anne MacDonald, R.N., Kilmuir. She also visited her sister, Mrs. W.A. Bruce, Mr. Bruce and family of Valleyfield.

Miss MacDonald attended public school at Kilmuir, and is a graduate of P.W.C. She has her B.Sc. degree from Dalhousie, where she also took pre med. She graduated from the Yale School of Nursing, where she received her M.N., and worked for several years in the Baltimore Public Health Department.

In February, 1945, she joined the U.S. Airforce, and graduated from flight school at McChord Airfield, Texas, where she became a flight nurse instructor. During the winter of 1949-50 she was on air assignment from Texas to Alaska. In August 1950 she travelled over twenty thousand miles by air doing flight nurse duty on planes carrying Korean war casualties from Fairfield, California, and other points on the U.S. west coast to hospitals in Illinois, Mass., Alabama and Texas. In September 1950 she went by air from California to Japan, and was with the 801st Airbase, and spent fourteen months in continual active and strenuous flight duty. While at home she expressed appreciation to the W.M.S. and others who sent parcels to her while overseas. She took part in evacuating children from Seoul, Korea, and referred to the need of native Koreans for clothes. Articles sent by organizations here can be very useful.
