Archery Proportion Certificate Presented

A certificate, won by W. A. Moose of New Annan, for the second year in a row, was presented to him at the P.E.I. Archery Club's annual field day Saturday, for having had the highest proportion of hits in the province. The field day was held on the Moose farm at New Annan.

The award was presented to Mr. Moose by W. H. Brown, chief ROP inspector for the province, who also presented high production certificates to M. R. Mousie, the Estate of George Boswall, Frenchfort, and A. B. MacRae and Sons, Charlottetown.

Another feature of the day was the presentation of 40-year plaques to some 34 Archery breeders, some of whom have now retired.

The field day was presided over by Sterling MacRae, Brockville, president of the Archery Club, with Andrew B. MacRae, minister of agriculture, Keith Boswell, Victoria and R. C. Parent, superintendent of the Experimental Farm in Charlottetown speaking briefly.

A 1 1/2 mile competitive was conducted by David MacLean of the department of agriculture and sports, directed by E. W. Stewart, were held for the children.

Morgan Mitchell Wins 3-Mile Swim at Alberton

ALBERTON BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN - Good weather, a good crowd and an excellent program were features of the seventh annual Aquatic Day sponsored by the Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade and held at Alberton South Saturday afternoon.

Morgan Mitchell, Charlottetown was the proud winner of the Eastern Bakerside trophy offered to the contestant coming first in the three-mile swim.

Andrea Duval, Charlottetown, was equally delighted when she was chosen by the judges to receive the Hayes Paving Company trophy offered to the most skilled swimmer.

The Alberton Industries Limited trophy offered to the boatman was awarded to Howie Giege of Coleman.

G. Graham Rogers, provincial director of transportation, in official opening Aquatic Day, commended the board of Trade for its enterprise. He recalled the days when Alberton was a busy port with vessels sailing to all parts of the world.

He expressed the belief that the West Prince area is entering a new era of activity. He made reference to the fine workmanship on boats that is being done at Alberton South by Alberton Industries Limited.

Other speakers were Mayor Roy Leard of Alberton and

W. D. Campbell, M.L.A. Harvey Hutt introduced the program and then passed the microphone over to Frank Bryan, a past president of the board of trade.

COURSE CHANGED - The course of the three-mile swim was changed this year and it appeared to have a number of advantages over courses previously used. The swimmers had less current with which to cope, the spectators could keep an eye on this event while following other parts of the program, and as each contestant completed a lap of the swim his progress was announced.

Morgan Mitchell, who came in first, is a life guard at the National Park. This is the second time he has completed in the long swim at Alberton. T. 1869 he came second. He received the coveted Eastern Bakerside trophy from the hands of the company's representative, Donald MacKenzie of Summerside.

Maurice Lodge, Moncton, a noted swimmer and an active life guard, was also a participant in Aquatic Day from the time of its inception.

CAME THIRD - Helen Carragher, Ebbesfleet, the only lady contestant, came in third. Miss Carragher came first in the ladies' division last year. She is a Red Cross swimmer and an active life guard.

The 200-yard tourist swim was won by George Barton, New York. His reward was "The Magic Tree Craft" sandwich tray made and donated by the Leavitts of Alberton.

The skilled swimming competition was one of the most pleasing features of the program, as five competent swimmers demonstrated a 100 y swimming relay. The contest was quite impossible to choose a winner but the qualified judges decided in favor of George Barton.

Another interesting feature of the program was a demonstration of skin diving by members of the Summerside Skin Diving Club which was organized this spring and which has about 20 active members. Comment was given over the loud speaker by F.O. Weese of the club as six of the club members demonstrated front and back entries, duck dives, a 100 y diving to the bottom and recovering them, and buddy breathing. Taking part were Wally Marshman, Ian Vincent, Tom Gosling, Ross Woodside, Ross Ramsey and Wendell Ellis. Two of the men, Wally Marshman and Tom Gosling stayed under water for an hour and 15 minutes.

F.O. Weese showed the diving flag which is a white diagonal on a red ground. Anyone who is not a diver should stay 100 yards away because it represents a diver under water.

Swimming races for all ages were another source of interest in the swimming program. Mrs. Harry Cudmore, provincial director of swimming and water safety for the Red Cross, was largely responsible for the swimming program. She and members of her club were in charge of the event.

Other interesting events and throughout the afternoon Mrs. Cudmore gave information and commentary. On behalf of the

SPACIOUS NEW DRIVE-IN THEATRE READY AT CASCOMPEO

New Princess Pat Drive-In Theatre Is Opening Tonight

ALBERTON - White's Princess Pat Drive-In Theatre at Cascumpeo is almost completed and showing of the first picture is scheduled for Monday evening. Located on the shores of Cascumpeo Bay, overlooking George Harbor, it has a scenic setting. Only a few yards of lawn lie between the screen and W. A. Moose, Kensington.

The exterior is poppy red with jasmine yellow trim. The interior of the concession booth is finished with cherry select sheathing, has acoustic tile on the ceiling and battleship linoleum on the floor. There is flush type fluorescent lighting. Equipment includes a coffee maker, corn popper, steam cabinet, refrigerator, deep freeze, and a machine for making the popular soft ice cream.

The washrooms, when completed will have the latest facilities, including electric hand driers.

The protection booth contains the most modern projector and a large diesel electric plant for emergency use.

From Alberton the road is paved to within one and a half miles of the theatre and there is expectation that the pavement will be extended this summer under the roads to resurfaced program.

A neon sign and teal colored latticework fence mark the approach to the theatre grounds. The box office features the same attractive colors that appear on the concession booth. Fences separating the circular

ramps are in teal color. Work on the theatre began in the early spring. The topographical survey was made by J. C. McKenna of Summerside and architect, Keith Pickard drew the plans. Hayes Paving Company did the grading and formed the ramps. Plumbing a n d electrical work was by James Morrison and painting by James Broderick and Sons, both of Alberton. Willard Gordon and installation of the theatre is by St. John's companies. The neon sign is installed by James Lee of Charlottetown. Most of the building materials were procured from Island firms and local workmen were employed as much as possible.

The proprietors, J. Fred White and his son, Gordon White, of Alberton, have spared no effort in building this modern and well equipped open air theatre. It is their intention to landscape and beautify the grounds, to grade the ramp area, to build bathing houses and to provide amusements such as miniature golf, shuffle board and tennis.
