

Governor General Plans Jant over North Pole

OTTAWA (CP)—Rt. Hon. Vincent Massey, Canada's much-travelled governor-general, is planning a far-reaching air jaunt: a 10,000-mile Arctic tour that will include a swing around the North Pole. The trip is to take place in mid-March. It will be the first visit by a Canadian governor-general to the lonely, isolated Arctic communities and it will be the first time that a vice-regal emissary has ever flown over the pole.

The 68-year-old Mr. Massey is planning the trip to bring a personal link with the Queen close to those cut off by duty or destiny from the more populated areas of Canada: the Eskimos, Indians, missionaries, trading post man-

gers, weather stations keepers, RCMP officers and others.

The trip will also serve to give Canada's first native-born governor-general a glimpse of closely-guarded radar lines, the Distant Early Warning (DEW) line and the more southerly Mid-Canada line.

Though the tour has been under consideration for some time, details have not yet been completed. It is understood the governor-general will fly first through the northwest part of Quebec, perhaps to Baffin Island, the Northwest Territories, Ellesmere Island and the pole, moving south again on the west side of Arctic Canada, down through the Yukon, across the prairies and home.

Conflict Arises Over New German High Command

BONN (AP)—A conflict has erupted in West Germany over selection of its new army's high command.

The powerful Citizens' Committee which screens the appointment of senior officers has just rejected two of Defence Minister Theodor Blank's closest advisers for top posts in the armed forces. Defence ministry officials, angered by what they call a personal affront to Blank, are fighting back. They have protested to

Parliament's security committee and are talking about a direct appeal to Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

The security committee—the main legislative group on military affairs—has summoned leaders of the citizens committee and the defence ministry to a talk on the controversy.

German newspapers are predicting a crisis pitting the defence ministry, an arm of the executive branch, against the Citizens' Committee named by Parliament.

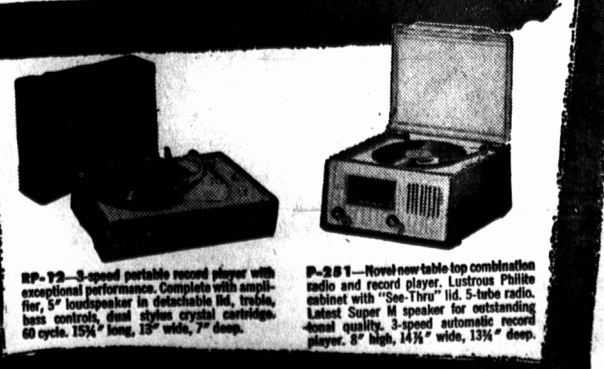
