

# Senators Down Yankees Atlanta Topples Chicago

NEW YORK (AP)—Bob Savin's two-run homer and a three-run error by Herbie Clark gave Washington Senators a 3-2 victory over New York Yankees Thursday night. Clor's wild throw in the fifth let in Paul Casanova, who had walked and moved to second on a fielder's choice. The Yankees got their runs in the sixth on a run-scoring triple by Bobby Murcer and a run-scoring single by Joe Pepitone.

CHICAGO (AP)—Hank Aaron moved into sole possession of the National League home run lead by hitting his 38th and 39th of the season as Atlanta Braves defeated Chicago Cubs 10-2 Tuesday for their seventh straight victory. Aaron led a four-homer barrage off rookie lefty Ken Holtzman in the first two innings. The Braves' slugger had a two-run homer in the opening inning and connected with none aboard in the second. Felipe Alou and Rico Carty also homered for Atlanta. Don Kessinger had four hits and scored both runs for the Cubs. Ken Johnson yielded 10 hits in lifting his record to 13-8.

BOSTON (AP)—George Scott drove in four runs with a single and a double, leading Boston Red Sox to a 10-1 victory over Chicago White Sox Tuesday night. Scott singled across a pair of runs in a five-run outburst in the sixth, then doubled home two more and scored in the eighth.

DETROIT (AP)—Willie Horton cracked a three-run homer in the sixth and led Detroit Tigers to a 6-5 victory over Minnesota Twins Tuesday night, snapping the Twins' winning streak at five games and Jim Kaats victory skid at eight.

The victory moved the Tigers back into second place in the American League, one-half game ahead of the Twins. Kaat, seeking his 24th victory, retired 16 men in a row before Jake Wood singled with one away in the sixth. Norm Cash flied out, but Al Kaline walked, setting the stage for Horton's 25th homer. Bill Freehan homered in the seventh. The Tigers scored a run in the eighth.

# Capozzi Is Winner On Or Off The Football Field

By ARTHUR BAXTER VANCOUVER (CP)—Win, lose or draw—Herb Capozzi has confidence. Capozzi, general manager of the British Columbia Lions of the Western Football Conference since 1957, for the second time has entered the political ring for better or worse—and he leaves no doubt that he is confident of winning. He is resigned from the club, effective Dec. 31.

The veteran football player and official has the backing of the powerful B.C. Social Credit machine and he exudes the confidence of that party, in power in the province since 1952. Capozzi, 41-year-old father of three, had a quick answer when asked what he would do if he lost in his bid for one of two legislature seats in the big Vancouver Centre constituency in the B.C. election Sept. 12.

ing in downtown Vancouver, which a spokesman said would be ideal for operation as an athletic club. The entire family, including brothers Tom and Joe, is backing Herb's campaign. And Herb says, "We're running a strong campaign and are confident we can retain Vancouver Centre." He referred to his running mate, 43-year-old auto dealer Evan Wolfe.

Capozzi added: "One of the major things we are working on is to turn out the votes. It has appeared that people are happy with the present government and when you find this situation there is often a tendency toward apathy on the part of voters."

In mapping out his strategy he said: "It is inevitable that I will be associated with football during the campaign—but in no way do I intend to use it as a campaign tactic. The six-foot one-inch Capozzi appears to be making the transition to politics from sports almost without effort."
