Olympic Preview

A PREVIEW of what can be expected in the Tokyo Olympics was held at Los Angeles over the weekend as United States track and field athletes broke two world records, equalled another and bettered the Olympic standard in nine others. The performances of the Americans indicated they will once again lead the Olympic track and field onslaught, followed closely by the Soviet Union.

Red Cavley bettered the world mark in the 400-metre hurdle with 43 seconds and Saturday Ralph Boston broke the listed world record of 27 feet 3/4 inches set by Russia's Igor Terentyev with a leap of 27 feet 4 1/2 inches in the broad jump. Boston also had a leap of 27 feet 10 1/2 inches but it was wind-aided.

Three-year-old Mike Lzabek, a California school teacher, matched the world record of 4.9 in the 400-metre dash. Gerry Lindgren of Spokane, Wash., won the 10,000-metres for only the third time in his life, won the fastest time by an American this year, 29:06.0.

The existing Olympic records bettered, shot, discus and hammer, pole vault and broad jump.

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Russia Sends 341 Athletes

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union plans to send 341 athletes to Tokyo to compete once more that it has its strongest Olympic team in the world. Yuriy Vlasov, leader of the Soviet Olympic team, placed more emphasis on national glory than personal achievement as he outlined Russia's Olympic plans at a press conference Monday.

The first Olympic team selections will not be announced until Thursday, but Maslin said plans call for 273 men to compete in 20 sports and 68 women in seven sports. Maslin modestly predicted the Soviets will win 40 to 50 gold medals and will pile up 720 points. Officially no point totals are recognized in the Olympic games.

The Soviet team won 37 gold medals at the Melbourne Olympics in 1956 and 45 gold medals at Rome in 1960.

Chief rivals for unofficial team honors will be the United States, the combined team from East and West Germany and the host Japanese team, Maslin said. The Americans will do their best to close the gap from the last two Olympics, in which the Soviet Union pointed the highest number of points.

Jack Quinn, a former resident of Charlottesville, P.E.I., has been carving quite a name for himself in United States harness racing circles during the past eleven years. Quinn was born and raised in Charlottetown. Jack was fourteen years old when he landed a job at the Charlottetown race track. Jack used to take care of horses which were owned by A. B. Curcliffe and Harold Cudmore at the local racetrack. He got his first taste of driving in competition when he teamed a Harold Cudmore owned entry to a win in New England at a race which was staged on the North River.

Quinn left the island when he was still too young to obtain a drivers licence on the island and journeyed to Toronto where he went to work training horses. Jack left Toronto and travelled to Maryland U.S.A. in 1953 to further his ambitions to be a horseman. Jack's purse earnings in his first year on the New England circuit were \$2,815. Last year his purse earnings were \$5,117. With the success he has been having and the horses he is scheduled to drive Quinn has set his sights at \$100,000 for the 1964 season, which is a tremendous increase for such a relatively short period.

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Mays Batting Under 300; Cemente, Oliva On Top

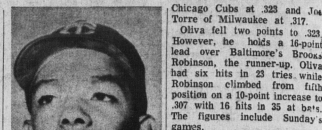
NEW YORK (AP)—Remember when they were speculating whether or not Willie Mays would finish his 1964 National League baseball season with an average of .400 or higher?

That was approximately four months ago after San Francisco Giant outfielder had completed the first month of the campaign on May 14 with a .449 mark.

It's now hitting .399.

This isn't the first time this year that Willie's percentage has dipped under .300. He was at .267 after the opening four games of 1964. In game No. 5 though, he had two hits in four at bats, lifting his average to .316. It increased steadily thereafter through a 26-game batting streak.

However, on June 14 his average had dropped to .354. On Aug. 14, 1963, in the past month, covering 27 games, he had collected only 19 hits in 97 tries for a .196 pace. Mays hasn't broken under .300 since 1956.

WRAP UP TITLES

Meanwhile, Roberto Clemente of Pittsburgh and rookie Tony Oliva of Minnesota appear to have the National and American League batting titles wrapped up.

Clemente gained three points to .345 in last week's games, collecting 10 hits in 25 times at bat. Rico Carty of Milwaukee remained in second place with .327 followed by teammate Hank Aaron at .315. Billy Williams of

Chicago Cubs at .323 and Joe Torre of Milwaukee at .317. Oliva fell two points to .323. However, he holds a 16-point lead over Baltimore's Yankos Robinson, the runner-up. Oliva had six hits in 25 tries while Robinson closed from 10th to 30th with a 10-point increase to .307 with 16 hits in 35 at bats. The figures include Sunday's games.

Elston Howard and Mickey Vernon of New York Yankees are tied for third at .302 followed by Detroit's Bill Freehan with 300.

Harmon Killebrew of Minnesota continued to lead the American League in homers with 46 and runs batted in with 105. He had one home run and three RBI last week.

Mays is the National's home run pace-setter with 41 while Ken Boyer of St. Louis drove in nine more runs to increase his leading total to 109.

Jockey Files Damage Suit

CHICAGO (CP-AP)—Jockey Ismael Valenzuela has filed a \$2,000,000 damage suit against the owner and trainer of Sadar, winner of the world's richest thoroughbred horse race, the learned Monday.

The suit was filed in circuit court in Chicago. Mrs. Mary B. Hecht and Canadian-born trainer Les Lear are Valenzuela's defendants. Mrs. Sadar is by Willie Shoemaker.

Shoemaker rode Sadar to victory in the \$300,000 Arlington Washington Futurity Saturday. The winner's purse was \$134,925. Valenzuela's lawyer, Oscar B'Angelo, said today he plans to seek a writ of attachment to prevent the purse.

Valenzuela's lawsuit seeks damages "for loss of professional reputation".

D'Angelo said he hopes to bring about a quick settlement by attaching the purse.
