THOUGHTS FOR OUR TIME

SPIRITUAL VALUES UPHOLD STRENGTH OF DEMOCRACY

It is to be hoped that the pre-occupation of our age with material goods and sensual pleasures is more apparent than real.

Perhaps we are prevented from giving adequate public expression to our highest values by our ideal of freedom which makes us respect the right of individuals to choose for themselves their values.

Although the ideal of freedom is itself a real value which we all share, it has no positive content and cannot be symbolized adequately.

Thus the picture that we paint of ourselves in our commercial art and the positive values that are invoked in addresses to the public at large tend to be very common indeed.

It may be that these representatives are meant to symbolize the right and the opportunity which every one has in our democracy to share in its direction and in the fruits of our working together.

Now this notion is very Christian truth in its origin at least.

When Christianity came into the ancient world, it came into a society which justified the existence of slavery on the grounds that only those who have the ability to undergo an intensive formal education are fit to govern and only in them does society find its fruition and justification.

Christianity taught that by faith the man in the street and the slave could have a more certain grasp of truth than the most educated man and that, by the grace of God, they were entitled to share in a happiness which was beyond the most exalted dreams of any of the philosophers.

These truths have been with us so long that what was originally held to be true in the order of things now seems natural to us and universally true.

Actually it was a bold act of faith that put the right to vote and to be elected into the hands of every man together with the right to share fully in the benefits of society, a revolutionary doctrine that is leading us to the new patterns of society of the world over.

However, to the extent that this idea is divorced from its original spiritual meaning, its explosive force is destructive rather than constructive.

HATE

It is especially divorced from its original meaning when men are encouraged to hate and to be insatiable and impatient in the pursuit of material goods.

Men cannot find in hatred and greed the wisdom that is required for government. If they use such means to throw off their old bonds, they are preparing new bonds for themselves which are worse than the old.

They overthrow patterns of society that in some instances were fairly reasonable and they use nothing to put in its place except the tyranny of unreasonable passions.

A democracy is possible and can endure only so long as the majority of people remain faithful to spiritual values.

It is possible for the many to be wise but the only wisdom that is open to all men is that which is based upon the virtues of love and patience.

72. The Toronto Greenwood member has been the party's chief financial critic in the Commons. In the coming Parliament, it was reported, he will go to the Senate as Spaker of the upper house.

Mr. Macdonnell also is a former national PC president.

Portfolios in the Liberal administration which have not been filled are agriculture, defence production, health and welfare, mines and technical surveys, and citizenship and immigration.

After the dissolution of Parliament in mid-April, the Liberals also had an associate defence minister. It was reported that none would be appointed by Mr. Diefenbaker but that Defence Minister Peakes probably would have two parliamentary assistants instead.

IMMEDIATE ASSISTANT

Right after his swearing in, Prime Minister Diefenbaker, told reporters at Government House that he plans to appoint an agriculture minister promptly as well as giving Ontario and Quebec another portfolio apiece. The Ontario appointment will serve to provide that province with a Roman Catholic cabinet minister.

Meanwhile, some of the permanent ministers will be acting ministers for the vacant portfolios.

Mr. Diefenbaker did not specify who would take care of what portfolio. He said later there would be announcements on this today, when a second cabinet meeting is scheduled for 9:30 a.m.

Just before entering the first cabinet meeting of the new regime late in the day, the prime minister told reporters that the Government House leader in the Senate will be appointed a minister without portfolio. Asked whether it would be Senator John T. Haig of Manitoba, opposition leader in the Senate since 1945, he indicated a decision has not been made.

DEFER DECISION

Nor was there any announcement on who would be nominated for the key office of Commons Speaker. Party informants have indicated a decision will be deferred until close to the opening of the next session of Parliament.

The date of this session, too, went without announcement. Diefenbaker.
