Upward Push On Steel Prices Strong In U.S.

CLEVELAND (AP)—There is upward pressure on American steel prices. Steel magazine says, noting selective increases already are in evidence.

The magazine reports that the finished steel price index of the Bureau of Labor Statistics inched up one-tenth of a point to 103.1 last week. It had been 103.0 since April 6, and before that, 102.9, since Dec. 29.

Temporary extension of the steel labor contracts to Sept. 1 and a "set-as-le" wage hike of 115 cents an hour have directed attention to the possibility of higher steel prices, the publication says.

FUEL FOR PRICE TALK

"An even higher final settlement this fall would add fuel to price talk," Steel says, adding: "But most steelmen are reported determined to hold the price line as long as possible."

Ingot production this week is expected to decline slightly from the 2,710,000 tons that Steel estimates were poured last week.

Steel says second-quarter production should be between 32,000,000 and 35,000,000 tons, pushing the first-half total to an all-time high of around 68,000,000 tons. Previous six-month high of 64,000,000 tons was in 1959.

HBC Considers Move To Canada

LONDON (CP)—W. J. Keswick, retiring governor of the Hudson's Bay Company, says that because of new British tax proposals the directors are again considering the "pros and cons" of moving the headquarters to Canada.

However, he said, it was too early to make any final decision because of the full effects of the tax changes were not yet known.

The tax laws outlined in the recent finance bill were penal, he told a shareholders meeting Friday. But because the bill still is before Parliament the board could not yet know what its final provisions would be and what specific effect it would have on earnings.

He explained that under the proposed system the company would bear about £1,000,000 (\$3,000,000) extra tax a year if current total distributions were maintained. The whole of the additional levy would go to the British treasury although 93 per cent of the company's profits were earned in Canada.

"This therefore amounts to a measure of double taxation which would be bound to handicap the company in relation to its competitors."

Following the meeting, Keswick, who continues as a director, was succeeded as governor by Lord Amory, former British high commissioner in Canada.

Authorities maintain this "two pillar" policy fits in with de Gaulle's aim of eliminating or at least reducing U.S. influence in Europe.

FRANCE AS SUCCESSOR Naturally enough, de Gaulle sees France as the successor to the U.S. as director of policy for Europe.

And still as naturally, many Europeans outside France, especially the British, can't go along with de Gaulle to this extent.

The Canadian government is troubled by some forms de Gaulle's policy.

Washington (AP)—Stockholders of the Comsat Corp. overwhelmingly re-elected its 12 incumbent directors after hearing management assurances that the global telephone and television system "will earn a reasonable return on our investment."

Earnings of the Communications Satellite Corp. Will begin board Chairman Leo D. Welch told the annual stockholders meeting after the earth-circling system of spacebirds is complete in late 1967 or 1968.

Optimistic reports from Welch and Comsat President Joseph V. Charyk.

Charyk, a native of Canmore, Alta., hinted at the possibility of an even earlier round of three villages and towns jumping in the next five years to 25,000 from 5,300.

This five-fold increase is attributed to the creation of 1,650 new jobs.

The industrial development concerned is the merger of Birds Eye Foods Ltd. of London, a subsidiary of Unilever Corp., and North Eastern Fish Industries Ltd. of Harbour Grace, Nfld.

Birds Eye Foods plans to invest \$1,000,000 over the next five years in expansion of Newfoundland fisheries through construction of 25 modern trawlers as well as improvement and

clear warheads supplied her by the U.S.

The government is also upset by Quebec's claim to negotiate treaties with France, which regards herself as the leader of the French community everywhere in the world.

A few officials say they believe Canada should simply tell France not to sign accords with Quebec. But there is no intention of doing this.

Canada's stake in the global communications system is \$7,500,000 invested by the government in the corporation plus the provision of Canadian facilities. A \$5,000,000 ground station at Mill Village, N.S., is expected to be in operation on an experimental basis this fall. It is being built by the Canadian Overseas Telecommunications Corp.

De Gaulle's Policies Given Growing Canadian Okay

By DAVE MCINTOSH OTTAWA (CP)—The policies of French President de Gaulle, wrapped up in the phrase "de Gaulleism" now seem to be finding more favor than critics among Canadian diplomats at home and abroad.

There's still a good deal of criticism of de Gaulle is sometimes referred to here as the "separatist of Europe"—but there's also a lot of sympathy for what he is trying to do.

Many officials say Canada is probably in a better position than any other nation to judge what de Gaulle means because this country constantly has to fend off heavy American influence.

They say de Gaulle is trying to get Europe to stand on its own feet and make its own decisions without American direction, however well intentioned for such a policy. Informants say that with Europe booming economically there's no reason why it should let the United States take care of its defence and other policies. Europe, they say, should start acting like an adult.

Some officials say Prime Minister Pearson was actually voicing such de Gaulle policy in a Feb. 10 speech when he said:

MANY NEW JOBS

In the town of Harbour Grace, which now has a population of about 1,900, there will be jobs for 400 additional workers in the fish plant, another 450 fishermen on trawlers, and a further 50 in maintenance work.

What amounts virtually to an explosion of the population of Harbour Grace stems from the fact that it will take a lot more than that to provide the services required for a community enlarged by 1,900 new workers. The prediction is that the total population of the community will grow to 17,000 from 3,000.

Similarly in Ferrisburgh, a fishing village of 800, there will be new employment for 300 fish plant workers. Those 300 new workers and their families will require community services to such an extent that the total population of Ferrisburgh will grow to 1,900.

Port de Grave's present population of 1,500 will increase to 4,000 when 250 more workers are required for the expansion of Birds Eye Foods.

North Eastern Fish Industries has been a pioneer in the frozen fish industry in Newfoundland. It has operated a fillet-plant and freezing plant at Harbour Grace and subsidiary plants at Ferrisburgh, Port de Grave and Old Perlican.

But North Eastern's plants have operated on a seasonal basis. Under the new partnership with Birds Eye, these plants will operate on a year-round basis.

Birds Eye supplies about 70 per cent of the frozen food market in the United Kingdom, employing 11,000 people in Britain. In the last five years, Birds Eye sales have doubled and the company expects them to double again by 1970.

Said a company official: "We are going to have to get twice as much fish to meet the demand, and we hope to get that fish from Newfoundland."

TORONTO (CP)—The Luck of Ginger Coffee was named best feature film produced in Canada last year at the 17th annual Canadian film awards evening Saturday.

The Crawley Films production was chosen over three National Film Board efforts—Sweet Substitute, Nobody Waves Goodbye, La Chat dans le Sac and Sweet Substitute.

The winning film was directed by Irving Kershner and adapted by Brian Moore from his own novel.

Twelve Canadian pictures, including four amateur films, received honours.

Presentations by CBC radio personality Max Ferguson highlighted a two-day meeting of Canadian producers, directors and cameramen.

The CBC received two awards for its productions of Summer in Mississippi, an informative program, and The Open Grave in the entertainment category.

Hunt For Oil Gains Headway

CALGARY (CP)—The annual summer search for oil off Canada's two sea coasts gained momentum today with announcement by British American Oil Co. Ltd. that it will start exploration work in June on 800,000 acres in the Strait of Georgia between the British Columbia mainland and Vancouver Island.

Late last month, Shell Canada Ltd. announced a summer off-shore oil exploration program in an undisclosed number of acres of West Coast waters. Earlier this month, Richfield Oil Corp. said it would look for oil underneath the waters of Hudson Bay.

Large-scale off-shore exploration is also scheduled to start this summer off Canada's East Coast. Among companies with eastern off-shore interests are Shell, Soco, Mobil of Canada Ltd. and Pan American Petroleum Corp.

SLOGANS REMOVED BARKINGSIDE, England. — Police removed anti-Jewish and anti-Negro slogans plastered on shop windows and telephone boxes in this residential town outside London during the week-end. The printed slogans read: "Boycott the Jewish Supermarkets and Lacks Not Wanted Here appeared Saturday."

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
