Young Lovers Captured By Police Posse

QUESNEL, B. C., April 14—(CP)—Wracked by sobs, a 19-year-old high school girl lay in hospital tonight with a bullet wound in her leg after a bush-country shooting spree with a posse ended in capture for her and a 19-year-old boy friend.

The defiant pair of lovers stood off a police posse more than 12 hours in a lonely trapper's cabin 18 miles west of here in the woodlands of interior British Columbia.

Police tossed four tear gas bombs into the log cabin—one was hurled back—to drive Bert Lagace and his girl friend into the open. The pair fled into the bush.

The bark of the girl's collie dog gave away the couple's position on a high ridge. As the girl—her name was withheld because of her age—aimed a .22 calibre rifle at the posse, a police bullet felled her. It nicked her in the leg. Lagace gave up after a violent struggle with police.

The two defied police and the girl's father, who pleaded with his daughter to give herself up.

She shouted at him: "I'll see you in hell first."

The youth yelled to police: "If you want me, you'd better bring a coffin."

Police charge Lagace with abduction of a juvenile. Sgt. Andy Fairbairn, in charge of the posse, said: "More serious charges will be laid against both."

Police said the girl fled with Lagace of her own will, defying her parents' orders to stay away from the youth.

The escapade in the wilderness, 400 miles north of Vancouver, started Tuesday night. When the girl failed to return home, her parents swore out a complaint charging Lagace with abduction.

The parents then went out after the young lovers. They overtook them—travelling on foot—on a lonely trail a few miles from here. Lagace threatened them with a gun and said: "She's coming with me."

The girl backed him up. The parents returned to Quesnel and the father joined in the police hunt.

The couple continued on foot over rocky trails and through deep snow. They broke into one cabin and then another, looking for food.

It was in the second cabin that the posse—six police and three civilians sworn in as special deputies—cornered the pair late Thursday.

They ringed the cabin, waiting for the arrival of tear gas bombs. During the night, four shots from the cabin punctuated the darkness. No one was hit.

As the posse moved in under cover of rocks and trees, the pair fled into the bush surrounding the cabin. Two hours later, they were spotted on a high ridge.

As the posse approached, Lagace shouted to his girl friend: "Shoot them, shoot them."

The posse fired first, nicking the girl below the left knee. She fell, dropping the rifle. The posse rushed in.

Still Finding Graves Of First War Dead

LONDON, April 15—(CP)—Allied war dead from the First World War, their burying places unknown to Allied authorities for more than 30 years, still are being discovered in Western Europe.

The Imperial War Graves Commission, in its annual report published tonight, said 104 were found in isolated localities during the last year. A further six, killed in the Second World War, also were found. All 110 have been re-buried in official war cemeteries.

The report lists progress in the landscaping of new cemeteries in its charge throughout the world and in the restoration of those from the 1914-18 war which the more recent conflict damaged.

Canada is represented on the commission by L. Dana Wilgus, High Commissioner in the United Kingdom.

Of the total 557,520 graves for which it is responsible, the Commission says 44,154 are Canadian—7.92 per cent of the total and the highest proportion among the dominions. United Kingdom war dead are buried in 454,574 graves throughout the world.

In Canada, says the report, crosses of sacrifice in the military cemeteries at London, Ont., Toronto and Hamilton were re-pointed and cleaned. Canada also is responsible for Commonwealth dead buried in the United States, and between the two countries 6,289 headstones were either positioned or were in the process of engraving.

Newfoundland entered the Canadian agency's territory when the former colony became a Canadian Province April 1, 1949.

"For voice in this merged with Canada," says the report. "The Newfoundland badge, an enduring memorial to her history, is carved upon the headstones set on the graves of her dead. They will not

country in the world." A continuing development program was needed, said Mr. Winters. Excellent as the record of growth had been in the last 10 years, the experience of the preceding decade "has been all but comforting."

It was important to examine what happened in the past to guard against repetition in the future. While private individuals had been active in developing re-

sources in the 'twenties, and were aided in their endeavors by government, both private and public efforts dwindled to a trickle in the early 'thirties.

In essence resources development in the past had proceeded by fits and starts. What was needed was a continuing program "where Canadian resources are used to the greatest benefit of all Canadians at all times."

ESCAPE IN OIL FIRE
CALGARY, Alta., April 14—(CP)—Claude Albert, 26, told today of escaping an oil-well fire by sliding 66 feet down a steel cable through a flaming pillar of oil. Albert was halfway up a 120-foot derrick when flames from a flash fire below enveloped it. Except for hands burned by the cable he escaped uninjured, although three other workers on the ground suffered painful burns.

Development Of Resources Best Insurance

LONDON, April 15—(CP)—Resources Minister Winters said tonight continued development of Canada's natural resources is the best insurance against any possible recurrence of "the depressed thirties."

Such development represented "a pillar of prosperity and a bulwark against depression."

In a speech prepared for delivery to the advertising and sales club of Toronto, Mr. Winters attributed Canada's present high standard of living to the country's natural resources and to the people who have made use of them.

Canadians had developed their resources at home and exchanged surpluses for other raw materials and manufactured products abroad. They also had been processing more of their natural resources in their own country and using more of the materials to manufacture goods domestically.

"As a result Canada has experienced a very rapid rate of industrialization, more rapid in fact over the last decade than any other
