

Liberation Front Claimed Dishonoring Que. Name

MONTREAL (CP) — Self-styled liberators unleashed a campaign of violence and intimidation in Quebec this spring, aimed, they say, at the overthrow of colonialism.

Calling themselves the Quebec Liberation Front (FLQ), they announced their existence in a 40-page, mimeographed press release received in various Montreal newspaper offices March 4.

Since then there have been four explosions, numerous bomb scares, several other acts of vandalism and a man has been killed. The liberation front has claimed responsibility—again by means of secret communications—for most of the explosions, scares and vandalism and it has been blamed for the killing. Leaders of open separatist organizations in the predominantly French-speaking province say that the underground group is discrediting their drive to win Quebec's independence from the rest of Canada and may be an anti-separatist plot to do exactly that.

Premier Jean Lesage has said the group is dishonoring the name of Quebec at a time when the province is beginning to assert itself in all fields. The premier told reporters recently that Quebec provincial and Montreal city police have redoubled their efforts, in cooperation with the RCMP, to put an end to the terrorism and that he believes the guilty should be given "exemplary punishment."

Police Director J. Adrien Robert of Montreal formed a special squad to break up the liberation front and said its members will work overtime until this is done.

There have been no serious incidents since April 30, when V. O'Neill, a 65-year-old night watchman, was killed by an exploding bomb at an army recruiting centre on Sherbrooke Street in the heart of the city.

PROMPTED URGENCY
This tragedy gave greater urgency to police investigation of the terrorism and Robert said his men are making progress. He declined to elaborate, however, on the grounds that disclosure of what the police know may hamper the investigation.

The first explosion occurred April 1 when a bomb was tossed into the ventilating system of the national revenue building in Montreal, causing limited damage.

Then a track was ripped apart near Lemieux, 120 miles northeast of Montreal on the main transcontinental route of the Canadian National Railway. The CNR held the rail damage, quickly repaired, "sabotage." The letters "FLQ" were seen painted on the walls of a cabin near the tracks.

A train carrying former prime minister Diefenbaker passed over the repaired track a few hours after the incident. Another bomb blast April 20 shattered garage windows at

RCMP headquarters in Montreal.

FIND AMMUNITION
Police reported Thursday discovery of caches of 10,000 rounds of ammunition in private homes in Sherbrooke, 85 miles east of Montreal, and they were investigating the possibility of a connection with the FLQ.

Police picked up 15 young men for questioning in a series of pre-dawn raids in Montreal. On Friday and seized a quantity of typewriters, papers and printing equipment. The men, all described as between 20 and 30, were later released.

A 23-year-old Montreal teacher was held briefly for questioning later in the month. In Quebec City, where the Wolfe monument on the Plains of Abraham was toppled March 29, police held 15 persons for questioning Easter weekend.

James Wolfe was the British general whose victory on the Plains of Abraham in 1759 led to the capture of Quebec from the French.

Geoffrey Langlois, superintendent of the national battlefields commission, said in Quebec tenders for restoration work have been submitted to the federal department of northern affairs and national resources. He said the 25-foot monument, built in the form of an obelisk, will be restored exactly as it was.

Repentance And Forgiveness ILLUSTRATED SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON



King David, the Psalmist, was visited one day by Nathan the prophet, who in a parable made the king recognize a great transgression he had made against God—II Samuel 12:1-15.

For David had forced his attentions upon Bathsheba, beautiful wife of Uriah—because of the situation that resulted, he arranged to have Uriah killed—II Samuel 11.

When David recognized his great sin, he acknowledged it to God, and prayed for forgiveness. A contrite heart is a true sacrifice to the Lord, and He cleanses us—Psalm 51:17, 12.

From this experience David was inspired to write Psalms 32, 51 and 103, praising God's forgiveness. Thus He teaches others. Psalm 51:13, 14.

David Seeks Forgiveness

The three psalms in today's lesson are ascribed to David, whose own personal experience with God's forgiveness for a grave sin enables him to write with great conviction on the subject.

His sin, of course, was his adulterous liaison with Uriah's wife, Bathsheba, while Uriah

was away from David (see II Samuel 11). Then, to compound the crime, when David discovered that Bathsheba was pregnant, he sent Uriah into battle in such a way that he might be killed.

A rebuke by the prophet Nathan made David realize how sinful he had been, and made him seek God's forgiveness. From this profound experience came the psalms we study today.

The first condition necessary for a reestablishment of communication with God after any offense is referred to in the second verse of Psalm 32—there must be no guile or deceit in the individual spirit. In other words, he must be completely honest in dealing with God.

Notice that three words for sin are used in verses one and two—transgression, sin and iniquity. God's pardoning mercy is also described in three ways—the sin is carried away (forgiven), hidden (covered) and ransomed (imputeth not).

The only directly autobiographical part of this psalm is found in verses three through five, in which David describes the misery that was his before he acknowledged his sin to God. There is no greater misery known to man than the separation from God which occurs when man knows he has done wrong, but cannot acknowledge it.

Verses eight and nine appear to be not the words of David, but the words of God to David. The word "wicked" in verse 10 does not mean only lawless or evil, but also unbelieving.

Famous throughout the ages is David's great prayer for pardon, Psalm 51. The title itself carried the direct connection between this psalm and David's great transgression with Bathsheba.

Briefly, it can be said to include an introductory verse offering for cleaning versus one
