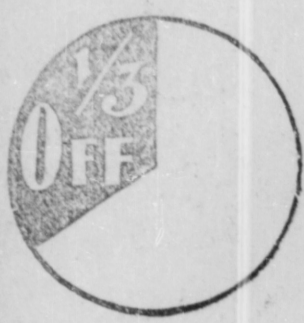

THE CAMPAIGN

In the Second District of King's

A large and influential meeting, presided over by M. McIntyre was held in Monticello Hall last evening. The speakers all got a good hearing and the Opposition candidates scored the Government heavily for their non-fulfillment of promises.

Mr. Melsaac and Mr. Clarke's candidature is well received by the people.

Disatisfied Afrikaners.

CAPE TOWN, Dec. 3.—Replying at Stellenbosch, Cape Colony, to an address presented to him by the leaders of the Afrikaner bond, J. X. Marrison, former treasurer of Cape Colony, in the course of an impassioned speech denounced the war in South Africa as "one of the blackest spots in British annals." The present methods of British warfare, he said, were such as encouraged the worst elements on both sides and were bound to prove fatal to the ultimate peace of the country. He declared that neither he nor J. W. Sauer, former commissioner of public works, would attend the Worcester congress lest it should be said that the congress was engineered by politicians, and he appealed to all Afrikaners to speak boldly when upholding their rights and yet to "avoid wild language or actions which might lead to the abrogation of the last vestige of freedom."

Mr. Sauer, whose speech was rather more militant, demanded the removal of Sir Alfred Milner, whom he described as "violently anti-Dutch." He declared that if Great Britain deprived the two republics of their independence she would lose the affection of all South Africans.

A Bond Movement.

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Dec. 3.—Mr. Bond, the premier, will apply to Mr. Chamberlain, imperial secretary of state for the colonies, for permission to increase the colonial ministry from seven members to nine. His plan is to include two prominent supporters who are especially conversant with the details of the Reid contract, with a view to action on the measure, if necessary, during the coming session of the legislature. It is assumed that Mr. Chamberlain will offer no objection.

CANADIANS IN ENGLAND.

Inspected and Complimented by the Prince of Wales.

LONDON, Dec. 4.—The returning members of the Royal Canadian Regiment and the composite regiment of Household Cavalry men were inspected yesterday by the Prince of Wales at Bay Street Barracks.

The Prince of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of York, the Duke of Cambridge, Field Marshal Wolseley, General Sir Evelyn Wood and Secretary of State for War Broderick were among those present and participated in the inspection.

The Canadian officers were introduced to the Prince of Wales who, in a brief speech, heartily welcomed them to England. He said that it had given great satisfaction to him to hear how gallantly they had fought, and he mourned with them the loss of so many of their brave comrades.

The Prince also said that he remembered with the greatest pleasure his visit to Canada.

The spectators at the function were warmly enthusiastic.

SITUATION IN CHINA.

Renewal of Anti Foreign Outbreak Threatened.

(SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.)

LONDON, Dec. 4.—Placards are again being posted, says the Tientsin correspondent of the Standard, announcing the renewal of the anti-foreign outbreaks as imminent.

PEKIN, Dec. 4.—All the envoys have now heard from their governments regarding the joint note to the Chinese Plenipotentiaries, a meeting will be held to-day.

Boer Flags Hauled Down.

LORENZO MARQUES, Dec. 3.—The last vestiges of Boer officialdom have disappeared from here. The Transvaal coat-of-arms no longer graces the exterior of ex-Consul Pott's office. The Portuguese authorities instructed him to remove all emblems of the Transvaal and Free State, and also requested him to notify loyal pro-Boers that Transvaal and Free State flags may not be hoisted. Mr. Pott thereupon officially hoisted the Transvaal and Free State flags, and a Portuguese official ceremoniously hauled them down. Mr. Pott has now two flag-staffs to let.

Something Radically Wrong.

TORONTO, Dec. 3.—Returns received by the provincial board of health show that while the marriage rate of the province is increasing, the birth rate shows a steady decrease.

TORONTO, Dec. 3.—James Noxon, provincial inspector of prisons and public charities, says that immorality and licentiousness is on the increase among girls and young women employed in factories and shops. He attributes it largely to the number of girls coming into the city from the country, and who are removed from the restraining influences of home life.

THE PACIFIC CABLE

BIG BID FOR ITS CONSTRUCTION ACCEPTED.

It Will Be Finished at the End of 1902.

(SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.)

LONDON, Dec. 4.—The Pacific Cable Company has accepted on behalf of the Governments of Great Britain, New South Wales, Queensland and New Zealand a bid of telegraph construction and maintenance to make and lay the cable from Vancouver to Queensland and New Zealand, via the Fanning, Fiji and Norfolk Islands, for £1,795,000, the work to be finished by the end of 1902.

LORD ROBERTS' PROGRESS.

He visits Scenes of the Great Struggle.

LADYSMITH, Natal, Dec. 3.—Lord Roberts, who arrived here on Friday, had inspected Majuba and Laing's Nek while en route.

Replying to an address from the townspeople here, he expressed his admiration of the gallant defense of the town, which he characterized as a "glorious memorial of British pluck and endurance, only equalled by the determination and bravery of the relieving force."

He said he trusted the day was not far distant when peace would reign supreme and "without ill-feeling toward a conquered foe."

Lord Roberts has visited Colenso and the surrounding battlefields.

HEIDELBERG, Thursday, Nov. 29.—Lord Roberts, journeying toward Durban, stopped here today. He made a speech to the volunteers, in the course of which he said he trusted the guerrilla warfare would not long continue.

Egyptian Crop Prospects.

CAIRO, Dec. 3.—The Nile river is rapidly falling, and another bad season is thought imminent. The Department of Irrigation has decided to throw dams across the Nile branches in the hope of saving the next cotton crop.
