THE BEST YEARS


"Grow old along with me!
The best is yet to be."
So Robert Browning began one
of the choicest of his poems,
"Rabbi ben Ezra." It is interest-
ing to find some business-men
discovering the reality behind the
poet's word of encouragement.

A western newspaper recently
quoted with approval this saying
of the general manager of a pro-
gressive company: "Our over-60s
are doing a wonderful job." His
company awakened to the fact
that the modern pension plans
are throwing into retirement skill-
ful business men who have lots
of good years of usefulness in
front of them. So they began put-
ting men over 60 into non-com-
petitive jobs.

He said: "Their experience and
tact are so good that customers
prefer them to younger men. The
team spirit of these older people
is wonderful. They never give us a
moment's trouble, and their ma-
ture judgment is something that
is very valuable to the company."

It is an interesting feature of
our time that while scientific
discoveries are prolonging human
life and therefore efficiency, modern
institutions are retiring their
skilled servants at earlier ages
than ever. We know of cases where
they have been thrown on the scrap-
heap men at the height of their
power and deprived the interests
behind them of the most valuable
service that these men could have
given.

We should have heard of men who
should have been retired before
they began, but when men of proven
character and ability have
mastered the subject or the job
assigned to them, have kept abreast
of the times, and have ad-
ded by experience to their wisdom
and efficiency, it seems sheer folly
to retire them when their powers
are at their best, just because they

One fact to be kept in mind is
that, as we grow older, personal in-
terests become more precious to us
than they were when we were so
busy with material things. So it is
that in religious work the wisdom
and tenderness of age are indis-
pensable. In the prophecy of Joel
which St. Peter quoted on the day
of Pentecost we read:
"Your young men shall see
visions;
Your old men shall dream
dreams."
Both youth and age have their
place and value under the guid-
ance of the Holy Spirit. But the
difference between the dreams of
age and the visions of youth is
that the dreams of age are founded
on experience.

In unnumbered instances his
faith has been turned into fact.
He launched out on an uncharted
sea in answer to the call of God,
and God fulfilled His promise. At
the Burning Bush God assured
Moses that He would be with him
in bringing Israel into freedom. At
the Red Sea, in the barren wilder-
ness, and in battle after battle God
kept faith with His servant. Moses'
dream of Israel's future as he stood
on Mount Pisgah had a foundation
in facts that nothing could move.
The world needs to know what
the experience of age can teach.
The life of the church is enriched
and her word to the world given
the ring of reality when her mem-
bers, who have tested and proven
God's promises, bear their witness
to His truth.

"The soul's dark cottage, battered
and decayed,
Lets in new light through chinks
that time has made;
Stronger by weakness, wiser men
become.
At their draw near to their eternal
home
Leaving the old, both worlds at
once they view
That stand upon the threshold of
the new."
