Mutiny on the Bounty

Charge leveled against workmen unreliable

Alexander MacLean, president of the Prince Edward Island Trades and Labor Council, yesterday related the claim, made Saturday by R.M. Rickard, superintendent of the Confederation building, that Island workmen were "unreliable".

Mr. MacLean stated that Island tradesmen who leave the province for employment elsewhere seldom if ever return and is an indication that they can complete with tradesmen in any part of the country and in the province lands as well.

Mr. Rickard said that many Island workmen only want to work for a few days to get a few dollars in their pockets and then quit.

He was quoted as saying, originally his company planned on hiring all local workmen except at the highest levels, but this aim had become impossible.

He said some locally hired employees work extremely well for a few days but quit as soon as they earned enough stamps to draw unemployment insurance.

Mr. MacLean questioned Mr. Rickard's claim that workmen quit to draw employment benefits. "On checking with the National Employment Office," he said, "we find that there are few, if any, claims made for unemployment insurance."

It appears to us that the difficulty which Mr. Rickard may be having in producing adequate skilled help is due to the fact that construction at the moment is in the vicinity of \$15,000,000 and this province does not have workmen available to cope with this construction boom.

A labor spokesman in Summerside said the Pilot company was hiring Islanders left and right in order to bring in its own crews from the mainland.

He said Summerside workmen have become discouraged from working on the building project because they have been paid after two days of employment.

He said the firings are black on the record of the workmen who have a hard job to get work later because of them.
