Dream Game Of Football Is Scheduled For Dec. 3

TORONTO, (CP) — East will meet west here Dec. 3 in the "dream game" of Canadian football on behalf of Canadian crippled children.

Two teams representing the best of Canada's big nine football teams—Vancouver, Edmonton, Calgary, Regina and Winnipeg in the west and Hamilton, Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal in east—will clash in Varsity Stadium in the first game of its kind in Canada.

Net proceeds will go to Shriners' Hospitals for Crippled Children in Winnipeg, Manitoba and Montreal. The Star Weekly and Shriners of Canada are joint sponsors.

For eastern football fans the game is expected to provide a season's end thriller to replace the Grey Cup classic gone west this year for the first time in the history of Grey Cup play. This year's championship final will be played in Vancouver, Nov. 26.

TICKET DEMAND HIGH

Committee officials say there already are indications the game will be a success. Ticket officials at Varsity Stadium said Tuesday requests for seats started coming in while the game still was in the rumor stage.

One source said money orders and cheques for 2,000 tickets already have been received. The stadium's 27,000 seats may hold the fans who want to see the spectacle.

The teams selected will be up to the fans. A story in the Star Weekly of Oct. 15 invites fans to choose their favorite offensive and defensive teams and supplies a ballot on which the selections can be made.

New star-studded uniforms are in the making.

PLANNED LAST YEAR

Plans first were laid down at the annual meeting of the Canadian Rugby Union in Toronto in 1954. The idea was that either the previous year's Grey Cup finalists or the second place clubs in east and west would engage in a pre-season exhibition battle.

The idea received immediate endorsement from officials of both senior unions and the nine clubs. Nine Shrine temples across Canada offered assistance.

A committee made up of CRU and Shriners officials took over the project.

Committee officials say the game, if it becomes an annual fixture will alternate in east or west depending on where the Grey Cup championship is played.

Florence Chadwick Makes Britain To France Swim

CALAIS, France (AP)—Florence Chadwick completed her Britain-to-France crossing of the English channel early today, but abandoned her plans for an immediate return trip to the frigid water.

Nearly speechless and apparently exhausted after a 14-hour nine minute trip the American swimming star returned to the English side by boat.

Her time was only three minutes short of the England-France crossing record set earlier this year by Bill Pickering of England. She bettered her own women's mark by 12 minutes.

It was the 35-year-old New Yorker's fourth attempt of the year to make an unprecedented round-trip swim.

She had intended to stop on the French side only long enough for another coat of lanolin and then head back for England.

"BEST" CROSSING

The sea was calm but cold—about 50 degrees.

Miss Chadwick, former San Diego, Calif., stenographer who now works for a New York bathing suit company, managed to tell reporters the crossing was the "best" she had made, but she did not elaborate.

Miss Chadwick's latest attempt was decided on Monday at the last minute.

She said after her previous tries she probably would return home. She did not indicate Wednesday whether she was through for this year or not, but tides now will be no longer favorable.

Bruins Have Chance To Vacate Cellar Tonight

Boston Bruins have a chance to vacate the cellar of the National Hockey League tonight.

Bruins, tied with Detroit Red Wings for last place, meet Toronto Maple Leafs tonight in Boston and with a win or tie will move into fifth place ahead of Red Wings who are winless in three starts.

A Toronto victory will tie Leafs with Chicago Black Hawks and New York Rangers for second place. Rangers have won both their games in the young NHL season and Black Hawks have a record of two wins and a loss.

TWO GOALS FOR BRUINS

Bruins won't have an easy time against Leafs. In two games, Boston players have managed to score two goals. Forward Lorne Ferguson and defenceman Leo Babin were the snipers in the 5-2 loss to Montreal Canadiens Sunday. New York Rangers four hours earlier Habs shutout Boston 2-0.

Forward Vic Stasiuk, acquired in the deal with Detroit, that sent goaltender Terry Sawchuk to Boston last summer, may play in tonight's game. He has been out with a side injury suffered in a pre-season exhibition game.

It's the first time this season Sawchuk and Harry Lumley will face each other. Sawchuk nosed Lumley out for the Vezina Trophy by one goal last spring. The Vezina goes to the goaltender of the team which is scored on least at the end of the schedule.

20 Rough Riders Players Are Fined \$100 Each

OTTAWA (CP)—Ottawa Rough Riders Football Club tonight fined 20 players \$100 each a game for each of the last two games.

The fines were announced following a three-hour meeting of the club executive with head coach Chan Caldwell.

The club announcement said the fines were imposed "for failure to exhibit the calibre of football of which they are capable."

The statement added: "Immediate steps are being taken to secure replacements in an endeavor to strengthen the team. Further announcements will be made later in the week."

PLAYERS NOT NAMED

The Big Four club declined to identify the players who have been fined, or say how many imports and homebrew players are involved. Caldwell will inform the players concerned today, a club official said.

J.P. Jim McCreary, member of the Riders' executive for 32 years, said this is the first time in his memory that Ottawa players have been fined.

Bob Bowness Signs With Moncton Hawks

MONCTON (CP)—Bob Bowness has signed a 1955-56 season contract with Moncton Hawks of the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League, team manager Jim MacDonal announced Tuesday.

The left winger was the Hawk's highest scorer last year with 59 points.

MacDonal said he plans to add George White, 21, of Saskatoon, Sask., to the roster today. The six-foot two-inch defenceman is the property of Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League.

White played for Glace Bay Miners of the Maritime Major Hockey League during the 1953-54 season but an injury kept him out of action last year.

Others signed include: forwards Lorne Pirie, Ray Lacroix, Bill Simnett, Ray Ledue, Orin Carver, playing-coach Bert Hirschfeld and goal-tender Nick Pidsorny.

Hawks are expected to open their training program this weekend.

Hughie Campbell May Coach At Fredericton

FREDERICTON (CP)—Hughie Campbell, Charlottetown Islander, playing coach at the beginning of last season's Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey Campaign, may resign that position this year with Fredericton Caps.

The first hockey player released by the Fredericton Capital Hockey Club, announced Campbell will join the team Wednesday. Club officials declined to confirm or deny whether Campbell would be coach. But speculation in puck circles is that he'll take over from Joe McIntosh, last season's playing pilot.

Campbell, a defenceman, is one of four mentioned as possible starters in the 1955-56 ACSHL season. Others are forward Bill McDoagh, Doug McPherson and Bob Lezard.

It was also said that Campbell will bring two or three players with him, all of whom will tie to the ice here for the first time with the Caps later this week.
