

location where water is available 3 pounds of creeping Red Fescue with 1 pound of Kentucky Blue Grass, sown at 4 pounds per 1,000 square feet is a satisfactory mixture. If water is not available 5 pounds of Crested Wheat Grass with 1 pound of Kentucky Blue Grass, sown at a rate of 6 pounds per 1,000 square feet produces better results. In a shady place 6 pounds of Creeping Red Fescue per 1,000 square feet is recommended whether or not water is available.

PASTURE COMPETITION

The object of this Competition is to promote a better understanding and appreciation of the value of better pastures and pasture management.

The Dairyman's Association, the Beef Breed Association and the Provincial Department of Agriculture are co-operating and extending this Competition to all livestock owners on P.E.I. The time is drawing close for entries to be returned to the Secretary of the P.E.I. Dairyman's Association, Charlottetown. Consult your last issue of the A.B.C. News for the rules and regulations. There is also enclosed a convenient entry form.

SUPPORT PRICES

The dairy products price support, announced recently by Hon. Douglas Harkness, minister of Agriculture, means that cheese and dried skim milk will cost the Canadian consumer less.

Its effect on the producer will be that the farmer who delivers cream for butter only will get the same return as last year. However, if he delivers milk for cheese making he will receive a small increase in his return. Milk delivered for manufacturing into products other than cheese will bring about 15 cents per 100 pounds less than it did in 1959.

The farmer delivering to the

fluid milk market, who has been receiving a price of up to \$5.00 per 100 pounds for his milk, will not be paid any subsidy for the milk which he diverts into manufacturing. Thus the returns to the dairy farmers who have been delivering to different types of markets will be brought closer together than they have been in the past.

These changes will be effective for the twelve month period from May 1, 1959 to April 30, 1960.

A NEW LAWN

A well prepared seed bed and a wise choice of grass are two of the more important aspects to consider when starting a new

lawn. The growth and maintenance of a good lawn requires knowledge and care.

There should be at least four inches of good top soil after the seed bed has been rolled. When more than one variety of grass is to be sown they should be thoroughly mixed, divided into two equal parts and broadcast from north to south and east to west across the bed. A light raking in one direction only is all that is necessary after this. However, rolling the seed bed lightly will encourage more uniform and rapid germination.

A newly sown lawn must be watered until the moisture has penetrated to at least two inches but be careful not to wash out the seed or leave the water lying on the surface. In extremely hot and dry weather burlap laid over the newly seeded lawn will help the germination but it must be removed as soon as the seed begins to sprout.

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
